said County being a Court of Record of Proceedings according to the Consti-
tution of this State, Thomas Morrow, aged about seventy
years, resident in the State of Kentucky who being first
inquired according to law whether he had declared that he served in
the revolutionary war as follows: That he did not do during
that war in the year 1777 under Captain of Pennsylvania
Pennsylvania Regiment Pennsylvania Continentals being
injured by Gen. Plaque in the year 1780. disbanded by Gen.
M. Washington being then under the command of Captain William
Miller who was killed by Gen. Mifflin's forces at the
Battle of Red Bank in the year 1781. He died on the 24th day of August 1818 at a

passed on the 18 March 1818, making provision for persons who were

that I have not been and have not been in any manner seized
of any property or any parts thereof with intent thereby to diminish

Occupation at present, though at this time not able to labour having
almost lost the use of my left hand arm & shoulder from a
fall, no disability. The fact that I was from some misunderstanding
in drafting his first application his age is stated at 70 years and that he
was discharged at Philadelphia which as above stated was not the
fact. And will account for it in no way other than that having
no record of my age in fact the gentleman who drafted my
application my age when landed on the American shore who made
the statement at 70 years in recapitulating the losses & expenses
and the several changes which took place during my entire time
to my remuneration; I presume he from my informing him that my
company book was returned to Philadelphia and that I there received
my pay; mistook my expressions & understood me as saying I was
discharged in Philadelphia and from the implicit confidence by
me confided in the correctness of the gentleman who drafted my
application was killed into supposing from my being absent and
illiterate character paid not that attention I should have done.

Had I had been otherwise informed ⁱⁿ Thomas Morris
which having been subscribed & examined in presence of
the Court and Court being satisfied with the testimony of Thomas
Morris both by credible testimony and that the Schedule thereunto

I have allowed an affidavit
made for a pension made oath to a written statement
of fact, & in all an affidavit sworn to by James Lewis
with which was read to the Court. The Court
in its considerations have no reason to doubt the truth
of said statement & affidavit. Therefore the Court
by the Court that the same be certified to the Secretary
of War of the United States.

The Commissioner of Kentucky Casey Circuit
Court got Cert. of Pension that on the day
of his allowance aged 75 years personally appeared
at the Court and made oath that in the year 1777 he
entered as a private soldier in the Continental Establishment
against the Common Enemy for and during the war
under Captains & Colonels in the State of Pennsylvania
with Thomas' Regiment General Anthony
Wagner ^{in the Pennsylvania line} & he was in the Battle of Bran-
dywine Monmouth and the glorious Capture of
Corwallis and many skirmishes against the
Enemy. He further states that he faithfully
served out the full term of his enlistment and was
after the close of the war honorably discharged at
Philadelphia which discharge he has lost.

He further states that he is aged & infirmed & is
unable to support that he is in extreme indigent
circumstances and stands in need of the aid of the
Government for support and desires the same accord-
ing to the provisions of an Act of Congress of the
United States making provisions for Continental
officers & heirs of the same

poor and unable to labour and that he supports

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to your letters in regard to securing information relative to Thomas Morrow and Mathew Mac Dowall, soldiers of the Revolutionary War.

The records of that war have been searched and there is no claim for pension or bounty land on file based upon service of a Mathew (Matthew) Mac Dowall, and the record of only one Thomas Morrow has been found. His history is given below as found in his claim for pension. No claim for bounty land is on file on account of his service. The land to which you refer was possibly granted by the State of Pennsylvania.

For further information in regard to this Thomas Morrow, or another, who served in the Pennsylvania troops, it is suggested that you apply to The Librarian, Pennsylvania State Library, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania.

From the papers in the Revolutionary War claim for pension, S. 56176, it appears that Thomas Morrow enlisted in 1777 and served as a private in Captains A. McCollister's and William Wilson's companies, Colonel Harmer's Pennsylvania regiment, was in the battles of Brandywine, Monmouth and at the surrender of Cornwallis, and was discharged in 1783.

He was allowed pension on his application executed September 1818, while a resident of Casey County, Kentucky, aged about sixty-eight years. He died Aug. 20, 1830

There are no data as to family.

The Ohio State Lib. I found on old S. L. books that the State Lib. was located in Ohio. This was referred to in Mr. Morrow's letter. Inquiry was in Pa. & could not have been granted by U.S.

from A.B. & was not included in this letter to Mr. Morrow. I should have done so MAF

It is regretted that reply to your request has been delayed,
but the demand for Revolutionary War data is very great and the
clerical force available for furnishing such data is limited.
