Declaration of William McRaney

State of Kentucky, dated June 1<sup>st</sup> 1832  
In the County of Adair  
On the day preceding 1832 personally  
appeared in open Court before the justices of the  
Adair County Court now sitting William  
McRaney a resident of the County of Adair  
and State of Kentucky aged 76 years, who  
being first duly sworn according to law, doth,  
on his oath make the following declaration, in  
order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress  
passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832 -

That he entered the service of the United States  
under the following named officers, and served  
as herein stated -

He stated that he enlisted in the service of  
the United States in the year 1775 under Capt  
Thomas Rogers whose Lieutenant was Dray  
Watson. He lived at that time in Charlotte

Cumberland Virginia and after enlistment marched  
from thence to Petersburg Va. and thence joined  
the Halifax & Blackburg troops and marched  
down to Jamestown crossed the river and  
entrenched a while and moved on to Williams  
burg, then to York, thence to George's Island  
and there was stationed until the battle was

won then marched to Patowmack at a place  
called Crossy point where stationed awhile  
and under the command of Genl. Lewis

until the Indians broke out at the Holstein  
when the Army heard that we marched an  
give up our marchlets drew  
horses, took up small arms and marched  
on to Holstein to rout the Indians. There was  
wore stations at the head of Holstein until  
the army returned who had give on in  
pursuit of the Indians to their nation under the  
Command of Gen. Lewis, before we got there  
who Gen. Lewis had left under the Command of  
Col. Gaigne Morgan and when they returned  
from the nation he received a discharge from  
Gen. Lewis and returned to Virginia. The longer  
Lair was 16 months. He remained at home  
about two weeks went on to Georgia and enlisted  
under Capt. Austin for three months during  
which time he was marching and guarding  
the Country from the outrages & barbarity  
of the Indians. The same time after enlisted in  
Georgia under Gen. Williamson. Capt. Logan,  
& Lieutenant Charles Reed to go to Florida  
and went on to St. Mary's River Crauford and  
then met Gen. Hare a continental officer  
Gen. Hare wanted Gen. Williamson to give up  
the fear & pain to his officers and us to  
draw beef & rice in its steaks but the soldiers  
refused and Gen. Williamson also Gen. Hare  
and his officers got mad went off and left the  
army at St. Mary's River. After he had been

a few days Gen. Williamson sent some  
men to ascertain how far the Tories had  
gone. He volunteered amongst the rest  
and marched about 25 miles to Trout Creek  
there we came across the Tories and British  
in a half-faced fort had a skirmish.  
& Clark the Commander got wounded &  
we had to retreat back to St. Marys River  
Upon our return Gen. Williamson sent Major  
Pickens afterward General Pickens back  
to Trout Creek & dropped all the wagon horses. and he  
your petitioners volunteered and went back  
under the command of Pickens but upon the  
arrival of the men the British & Tories had  
fled across St. Johns river Pickens followed  
them as far as the river and camped on  
one side & the British & Tories on the other the  
next morning we commenced our march  
to join Gen. Williamson at St. Marys River  
then March on to South Carolina into 90 dist<sup>n</sup>  
He continued in the service of the Spring following  
was at Augusta under Gen. Williamson when  
the British took Augusta at the time of their defeat  
at Bear Creek. He then received his discharge  
from Gen. Williamson & returned to Virginia  
this tour was 18 months - A few months thereafter  
he went to Augusta and was taken prisoner by  
the British and for a month or two upon parole  
he made his escape & joined Col. Rebath ifs on  
Piddo River then Clark there went on to Augusta

4 years petitions with him and under his  
Command a fight ensued at Augusta &  
continued four days and your petitioners  
was in the battle from beginning to end  
The army under your petitioners is to went  
to Kings Mountain and in that battle he  
was engage all the time and after in  
defeating Genl. Ferguson took a great ma-  
ny prisoners took them up to Pickensville  
and hanged nine of them and after we  
crossed the River Catawba we hung three more  
and took the balance up to Moraviantown  
the was under the Command of James Shelley  
at Kings Mountain. A short time after the仗  
other joined Genl. Braddock & pursued routes  
for the purpose of carrying aeraf Col. Parton  
but when we came aeraf he was in  
Company with Cornwallis & his Army we  
fired at them aeraf the river we then marched  
up to Black Stock on Tiger River Parton  
followed us we whiped him back and  
Genl. Braddock was wounded in the shoulder  
He states that he has lost all his discharge and  
has no documentary evidence by which he  
can prove this service and further he know of  
no person whose testimony he can procure  
who can testify to his service - He hereby  
relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension  
or annuity except the present, and declares that his  
not on the pension roll of the agency of any state  
I do unto & subscribe this day 4 year of April 1854 William H. King

Dear Sir:

The date and place of birth of William McKinney are not given, nor are the names of his parents stated.

William McKinney, while residing in Charlotte County, Virginia, enlisted in 1775 and served ten months as private in Captain Thomas Collier's Virginia company, was in the battle of Gwyn's Island, and on an expedition against the Indians to Holston Island under General Lewis. He returned home and in about two weeks went to Georgia, enlisted and served three months as private in Captain Austin's Georgia company, in an expedition against the Indians. Sometime after he enlisted in Georgia, served eighteen months as private in Captain Logan's company under General Williamson and was in engagements on Trout Creek and at Augusta, Georgia. He returned to Virginia and a few weeks later went again to Augusta, Georgia, was taken prisoner by the British, held four months and then paroled, which parole he broke, joined General Clarke and was in the battles of Augusta and Kings Mountain, after which he joined General Sumter and was at the battle of Blackstocks.

William McKinney was allowed pension on his application executed August 10, 1832, then aged seventy-four years and living in Adair County, Kentucky.

There are no data in this claim relative to family.
