Callahan County 3 Feb

On this 15th day of October 1833 personally appeared
in open Court before the Justices of the Callahan County Court now
sitting John Dean a resident of the said County aged 42 years
and upwards who being first duly sworn according to law doth
upon his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain
the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832

That he entered the service of the United States under the fol-
-lowing named officers and served as herein stated that is to say
being a resident of Bedford County in the State of Pennsylvania
he did in the month of March in the year 1779 as well as he remem-
-bers enter the service of the United States as a private volunteer soldier
in the Company of Capt. Shaver and in the Regiment of Col. John
Piper. He states that the country was a frontier one and was
-divided was upon the waters of the Susquehanna river that it was much
troubled by the Indians and it required the whole of the able bodied
men in that quarter to guard the frontier. He states that
his said Company at the house of their said Captain in Bedford
County Penn. and was marched by him a few miles to the vicinity
of the lead mines upon Susquehanna (which were then worked) and
there they built a small fort. He states that he remained in said
fort as a part of the garrison thereof except when he was out
on scouting parties against the Indians until the early part of
the month of December following constituting a period of not
less than nine months during all which time he served faithfully.
He states that he does not recollect whether his said entry into
the service was for a definite period or not but he recollects
that he continued to serve under the said engagement a period
of not less than nine months.

He further states and declares that in the month of Febru-
-ary in the year 1780 as well as he remembers he again entered
the service of the United States as a private volunteer soldier in
the Company of Capt. Samuel Thompson under Col. John Piper
that he re-embarked with his Company at the fort at the lead
mines on Susquehanna River in the said County of Bedford where he

was still living and that he and his said Company were kept stationed at the said fort as a ~~part~~ garrison therefor and guard for the mines which were then being worked in order to furnish the Army with lead that he continued faithfully employed at the said fort as a part of its garrison from the said time of his entry into the service till the latter part of the month of November following embracing a period of nine months which he did actually and faithfully serve during the said year 1780 under his abovementioned engagement. He states that he engaged again without any definite period being fixed as the term of his engagement the times were so difficult and dangerous that it required the entire interest and caution of all that were able to protect & defend the Country -

He further states and declares that in the year 1781 the Indians did not give much trouble to the settlement and during the course of that year he performed but little service. But he further states and declares that in the year 1782 the Indians were more troublesome than ever & he accordingly in the month of March of that year (1782) again entered the service of the United States as a private volunteer soldier in the Company of Capt. Samuel Thompson that he again met his Company at the fort at the lead mines & was there again stationed as a part of the garrison therefor and to guard the lead mines - He states that during this term of service he recollects that he was one of a party sent by his said Capt. from the fort at the lead mines to assist in the defense of a small fort not many miles distant and which was attacked as it was understood by one Simon Girty at the head of about ninety Indians. That before this declaration and comrades reached the place the enemy had decamped and having first taken the fort and killed ten out of twelve of the garrison - that he and the party with which he was buried the dead & pursued the savages but could not overtake them - He states also that he was during the year 1782 on various other parties and was engaged in much active service being frequently sent out from the said fort upon expeditions of the Indians - He states that he continued

engage in the said fort as a part of its garrison ~~and upon~~
scouting parties as abovenamed from the said period of his
entry into the service in March 1782 until sometime in the
month of December following embracing the full period of
nine months during the ~~whole of which~~ ^{whole of which} time he served faithfully
and actively -

He states and declares that from the great lapse of time which
has passed since his service was performed it is impossible for
him to recollect the minute circumstances of it. But he knows that
he did not serve less than two months during the war of
the revolution ^{as a private volunteer soldier} and for that service he claims a pension -

He states that he has no documentary evidence and that he knows
of no person whose testimony he can procure who can testify to his
service

He hereby relinquishes any claims whatever to a pension
or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not
on the Pension Roll of the agency of any State

1st Where and in what year were you born?

Answer I was born in the State of Maryland in the year 1763

2^d Have you any record of your age and if so where is it?

Answer I have ~~at home~~ ^{in my file} now

3^d Where were you living when called into service where have
you lived since the Revolutionary war and where do you now
live?

