Under the act of the 6th of April, 1838, entitled "An act directing the transfer of money remaining unclaimed by certain Pensioners, and authorizing the payment of the same at the Treasury of the United States;" The child of William Young, 2^d a Pensioner on the Roll of the Kentucky Agency, at the rate of Eighty — Dollars and — Cents per annum, under the law of the 7th June 1832, has been paid at this Department, from the 4th of Sept. 1837, to the 11th July 1838, the day of his death.

State of Kentucky Adair County Sch
on this 10th day of August 1832 personally
appeared in Open Court before the worshipping
Justices of Adair County Court now sitting William
Young a resident of the County of Adair and
State of Kentucky age 72 years who being
first duly sworn according to law doth on
his Oath make the following Declaration
in order to obtain the benefit of the act
of Congress passed 7th June 1832 that entered
the service of the United States States in the
Revolutionary war as a volunteer under
Capt Falls in the month of October 1778-13
in the County of Roan State of North Carolina
he was kept in said County for a consecr-
able time scouring after the enemy untill he
he was marched to Ramsours Mill where
he was attached to Colo Dicks Regiment and
then was engaged in the glorious Victory at
Ramsours Mill his Capt was killed at
said Battle he was then put under Capt
Wall commanded by Colo ^{Clay} ~~Wall~~ ^{Clay} and continued
in service untill the Battle of the Shallow
Ford in North Carolina in which Battle
he was ~~and~~ in he still continued in service
scouring in said State untill the Spring
of 1779 when he was discharged from

Service having served 16 months he
when returned home he remained at
home until the 3^d day of May 1780 at
which time he enlisted for six months under
Capt Samuel Martin's Command
by Col^o Wm. P. Oague in the line of Genl
Sumpter was marched on to South Caroli
na to the Congaree where the Capt of Congaree
was taken then he was put under a deta
-
achment commanded by Capt^s and went
on with him to the Ashapoo River there
~~met with a party of British and~~ took
took some horses from the British and
was returning to the Army. Stopped at Capt
Snipe's and there had a general engage-
ment with the British in which engage-
ment he received thirteen wounds and
all of the troops killed except Capt Snipe
himself and 3 or 4 others and he still
continued in service and as soon as his
wounds would permit him again resumed the
active service until his term expired
I was discharged honorable at Orange
River South Carolina making in the whole
a service of two years and two months
in which service he lost a horse saddle
& Bridle valued at \$130 for which he
has rec^d no compensation

he states that in the fall 1787 he moved
to the new State of Kentucky where he
has ever since resided that he knows
of no witnesses in Kentucky by whom he
can prove his service or any part thereof
he is informed William Young his Cousin some
time past lived in the western part of the
State of Tennessee about two hundred miles
from here, he could establish the service
But from the old age & infirmity of this
Applicant he could not go there without
great inconvenience to himself he does not
He ^{represents} ~~hereby~~ ^{what has become of his discharge} ~~represents~~ ^{he has no claim}
he ~~hereby~~ ^{represents} Relinquishes Every claim whatever to
a Pension or annuity except the present and
Declares that his name is not on the pension
Roll of the agency of any state

Dear Sir:

The data which follow were obtained from pension claim, S. 31505, based upon service of William Young in the Revolutionary War.

The date and place of birth and names of the parents of William Young are not given.

William Young volunteered in Rowan County, North Carolina, in October, 1777, served at various times as private under Captains Falls, Hall, Samuel Martin and Snipes, and Colonels Look, Cloyd and William Poague, in the North Carolina troops, was in the battles of Ramsour's Mill and Shallow Ford, also, an engagement, location of which was not stated, in which he received thirteen wounds. After recovering from his wounds, he continued in service and was discharged after having served in all two years two months.

In the fall of 1787, the soldier moved to what was later the State of Kentucky.

William Young was allowed pension on his application executed August 10, 1838, while residing in Adair County, Kentucky, aged seventy-two years. His name was borne on the pension roll as William Young, 2nd. He was referred to as Major William Young, also, with no explanation of the rank. He died July 11, 1838.

No reference was made in the claim to soldier's wife, but he was survived by children, no names being given.

In 1832, the soldier stated that he had a cousin named William Young who sometimes past had lived in the western part of Tennessee, about two hundred miles distant.
