Acts March, 18, 1818
and May 1, 1820.

Fourth Judicial District State of Kentucky etc
Ballard County and Circuit Court.

On this 24th day of August in the Year of Our Lord
One thousand eight hundred and thirty seven per
sonally appeared in Open Court a Circuit Court
for the County aforesaid being a Court of record of
unlimited Jurisdiction in point of amount and
Proceeding according to the Course of Common Law
with power to find and imprison. — Henry Eaton
resident of Ballard County aged upwards of eighty eight
Years, who being first duly sworn according to law
doth and his Oath make the following Declaration
In Order to obtain the provisions made by the Act
of Congress of the 18th day of March 1818. And on the
1st day May 1820. That the said Henry Eaton intituled
at Philadelphia in the State of Pennsylvania for three Years
ordaining the year as a private on the day of in the Year 177—
the precise time not now recollect in the Company commanded
by Captain John McComand the Regiment Commanded by
Col William Butler and served as a Reciting Sergeant in
the line of the State of Pennsylvania and the Continental
Establishment. That he continued to serve in said Corps until
the close of the year, when he was honorably discharged
at Philadelphia, to the said Eaton states that he was in
the following Battles viz: Germantown, Brandywine, Pele
where he was wounded in the arm, taking off Stony Point
the Battle of Princeton, and the Battle of Monmouth
and York Town in Virginia at the Surrender of Lord Cornwallis,
and afterwards passed to the Southern Army in the
Regiment Commanded by Col Warren as Lieut by Line
that he was a Reliant Citizen of the United States on the 18th
day of March in the Year 1818. and that he has not since
had time by gift, Sale, or in any manner disposed of
my property or any part thereof with intent thereby to

diminished it, so as to bring myself within the provisions of
An Act of Congress intitled An act to provide for certain
Persons engaged in the land & naval service of the
United States in the revolutionary war, passed the 18th
day of March 1818. And that I have not, nor has any
Person for me any property or securities, contracts
or debts due to me have any income whatever—
And I further on my oath state that I had no prop-
erty, or securities contracts, or debts due to me on the
18th day of March 1818, but my situation for some time
previous thereto, was as is now is, of a poor old man: I the
said Henry Eaton am by trade a Currier, but from the
infirmities of age have not for many years been able to
work, I have no wife nor child or children—am
old and unable to work, have lived for thirteen
years with Thomas Crook, I stand in need of the
aid of my Country for a comfortable support in the
cause of my not making an earlier application, may
the neglect of the agents first employed, loss of
my discharge, thereby, and my poverty, as I had no
means to pay a Lawyer to make the application for me
and that he has no knowledge of any person living
by whom he could prove the services rendered
to his County

My dear Mr. Eaton:

Reference is made to your letter of June 10, in which you request, in behalf of your brother, Mr. Henry B. Eaton, of Edwardsville, Illinois, the Revolutionary War record of your great-great-grandfather, Henry or Harry Eaton who, you state, was born in Wales, April 7, 1750, served as ensign in the Revolutionary War in Greene's Division on a southern campaign, and died about the year, 1788, while still in service.

A careful search of the Revolutionary War records of this office has been made and no claim for pension or bounty land based upon service in that war of a Henry or Harry Eaton, under any spelling, which was identical with your description of that soldier. You are furnished herein the record of the only soldier named Henry Eaton found in the Revolutionary War records of this office. The data therein were obtained from pension claim, S. 53909, based upon his service in that war.

The date and place of birth of Henry Eaton and names of his parents are not shown.

Henry Eaton enlisted at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, date not stated, served as recruiting sergeant in Captain John McGowen's company, Colonel William Butler's Pennsylvania regiment, was in the battles of Princeton, Brandywine, Paoli in which he received a wound in his arm, the battles of Germantown, Monmouth, Stony Point, and Yorktown, Virginia, where Cornwallis surrendered, went on a southern campaign under General Harmer and served to the close of the war.

The soldier was allowed pension on his application executed September 4, 1837, at which time he was aged "upwards of eighty-eight years" and stated that he then had no wife or children. He was living most of the time with one Thomas Noel in Gallatin County, Kentucky, who testified that Henry Eaton had no relatives. The soldier died June 7, 1839.

If your brother desires information relative to the date of last payment of pension and name and address of the person paid in the case of Henry Eaton, he should write to the Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, Records Division, this city, and cite the following data: Henry Eaton, certificate #1811, issued September 20, 1937, rate, 68 per month, commended September 6, 1857, Act of March 10, 1860, and May 1, 1860, Kentucky Agency.
