Col Edward Stephens belonging to the 3rd  
Regiment of the Virginia line and that  
he continued to serve in said Corps until  
the service of the United States until the  
month of March 1781 when he was wounded  
back and discharged at the same  
place when he enlisted and that he was  
in the Battle of Brandywine Monmouth  
and the storming of Patuxent Hook and  
that he is in reduced circumstances and  
has no other evidence of his ~~country~~ <sup>country</sup> ~~service~~  
service except the affidavit accompanying  
this declaration

On this <sup>6<sup>th</sup></sup> day of September 1822  
I personally appear, in open court being a court of  
record for the best circuit court and clerked above  
said court being expressly made a court of record by the laws of  
said State Henry Carter aged fifty nine years, resident in  
the county of Owen and in said district, who being  
first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath,

declare that he served in the Revolutionary war as follows:

Be it Remembered that on this 11<sup>th</sup> day of Septe  
mber 1860 personally appeared before the Subscribers as  
Justices of the Peace in and for said County of Crown  
and one of the Justices of the Peace of the County of  
Crown a resident of the said County aged Eighty three  
years who being duly sworn according to Law made  
the following declaration in Oath to obtain the benefit  
of the act of Congress passed on the 7<sup>th</sup> day of July  
1838. She states that she is a resident of the  
County of Crown and State of Kentucky that she was  
born in Culpeper County Virginia on the \_\_\_\_\_ day  
of \_\_\_\_\_ 1768 as nearly as she can ascertain that her  
maiden name was Nancy Edwards. She further states  
that she was only and legally married to Henry Carter  
late of Crown County Kentucky deceased on the 14<sup>th</sup> day  
of December 1785 at the home of a Mr. \_\_\_\_\_ in the  
County of Culpeper and State of Virginia that  
she was the officiating clergyman. She further  
states that her said husband had served as a  
Soldier in the War of the Revolution and prior to his  
death and during his residence in Crown County Kentucky  
he was placed on the pension roll of the United  
States and was a Revolutionary Soldier and she refers to his  
pension papers now on file in the pension office  
and the accompanying Certificate of her deceased hus-  
band as evidence of the fact she not leaving it in  
her power at this time to produce any other of further  
evidence of his service. She further states that her  
said husband died on the 20<sup>th</sup> day of May 1860  
in the County of \_\_\_\_\_ that she has not mar-  
ried since his death and she remains his widow  
she also states that from her age and she quotes

The report of Andrew Carter taken in Rowan County  
Kentucky on the 11th day of September 1848 in support  
of Nancy Carter's application to the Grand Jurors  
for the benefit of a pension she after being duly  
sworn to there is a circumstance of which I certify  
that she is now about forty four years of  
age and there has been some of the said Nancy Carter  
The further states that Polly Bibb late Polly Carter  
is now a

residents of the State of Indiana that she is now  
about fifty eight or fifty nine years of age. He further  
states that his deceased further was a Revolutionary  
war soldier and that he died in Owen County Kentucky  
about the 1st of May last and that Nancy Carter  
is his widow and that she has not married since  
his death and that she now resides in Owen  
County Kentucky. He further states that the said  
Nancy Carter is a credible person and that her state-  
ments are entitled to full credit. He further states  
that the family record of this age has been preserved  
in house of a Mr. Teaburn in Culpeper County Virginia.

Also the deposition of Miller Bates taken in  
Owen County Kentucky on the 1st day of September  
1810. in support of Nancy Carter applications to the  
War department for a Pension. He states that  
he is a resident of Owen County Kentucky and  
is now about fifty years of age and became ac-  
quainted with the said Nancy Carter about twenty  
one or twenty two years ago and has lived a near  
neighbor to Nancy Carter for that length of time.  
He further states that Nancy Carter the wife  
of the said Nancy Carter was a Revolutionary war  
soldier at the time of his death and that he died  
in May last the age of three months he was not  
now present. He further states that Nancy Carter is  
the widow of the said Nancy Carter deceased and  
that she has not married since his death that  
she now resides in Owen County Kentucky.  
He further states she is a credible person  
and that her statements are entitled to



Kentucky Owen County Court do  
April Term 1844

On motion of James W. Keason letters of administration  
is granted him in the estate of Nancy Carter  
deceased. Whereupon said Keason took the  
oaths required by law, and entered into bonds  
with Thomas A. Remondan his Security in the  
penalty of \$800. Conditioned according to law

And afterwards at a Court held for the  
County aforesaid at their April Term 1844 the  
following Order was made to wit

Ordered that it be Certified that it was  
this day satisfactorily proved in Open Court by the  
testimony of Andrew Bates and George Vallan-  
digham who are Credible persons, that Henry  
Carter late of Owen County Ky; who was a residen-  
tial pensioner of the United States departed  
this life on the 23<sup>d</sup> day of May 1843 leaving his  
Widow Nancy Carter who survived him, and Henry  
Carter Andrew Carter Mary Carter who has married  
John Bibb Elizabeth Carter Bessie Seave wife of  
Moses Seave Lucinda Bates wife of John Bates  
Matilda Sanders wife of Robert Sanders his Child  
seen that his said Widow Nancy Carter remained  
his Widow until the period of his death which  
event happened on the 23<sup>d</sup> day of May 1843  
and that the above named Children of Henry  
Carter were Children of the said Henry Carter  
and that they are the only Children of the  
said Henry Carter and Henry Carter deceased  
and their only Children being they further certify  
that James W. Keason did on the 23<sup>d</sup> day of the  
April Term 1844 of this Court duly administer  
upon the estate of the said Nancy Carter de-

Madam:

I have to advise you that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim W. 8586 it appears that Henry Carter entered the service in Culpeper County, Virginia in January 1777 in Captain John Gillison's Company in the regiment commanded by Colonel Edward Stephens. He served as a private in the army until March 1781; was in the battles of Brandywine, Monmouth and the storming of Paulus Hook.

Pension was allowed upon his application executed November 5, 1818 while a resident of Gallatin County, Kentucky aged sixty-seven years. In 1820 he was living in Owen County, Kentucky, where he died May 23, 1843.

Soldier married December 24, <sup>1783</sup> 1833 in Culpeper County, Virginia, Nancy Edwards born in 1760 in said county and resident there at date of marriage.

The following children received pension due their

mother, as the widow of Henry Carter, upon her application executed September 4, 1843 while living in Owen County, Kentucky. She died November 15, 1844.

Children of Henry and Nancy Carter:

Henry.

Andrew, aged 44 years in 1843.

Mary or Polly, aged 58 or 59 years in 1843, married John Bibb.

Dicie, married Moses Devore.

Lucinda, married John Bates.

In 1820 Henry Carter the soldier referred to his grandson Jefferson Carter aged eight years, and Kitty Carter his granddaughter aged four years, then living with him in Owen County, Kentucky. There is no further data as to family.