Answer I lived in Bedford County Pennsylvania when I was
called into the service and there remained until 1810 when I
moved to the place on which I now live in Gallatin County Ky
and upon which I have continued to live ever since

4th How were you called into service were you drafted; did you

volunteer or were you a substitute? and if a substitute for whom
Answer I volunteered -

6th State the names of some of the regular officers who were with the
troops where you served; such Continental and militia regiments
as you can recollect and the general circumstances of your service

Answer - There was no regular officer with the troops where I served
~~that I know of or can state about~~
Nor was there any Continental or militia regiments there except

the one to which I belonged and that was commanded by Col
John Pipen - My services were performed on the frontier against
the Indians and I was but seldom with any other company
than the one to which I belonged - My first service was performed

in 1779 under Capt. Haven - My other services were performed
under Capt. Thompson. Col. Pipen had as I understood
the command and control of the troops in that quarter and
I entered the service upon call from him tho' I did not often
see him whilst I was actually in the service -

8th Did you ever receive a discharge from the service, and
if so by whom was it given and what has become of it?

Answer I do not recollect to have rec^d any discharge in writing
9th State the names of persons to whom you are known

in your present neighbourhood and who can testify as to
your character for veracity and their belief of your service
as a soldier of the revolution

ing to Law doth on her oath make the following declaration in order to
obtain the benefit of the provisions made by the act of Congress passed
7th July 1838 entitled an act granting half pay and pensions to certain
widows that she is the widow of John Dean who was a private in the
army of the Revolution as she has been informed and always believed
that she cannot speak confidentially as to the company or Regiment he
belonged to but she has often heard him say he was in the Revolutionary
War, her memory does not enable her to speak with any precision
as to the particular services of the said John Dean and for them she
must refer to the papers and proof upon which he obtained his pen-
sion, she furthermore declares that she was married to the said John
Dean on the second day of January seventeen hundred and eighty
five and that her husband the afore said John Dean died on the
fifth day of March Eighteen hundred and forty one that she was not
married to him prior to his leaving the service but the marriage
took place previous to the first of January seventeen hundred
and ninety four (to wit, at the time above stated)

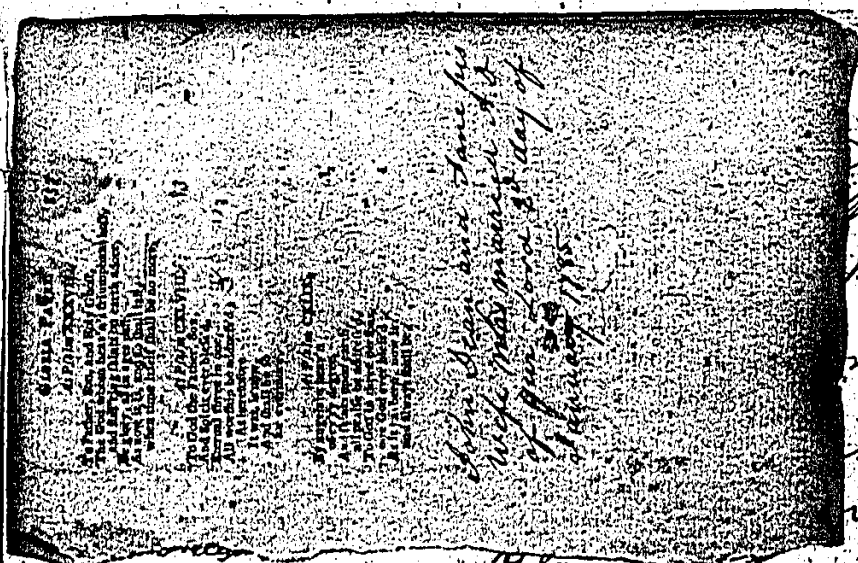

on the 3rd day of January 1785 and from that time has lived
a near neighbour to the said John and Jane Dean up to the
death of John Dean which took place on the 5th day of March
1841 She did not see the Marriage but of that she has not
a doubt She further states that John Dean drew a pension
for sometime prior to his death - and that Jane Dean
is still his widow and living in the said County of
Carroll and State of Kentucky Eleanor Haines
