that he the said Thomas Haddin
enlisted in the County of Hanover
in the State of Virginia in the
month of January 1779 in the Company
commanded by Capt Robert Barrett
belonging to the Virginia Regiment
commanded by Col Francis Taylor
to the Virginia line and that he
continued to serve in said Company or
the service of the United States the
month of August 1781 when he was
discharged at Winchester in Virginia
by Col Francis Taylor. This Applicant
was in the Battle during term of
service - and he further states that
he in reduced circumstances and stands
in need of the assistance of his

country for support (and that he
has no other evidence of his true
services than accompanying this

This day Thomas Hardin appears in open court and having been first sworn made a declaration and statement in writing as follows to wit. 4th Judicial District of Kentucky to wit. On this day twelfth day of October 1820 personally appeared in open court being a Court of record of unlimited jurisdiction for the county and circuit aforesaid. Thomas Hardin aged at this 60 years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the pension made by the acts of Congress of the 18 March 1818 and the first May 1820 that he the said Thomas Hardin enlisted in the month of February 1778 in the company commanded by Capt Robert Parritt in the Regt commanded by Col Francis Taylor in the line of the State of Virginia in the continental establishment that he continued to serve in said corps until the month of August 1781 when he was discharged from the said service in Winchester in the State of Virginia and that he was in no battles during his time of service and that he has no other evidence

of his said business now in his except the
 disposition of Martin Hawkins that accompanied
 his first declaration who has since deceased
 and which he sends with this. And in pursuance
 of the act of Congress of the first May 1870 I
 do solemnly swear that I was a resident
 citizen of the United States on the 18th of March
 1818 and that I had not since that time
 by gift sale or in any manner disposed of my
 property or any part thereof with intent thereby
 to diminish it as to bring myself within
 the provisions of the act of Congress entitled
 an act to provide for certain persons engaged
 in the land and naval service of the U^{ts} States
 during the Revolutionary war. passed on the 18th
 day of March 1818 and that I had not now
 nor any person in trust for me any property
 by or securities debts or contracts due to me
 nor have I any income other what is con-
 tained in the Schedule hereto annexed and
 by me subscribed

 ten years Old stout but subject to fits. 6th a
 son 7 years Old, his wife very infirm &
 unable to assist him in supporting his fam-

to certain widows to wit that she is the widow of Thomas Warden deceased
late of the said County of Trimble and who was a Soldier in the Revolution-
-ary ^{war} and declarant thinks was a Sergeant and belonged to the Virginia Conti-
-nental Line of troops if she is not mistaken, he however resided in
the State of Virginia when he entered the service and served several years
-13 and Colonel Charles H. Mabrey was one of his Colonels and he (her
said husband) on account of his said service was granted a Pension at
-20 twenty years ago at the rate of ~~(\$8.00)~~ \$8.00 per month and that
he consents to receive the same during his life - She further declares
that her said husband resided in ~~the~~ ^{the} State of Virginia when he en-
-25 tered the service if she is not mistaken - She further declares that she has
no documentary evidence in favor of her claim except a leaf from
her Testament which she herewith files and which contain entries
in the said will of her husband showing the day of the marriage of her &
her said husband and the birth of their first children - She further de-
-30 clares that she is unable to state the names of the whole number of offi-
-cers under whom the service of her said husband in said Army was performed
and will for them names as well as the duration of his service and such
other facts as are necessary in the investigation of her claim refer to the
evidence composing the matter of her application for the said Pension
-35 made by him - She further declares that she was married to the aforesaid
Thomas Warden on the 22nd day of November in the year Nineteen and eight
-40 July eight (1788) that her said husband died on the 27th day of January

1842. That she was not married to him prior to his leaving the
service but the marriage took place previous to the first day of
January 1844 (being) at the time above stated.
Sworn to and subscribed before me on
the day and year aforesaid.

And I the Just Subscribed Magistrate hereby certify that the above
declarant is personally known to me, and I know that she is the
widow of Thomas Warren deceased late of the said County of
Lincoln and who was a Revolutionary Pensioner of the United Sta-
tes and who died on the 27th day of January 1843. And I
also certify that the physical or disabilities which prevent the for-
going declarant from appearing in Open Court are as fol-
lowing, that she is by want of physical strength prevented from
leaving her room and confinement and that an attempt
to carry her to Court the distance of twelve miles would
terminate her life - She is a lady of respectability and
all her statements entitled to full credit. In testimony whereof
I have hereunto subscribed my name this the 26th day of July 1843.

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter of September 23, 1932, requesting information in regard to Thomas Hardin and Benjamin Mann, soldiers of the Revolution.

The data furnished herein were obtained from papers on file in the pension claim, W. 8916, based upon the military service of Thomas Hardin.

While living in Hanover County, Virginia, he enlisted in January, 1779, and served as private in Captain Robert Barrett's Company in Colonel Francis Taylor's Virginia Regiment and was discharged in August, 1781.

He was allowed pension on his application executed August 26, 1819, at which time he was fifty-nine years of age and was living in Gallatin County, Kentucky.

He died January 27, 1842, in Trimble County, Kentucky.

The soldier married November 22, 1788, Ann, her maiden name not given.

She was allowed pension on her application executed July 26, 1843, at which time she was seventy-four years of age and was living in Trimble County, Kentucky.

In 1820 the soldier stated that he had the following children living with him, names not given: a daughter, aged nineteen years; a son, aged seventeen years; a daughter, aged fourteen years; a son, aged ten years; a daughter, aged ten years; a son, aged five years.

A family record furnished by the widow shows the following children of Thomas and Ann Hardin:

The data furnished herein were obtained from papers on file in the pension claim, S. 36067, based upon the military service of Benjamin Mann.

He enlisted in Louisa County, Virginia, in April or May, 1781, and served eighteen months as private in Captain Robert Woodson's Company in Colonels Febiger's and Gaskins' Virginia Regiment and was in the battle of Yorktown.

He was allowed pension on his application executed June 16, 1818, at which time he was living in Campbell County, Kentucky, and was sixty-eight years of age.

In 1820 the soldier's wife (name not stated) was sixty-eight years of age. In 1822 he referred to his children but did not give their names and in 1825 he referred to a daughter. There are no further data relative to the soldier's family.
