that her father was in his lifetime a pensioner of the United
States at the rate of eight dollars per month and that she
died on the 15th day of January 1842 and that her mother
is still living and is a widow. She further states that
from the best information she was born in March 1790
and will be 55 years old next March. That she had
two brothers and ^{one} sister older than herself - she being
that from her earliest recollection her parents lived
together in the marriage relation up to the time of
his death - She further states that in years past
there was in the family a pocket Bible in which there
was a register of the births of all her parents children
that she had reason to believe that David Distick her
eldest brother took the said Book with him when he went
to Norway some 4 or 10 years ago. That her said brother has
been dead about seven years

Daniel Hay a credible witness being duly sworn deposes and
says that in the month of January last he addressed a
letter to the Clerk of Orange County Court, North
Carolina, requesting to be informed whether the records
of the office afforded evidence of the marriage of
David Distick with Agnes Lypson which should
have taken place about the year 1843. That he
enclosed for his fee a \$2 Virginia bill, and paid the
postage, and that he has never received an answer
that he had previously written to the Clerk of the same
County for similar information and received no
answer that on being informed that there was

probably to be found in Norway Territory, a register of the
births of the children of David and Agnes Fairbank, which
was taken there some 3 or 4 years ago by David's then
eldest son who has since died. He addressed a letter
to the two sons of said David (in part) the purpose being
to request information whether there was such a book containing
a register within their knowledge, which letter was
mailed last January and that he has never received
an answer.

Be it known that on the 26th day of March 1845 before the Subscriber a Justice of the peace in and for the County aforesaid personally appeared Greenbury Driskill a credible witness and being sworn according to law, makes the following statement that he is the youngest son of David and Agnes Driskill that his Father was in his lifetime a pensioner of the United States at the rate of Eight dollars a month, and died on the day of 184 and that his Mother is yet living and is a Widow. He further states that in former years there was a Bible in which was registered the births of all the children of his parents, and that from information to be relied on the said Bible was taken to Iowa Territory by his oldest Brother, David Driskill who removed there some eight or ten years ago, and died (as he is informed) soon afterwards.

He further states, on receiving information from Mr Daniel Hay, that it would be necessary to procure the said Bible for the purpose of establishing the marriage of his parents, he wrote to his Nephew in Iowa, and finally went himself about one month ago, near 200 miles, to Iowa, and from all the enquiry, he could make, the said Bible has not been seen since the death of his said Brother David. deponent further states that he has every reason to believe that his parents were lawfully joined in marriage in North Carolina, as early as 1783. Said John Owen states that in former years he frequently
saw the Bible with the family register, alluded to in the affidavit
of Greenberry Driskill - then a very old book.
He also states that David Driskill had his kitchen burnt
not long before his death, with a considerable amount of his
effects, and he thinks it likely that the said Bible was
then finally destroyed.

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War record of David Driskill of North Carolina, a pensioner, also the record of Charles Smith of Loudon County, Virginia.

Because of the great demand for Revolutionary War data and the limited clerical force available for furnishing such data, it is not possible to comply in full with such request pertaining to soldiers of that war. The record of David Driskill is furnished herewith as found in pension claim, W. 23374, based upon his service in the Revolutionary War. The family used the spelling Driskill.

David Driskill enlisted in Orange County, North Carolina, in the summer or fall of 1777, served as private in Captain Vandy's and Benjamin Coleman's companies, Colonel Clark's and Patton's North Carolina regiments, was in the battles of Monmouth and Stony Point and was discharged at the termination of service of three years.

He was allowed pension on his application executed November 15, 1819, at which time he was a resident of Gallatin County, Kentucky; he was then fifty-six years of age. The date and place of his birth and the names of his parents are not shown. In 1823, the soldier was living in Henry County, Kentucky, and stated that he had one child living with him, aged thirteen years, named George. In 1841, David Driskill had moved from Kentucky to Montgomery County, Illinois, to live with his youngest son, Greenbury Driskill, who moved with him to that state.

The soldier died January 18, 1843 in Montgomery County, Illinois.

David Driskill married December 11, 1783 near Hillsboro, North Carolina, Agnes Green; the date and place of her birth and the names of her parents are not shown.

Agnes Driskill, the soldier's widow, was allowed pension on her application executed January 10, 1844, at which time she resided in Montgomery County, Illinois; she was then eighty years of age. In 1845, she lived with her son, Green Bury Driskill, in Montgomery County, Illinois.

The following children of the soldier are referred to: Davis, the oldest son, moved to Iowa Territory about 1834 or 1836 and died there about 1837; Timothy Driskill, born about 1788 and made affidavit in Springfield, Sangamon County, Illinois, in 1844; Nancy Shields or Sholds, the fourth child, born in March 1790, made affidavit in Montgomery County, Illinois, in 1844, her husband's name not given; Sarah, the sixth child, born January 15, 1794, married about 1817, John Owen, who was born April 16, 1797, both living in 1845, when said John Owen made affidavit in behalf of the soldier's widow, Agnes Driskill; and Green Bury, the youngest son.

In 1844, Jane Driskill, soldier's daughter-in-law, made affidavit in support of Agnes Driskill's claim for pension, in Montgomery County, Illinois; the name of her husband was not designated.

John Owen and his wife, Sarah, had children, names not stated.

Two grandsons of the soldier, sons of Davis Driskill, were referred to in 1844 as residents of Iowa; the name of only one is shown, that of Miles, who resided then near West Point in that state.
