October Term 1832

On this 1st day of October 1832 personally
appeared in open Court before the undersigned
County Court of Adair County now sitting
William James a Resident of the County
of Adair State of Kentucky aged 74 years
who being first duly sworn according to
Law doth on his oath make the following
Declaration in order to obtain the provis-
ion and benefit made by an act of
Congress passed 7th June 1832 that he
entered the Service of the United States in
the County of Salisbury State of North Car-
olina as drafted militia man in the
month of August 1780 for three months -
under Capt Faulkner John Wornack
but does not recollect the name of
his ensign, he was marched from the
place of rendezvous to Salisbury where
he was joined to the main army com-
manded by General Butler, William
Moore Colo Elyah Moore Major he
was marched from there ^{to} six mile Creek
in South Carolina where we were joined
by Colo William Washington they remained
there some time from there were taken
or marched to the Waxsaw where he was
stationed for several weeks from there again
marched back to six miles Creek where
they were joined by Colo Morgan after
remaining there some time part of
the time he was thus marched the way

attached to General Davis's Brigade from
Six mile Creek he was again marched
Back to Salis bury. Where he was permitted
to return home having served his full
Term of three months he states that he
did not obtain any written discharge
at that time but afterwards before he
got home was honorably discharged by
Col. Moore but does not know where
his discharge is but suppose he has
lost it or mislaid it owing to the
great length of time and not know-
ing it would ever be of any use to
him - after he remained ^{at home}
some time he again entered the service
as a volunteer in the month of March
1781 from the same County under Capt
James Cady does not recollect the name
of his Det. & Garrison he was marched
about the County scouting after the Tories
for sometime and then joined Col
Moore's Regiment and was kept in
active service for sometime in
that way and was joined to General
Greene's army near Das River where
he remained for sometime and was
marched from there through the County
in different directions until they came
into the neighbourhood of Gufford and
after remaining there sometime he was
discharged from service having served the
full term for which he served and
being three months he received no written
discharge for this tour he returned

home, and after turning at home a few days
he again entered the service as a substitute
for a drafted militia man for
three months under Capt Faulkner and
marched to Hillsborough where he was kept
as a guard for the full term of three months
and was discharged but does not recollect
whether he received a written discharge or
not he returned home soon thereafter but in
a few days he was drafted as a militia
man in the same County and State and
entered the service under Capt Hugh
Barnett Capt William Moore, Regiment
he was marched to Hillsborough where he was
joined to an army but does not recollect
the name of the commanding officer he
staid there but staid there but a
short time was march towards Wilmington
and was joined to Capt Butler's and
marched through the country in many
directions scouting & hunting the enemy
untill the full term of his service
was fully ended being three months
and was discharged near Wilmington
& returned but whether he obtained
a written discharge or not does not
recollect but if he did does not
know where it is, making in the
whole a term of service of twelve
months he hereby relinquishes every
claim whatever to a pension or annuity
except the present and declares that his
name is not on the pension roll of
any State

he further states that he was born in
the state of Virginia Southhampton
County on the last day of September
1758 as he is informed and believes from
his parents at an early age his father
moved to North Carolina near Rowley where
he died for some years and then moved
to Caswell County where he lived
during the time of his service and
sometime after the close of the war
he moved to Burke County North Carolina
where he remained until about the
year 1803 when he moved to this coun-
ty where he has resided ever since
he further states that he has no registers
of his age or documentary evidence of
his service nor does he know of
any person by whom he can
prove his service except the first

James of this County

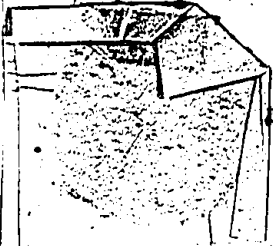

County State of North Carolina when I entered
into the Service the in his first declaration
(through mistake the name of the County was wrote
Tarzwell) after the close of the war I moved to
Pamk County North Carolina, where I lived until
1803 then I ~~had~~ moved to and settled in a fair
County State of Kentucky where I have resided
until the present time

4 How were you called into Service were you drafted
did you volunteer or were you ~~drafted~~ a sub-
stitute and if a substitute for whom
Answer the first tour of three months I was
drafted the second tour of three months I was
a volunteer the third tour I served three months
as a substitute for a man by the name of Williams
I do not recollect his christian name social
Williams, did not live in the neighborhood of this
Declaration, in this declaration ~~recalled~~ Hillsborough
where Williams was first drafted and about to
march being then on parade this Declaration
substituted in his room and never saw him
But once afterwards he supposes he knew
his name then But now does not recollect
it the 4th tour of three months he served as a drafted
militiaman and faithfully served the full
Term of each as stated in his original Decla-
ration

Ans. I have made a full Statement of those
facts in my original Declaration which I
refer to and incorporate as my answer to this

1833 Personally appeared before Clayton Miller an acting
Justice of the Peace and for the County of Adair State of
Kentucky Mrs. Mary James a resident of the said County and
that and aged near eighty one years and who after being
first duly sworn according to Law doth on her oath make
the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of
the provisions made by the act of Congress passed the 7th day of
July 1832 Entitled "An act granting half pay and Pensions to
certain widows" That she is the widow of William James
late of the said County of Adair and who was a Soldier
in the Revolutionary War and a militiaman and served
some length of time therein and on account of his said service
he received Pension of about \$40. per annum under
the act of the 7th June 1832 and which he continued to
receive until his death and to the widow composing the
matter of his application of her Husband for said
Pension she refers for such facts as are necessary in the
investigation of her claim. She further declares that
her said husband resided in North Carolina when he first
formed the said service and then in Meigs County
She also declares that her said husband resided in the said
County of Adair during the whole time he received his afo-
resaid Pension. She also declares that she has no

accountary evidence in support of her
claim. She declares that she cannot state
the names of the officers under whom the service
of her said husband was performed but would
specially refer to his application or the evidence
in the name for their names and the character of
the service - She further declares that she was mar-
ried to the said William James in the year fourteen
hundred and eighty one or two and she thinks in the
month of May about being just before she was mar-
ried years of age and she was for eighty one years
of age on the 25th day of the present month - and
that her said husband died on the 21st day of
July 1842 that she was not married to him previous
to his leaving the service but the marriage took
place previous to the first day of January 1794
(say) at the time above stated and that she has ever
again married since the death of her said husband
but still continues his widow

Madam:

I have to advise you that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, W. 2943, it appears that WILLIAM JAMES was born September 30, 1758, in Southampton County, Virginia.

While a resident of Saswell County, North Carolina, he enlisted and served as private with the North Carolina troops as follows:

From August, 1780, three months in Captain Faulkner's Company, Colonel William Moore's Regiment.

From March, 1781, three months in Captain James Cody's Company, Colonel James Moore's Regiment.

Soon afterwards, three months in Captain Faulkner's Company.

Soon afterwards, three months in Captain Hugh Barnett's Company, Colonel William Moore's Regiment.

He was allowed pension on his application executed October 1, 1832, at which time he was a resident of Adair County, Kentucky.

He died in said county July 24, 1842.

He married in 1781 or 1782 in North Carolina Mary (her maiden

name not stated) who was born June 25, 1762.

She was allowed pension on her application executed June 7, 1843, at which time she was a resident of Adair County, Kentucky.

In 1866 it was stated that Mary James never had any children.

The above noted is the only soldier from Adair County, Kentucky, by the name of William James that is found on the Revolutionary War records of this bureau.
