of State aforesaid Samuel Ellis a aged  
out of the County of Perry aforesaid  
State of Kentucky aged Seventy one  
years on the ninth day of April.

last who being first duly sworn  
according to law doth on his oath make  
the following declaration in order to  
obtain the benefit of the act of  
Congress passed June 17th 1832

That in the year one thousand seven  
hundred and seventy eight he entered  
the service of the United States as  
a volunteer militiaman in Rock  
County State of North Carolina under  
Captain Samuel Reed his Captain  
but was by the name of Nelson his  
original name he does not now recall  
it as an Ensign did not serve the  
whole time he was immediately  
marched over to the Ohio River  
where he was joined to old locks  
Regiment the army was stationed  
on the Ohio River at a place  
called Mocks Old Field where

They remained for some time that  
is that place was called head  
quarters but they were constantly  
Kept Scouting about up  
and down the Akim River and  
in the neighbourhood Sapping  
keeping the Tories down as far  
as they could had many skirmishes  
with them in this way he served  
six months that being the length  
of time he volunteered for and was  
after the expiration of his term  
Honorable discharged by his Captain  
and returned home

Some time thereafter he again entered  
the service of the United States as a  
volunteer private Matthamore in  
a company commanded by Captain  
David Caldwell and Wilson Lint  
in command. Joined Col. Grimes  
again marched on to the Akim river  
where he was kept in constant  
service Scouting about in North  
and South Carolina after the  
Tories & British had secured their  
misery with the enemy about the  
Akim & the neighborhood  
about six months this may be served six  
months & was honorably discharged  
by his Capt. he again volunteered  
under the same Captain and

was joined to the said Col. Jones  
Regiment and marched on to the  
North State that is Carolina there  
he served faithfully as a private  
Artificer nine months and  
another two he was at the Battle  
at the Camps in which Battle he  
Received a wound in the arm soon  
after this Battle he was again honor-  
ably discharged and returned home  
and immediately volunteered again  
for six months under Captain

Jacob Newbold having been sent  
in place of Newbold the name  
of the engineer being now marched on  
to the ad Hoc Lake remained Scott  
ing about through the Country  
on to the Catawba River where he was  
in some skirmishes his services on the  
side of God and this is all his history  
and was again honorably discharged

fully served the cause in the  
war of the Revolution in a Corps

The evidence in support of your claim, under the act of June 7, 1832, has been examined, and the papers are herewith returned. The following is a statement of your case on a tabular form. On comparing these papers with the following rules and the subservient notes you will readily perceive that objections exist which must be removed before a pension can be allowed. The notes and the regulations will show what is necessary to be done. These points to which your attention is more particularly directed you will find marked in the margin with a brace, (thus: { }). You will, when you return your papers to this Department, send this joined letter with them; and you will by complying with this request greatly facilitate the investigation of your claim.

A Statement, showing the Services of Samuel C. Ellsworth

I am respectfully  
The applicant for your election service  
= did declare his to be satisfactory. J. L. EDWARDS.

It is believed that a continuation of actual  
service was not performed by the applicant  
for the time stated. Therefore he can claim  
his service as stated in allowance for fifteen  
months as only five allowed. July 8, 1930

Applicant for a Writ of  
Habeas Corpus in the County of West Va.  
On this 10th day of March 1845 before  
me the subscriber a Justice of the peace  
for the said County of West personally  
appeared Samuel Ellis now residing  
in said County who states his written  
decrees that he is the same person  
who formerly belonged to the Company  
commanded by Captain David Caldwell  
in the Regiment commanded by Colonel  
Gwin in the service of the United  
States. That he also belonged to the Company  
commanded by Captain Samuel Ross  
in the Regiment commanded by Col Gwin  
and that he also belonged to the Company  
commanded by Captain Jacob Hobson  
in the Regiment commanded by Col Gwin  
all in the service of the United States. That  
he never was placed on the ~~the~~ ~~the~~ ~~the~~  
roll of the State of Kentucky where he  
then resided. That he moved from Kentucky  
to the State of Mississippi and had his name  
transferred from Kentucky to Mississippi. That  
he has resided from Mississippi to Kentucky  
again and now resides in Hark County,  
Kentucky where he intends to remain  
and wishes his person to be there pro-  
tected in future. The following are his  
reasons for removing from Mississippi to  
Kentucky. That he and his family were  
taken sick shortly after he settled in  
Mississippi. That his wife died there and  
he and his son & two daughters who com-  
posed his family removed with the first

part of one year and he concluded that he &  
his family could not injure their health in  
the state of Michigan and that cause  
alone he moved from Michigan to Penn-  
sylvania again. I am giving you my best note above
