DEPARTMENT OF WAR.

Regulations for the Officers and Soldiers of the Revolutionary War who acquired a right to Land from the United States, but have not received it.

By an Act of Congress, of the 16th September, 1776, it is provided; that the Officers and Soldiers who engaged for, and continued to serve, during the War, or until discharged by Congress, shall receive land in proportion to their rank.

N. B. Those who engaged for three years, or for any other period than) during the war, are not entitled to land from the United States.

The following declaration must be filled up and sworn to by the claimant :

I, William Warmack aged 74 years, do upon oath testify and declare, that, I entered the service of the United States on the _____ day of _____ in the year 1780 for the term of During the War and that I served in the company commanded by Capt. Boyer in the Regiment No 2, commanded by Colo. Campbell of the Continental Virginia line, and was honorably discharged on _____ day of _____ in the year 1783, from the Regiment commanded by Colo. Manning.

I further declare, that I have never received a warrant for the Bounty Land promised to me on the part of the United States; nor have I ever assigned or transferred my claim in any manner whatsoever: therefore,

Know all men by these presents, that I, William Warmack aforesaid, do hereby constitute and appoint the Honble. Shando Williams to be my true and lawful attorney, for me and in my name to demand and receive from the Secretary of War of the United States, a warrant for the quantity of Land due to me as aforesaid; and my said attorney is hereby fully authorized and empowered to constitute and appoint one or more substitutes or attorneys under him for the special purposes above expressed.

I, William Caldwell aged 57 years do upon oath, declare that I have been long acquainted with William Warmack who has subscribed the above declaration in my presence, and well know that he is the identical person he therein represents himself to be; and further, I do believe, that he did perform the military service therein stated.

War Department Revolutionary Claims

NOV 18 1824

Authority that in conformity with the laws of the
United States of the 18th of March 1818 May 1st 1820
7th March 1st 1823 - William Wainwright late

inscribed on the pension list roll of the Kentucky agency
at the rate of eight dollars per month to commence on the
eighteenth day of March one thousand eight
hundred and twenty four, given at the war office of the
United States this nineteenth day of March one thousand
eight hundred and twenty four

On this fifteenth day
of November A.D. one thousand eight hundred
and fifty, personally appeared before me,
a Justice of the Peace within and for the
County and State aforesaid, Mary Worman
aged Seventy years, a resident of Ad-
air County in the State of Kentucky, who
being duly sworn according to law, declar-
ed, that she is the widow of William
Worman, deceased, who was a private
in the company commanded by Cap-
tain Thomas Boyer in the Second Regimen-
t of Virginia Infantry, commanded by Colonel
Stanley, in the Revolutionary
War.

That her said husband enlisted for a
term of seven years, and reference is hereby
made to the records in the War Depar-
tment for his term of service, time
of enlistment &c, they being the legal
evidences by which said Worman
drew a Pension up to April 1847, at
which time he died, at his residence
in Adair County, State of Kentucky.
She further states that she was married
to the said William Worman in Ad-
air County, Kentucky, on the 14th day
of February A.D. 1851, by one Alexander
Sinclair a minister of the Gospel, and
that her name before her said marria-
ge was Mary Judd, and that she is still
a widow.

She makes this declaration for the purpose of obtaining a Pension, to which she may be entitled, under any act of Congress granting Pensions to the Widows of Officers and Soldiers of the Revolutionary War.

State of Kentucky et al vs Security 701

At a County Court begun and held for the County of Adair at the Courthouse in Lodi Kentucky on Monday the 7th day of October 18²²

That remembered that this day William Warrick personally appeared in a Court being a Court of record proceeding according to the rules of the Commonwealth and by Statute of Kentucky and made oath in addition to the statements made by him before the Honorable Christopher Tompkins Esq Circuit Judge for the Commonwealth of Kentucky and Circuit of Adair on the 1st day of October 1819 that in the year 1780 he enlisted as a private in the Continental Establishment as stated in said application which he refers to and incorporates the same with this amendment he further states that he is now about 60 years of age that he is a cripple and is able to labour that he was a resident of the U.S. on the 18th day of March 1818 and that he has not since that time by gift sale or any manner disposed of any property or any part thereof with an intent thereby to evade or diminish it as to being myself within the purview of an act of Congress entitled an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and sea service of the U.S. in the revolutionary war passed on the 18th day of March 1818 that he has not nor has any person in trust for me any property or securities contracts or debts due to me nor have any income other than that is contained

in the schedule were annexed, and by me subscribed
he further states that his occupation is a Miller of the
grain, & his rate as follows, viz he has a wife
named Rachel about 44 years of age. She is un-
healthy often affected with a Cough & as he thinks
affected with the Consumption and is able to labour
that he has 6 children 2 of whom are married
now living with him eight of whom are daughters
4 of whom are nearly grown none of whom are
healthy & are unable to support themselves and one
of them deranged the others are small and
unable to do but little labour. 2 of them nearly
dead he further states that he has one horse least
worth about the sum of \$20 no more 5 head of
cattle worth \$55 no more 16 head of hogs worth \$20
no more ~~no~~ no more 3 beds of furniture worth \$30 and
no more small articles of household & kit to brew
his value worth \$20 no more 3 geese worth
about 20 cts that there is nothing owing to him
and that he lives about four dollars he prays
for support agreeable to the several acts of
Congress upon that subject
