Dear Sir

Some years since Philip
Winfree drew a Pension as a Revol-
utionary Soldier which he drew
up to his death or thereabouts which
was about 1841 - Some years since
his widow died also after his
death but drew no pension which
she was entitled to. The Object
of this Communication is to ask
of you to Examine in the War
or Pension Department and
see if there is any thing due
from the Government to said
Philip Winfree, his Widow now
dead or his heirs under any
act giving them Pensions, he drew
his Pension under act June 7 1832.

we are inclined to the Opinion
that we are entitled to some back
pay or pension prior to the act
aforesaid in right of said Winfrey
we wish you to investigate the
matter for us or place it in the
hands of some reliable Pension
agent, in Washington City who
will take a reasonable fee out
of any money he may get
for the heirs of said Winfrey
Some 2 years since we received
a letter from a Mr. Lane a Pension
agent in the City, stating there was
a large balance due the heirs
of said Winfrey and wished to
act for us but not knowing
him we never authorized
him to act for us. Will you
be so kind as to see to this
matter for us and have it
looked into so that we may
know the true state of the case.

doing you will much oblige

In reply to the letter of Messrs. Wimpsey & Lowdy, & respecting the claim of the heirs of Philip Wimpsey of Ky. I have to inform you that he drew a pension at the rate of \$20. per ann. under the act of 7th June 1832. for six months service, which is all that he claimed to have rendered -

If he left a widow who is now living she is entitled to a pension - But if she died without asserting her right. But there is no law by which her children can obtain the pension to which she might have been entitled but which she failed to receive - Such claims die with the party in whose right they may have existed. An opinion given by Attorney General Black, changed, a few years since, the practice of this Office which had, before that time, provided to allow children to receive the amount which might have been due to their parents in their lifetime - If

any of the semi annual payments due on
the pension of Philip Wainwright were not
drawn by him, they can be obtained
by his children - on application to
the 3rd Auditor's Office, with the usual
vouchers.

State of Kentucky Adour Circuit Court September
Term 1832

on this 4th day of September 1832 personally
appeared in open Court before the Honorable
Benjamin Mound Sole Judge in and for
the County of now sitting Philip Wierfrey
age 69 years who being first duly sworn according
to law doth on his oath make the following
Declaration in order to obtain the benefit
of the act of Congress passed 9th June 1832
that he entered the service of the United States in
the County of Buckingham State of Virginia
in the year 1780 as a substitute for John Wierfrey
a drafted militia man under Capt. Anthony
Newston. As a Walker Det. John Gammey
Ensign he was marched on to Coburn Point
and there landed to Major Jones Battalion
and there remained for about two months
from there he was marched on ~~from there~~
to Cooper Mills in Naneymond County
Virginia where he remained in service
until discharged. making a Service of up
wards three months he then returned home
he again entered the service in the year
1781 as a substitute for his father John Wierfrey
by a drafted militia in the same County
in the Company of Capt. John Miley. Marched
on to old Danestown from there to Williams
burg and on to Little York where he was
landed to the General Army commanded by Genl.
Washington he was attached to Mankings
Division as well as he now recollects he remain
ed at York engaged in service until the
until the surrender of Cornwallis after
the surrender he was ordered on with the
prisoners to Winchester Virginia where
he was discharged having in the last

Law Service three months, he states that he
Received written discharges for the 2^d two tours
But has lost them but know where or when
he does not know, nor has he any documentary
evidence to prove his services, he can prove
his services by John Self and Henry Winfrey
he hereby relinquishes any claim whatever
to a pension or annuity except the present
and declares that his name is not on the
Pension Roll of the agency of any state
Sworn to and subscribed the day & year of

Philip Winfrey

he further states that he was born in the
County of Roanoke ~~County~~ Virginia in the
year 1764 - he was taken from there to Rowley
ham County where he resided ~~at~~ the time
he entered the service & where he remained until
the year 1795 when he moved to Kentucky
Lincoln County where he remained about
two years then moved to Green River where
he now lives in the County of Adams
he has no register of his Birth.

John Self personally appeared in Court and made
oath that he is well acquainted with the above
named Philip Winfrey & that he served with
him in the first tour named in the above
application that he served with him in the
same company & part of the time were
warp mats, and he has a personal
throw back of his service for the full term
as stated by him. he states that he has no positive
knowledge of his service Winfrey served at the
Siege of York but has conversed with him upon
the subject (he being there himself) and has no
doubt that Winfrey was there he said Winfrey
by having related General Cannon's

him he states that he supposes the reason he was not acquainted with Murphy at York he was in a different company and was engaged as a cook for the officers during the time he was there sworn to and subscribed the day of year of?

Henry Mifflin a resident of said County personally appeared in Court and made oath that the above named Philip Murphy is his brother, he is younger than Philip that he knows the Philip was in the service as he has stated the first time he saw he heard of his returning and went on about 60 miles & met him and assisted him home he further states that he saw him start from home and saw him return from the last time and has no doubt from his knowledge that he served the full term as he has stated subscribed sworn to the day of year of?

And the court do hereby declare their opinion after the investigation of the matter and after putting the interrogatories prescribed by the war department that the above named applicant was a revolutionary soldier and served as he states, and the court further certifies that it appears to them that John Self of Cumberland County & Henry Mifflin who is a resident of said County of said State are credible persons and that their statements are entitled to credit.

Dear Madam:

The data contained herein were obtained from the papers on file in the Revolutionary War claim for pension, S.31488, based upon the military service of Phillip Winfrey in that war.

Phillip Winfrey, son of John, was born in Powhatan County, Virginia, in 1784, day, month, and the name of his mother are not shown.

While a resident of Buckingham County, Virginia, Phillip Winfrey, enlisted in 1790, and served three months as a substitute for his father, John Winfrey, as private under Captain Anthony Winston and Major Jones in the Virginia troops. He enlisted in 1781, served three months as a substitute for his father, as private in Captain John Mosby's Virginia Company and was at the siege of Yorktown.

In 1795 he moved to Lincoln County, Kentucky, and about two years later moved to Green River, Adair County, Kentucky.

He was allowed pension on his application executed September 4, 1832, at which time he was a resident of Green River, Kentucky.

In 1832 Henry Winfrey, a brother of soldier, was living in Adair County, Kentucky. He was younger than soldier, his age not stated.

The soldier, Phillip Winfrey, died about 1841, leaving a widow, whose name, age, and date of death are not stated.

In 1851 Sims A. Winfrey and Samuel Cowdy, their ages not given, heirs of the soldier, were living in Kentucky; their relationship to soldier is not shown. There are no further family data.
