State of Kentucky
Adair County

On this 7th day of September personally appeared before the Judge of the Adair Circuit Court now sitting, Thomas Cochran a resident of Adair County and State of Kentucky aged 72 years who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 1st 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated.

He lived in Campbell County Virginia at the time he entered the service in the year 1778 in the month of August he was drafted under Capt. Thomas Heath. Mr. Hays was his Lieutenant & James Lindsey his ensign. Under this draft he served three months in boarding the magazine at Bedford old Town a place now called Mico London he there received from his colonel commanding at the barracks his discharge his discharge from Capt. Heath & returned to his father where he resided in said County and put his discharge away at his Father and has never seen it since. He states that the same winter of 1778 he went on to the state of Georgia. And sometime in the month of February 1779 he volunteered under Capt. Reid who was beating up for volunteers in Wilkes County & state of Georgia to go as a ranger or Indian Spy. in this expedition Mourning Hewitt was his Lieutenant. Hugh Roan was his ensign. He marched from Wilkes Court house to Reids Fort there he drew his arms and was then out ranging through different parts of the County. He states that the Indians were remarkably troublesome to the people. In the summer following the Indians came

and State between twenty & thirty head of cattle
he with others followed them across the Economy
and Oakmalgy Rivers the distance of about fifty
miles we overtook ^{them when} they were encamped & for-
bearing something to eat when we came upon
them a battle then ensued and we killed ten
or twelve the precise no. not recollects took all the
cattle they had stolen (with the exception of a
few that were drowned before we overtook them)
and returned to Fort Reid. we took a good many
ponies & a few Captains Horses also and car-
ried them with us. He states that he remained ⁱⁿ the
service at the Fort aforesaid. and had very freq-
uently to stand guard of nights and was in a
great many little skirmishes sometimes would
kill two or three Indians and sometimes more
and in this way he states that he served from
the time he first volunteered in February 1779 about
two years and left the service in February 1781
that he got his discharge from Capt. Reid
at Leids Fort. then returned to his Father in
Campbell County Virginia where he left this
~~discharge~~ ^{discharge} he has no ~~but~~ ^{now} the cap of my anchor ship
and has never seen it since. He
states that he has no record of his age. He lived
in Virginia about 15 years after he left the service
as well as he recollects. moved from thence to
Tennessee lived in that State one summer then
removed to Adair County Kentucky where
he now resides. He was born in Charlotte County
Virginia ~~in~~ ^{about} the year 1760 the month of April
and the 8th day. He states that he has no documentary
^{of his service above stated} evidence, and that he knows of no person living
now in Kentucky by whom he can prove his
services. He hereby relinquishes every claim

whatever to a pension or annuity except tho
present and declares that his name is not on
the pension ^{roll} of the agency of any state.


W^t Spencer James a clergyman residing in

credit —


