It is known that on this 22^d day of October 1833
personally appeared before J. Blunt - a Justice of the peace
in and for Ballast County Kentucky, and one of the Judges of the
Ballast County Court Thomas Staves a resident of the said
County of Ballast and State of Kentucky aged nearly ninety
years who from bodily infirmity is unable to attend the proper
Court to make his declarations and who being first duly sworn
according to law doth upon his oath make the following de-
clarations in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress
passed June 7th 1832

That he entered the service of the United States under the
following named officers and served as herein stated that is
to say being a resident of Caroline County in the State of Virginia
he did on the - day of November 1776 he entered the service
of the United States as a Captain of a Militia company at the
call and under the command of Col Anthony Thorne. He states
that this tour was for three months and his company was com-
posed of men drafted for that period - that his company
was disbanded at their muster ground in said County and by
the order of Col. Thorne he marched his said company from
their said place of rendezvous to Bulls Church in Caroline
County Virginia where there was a quantity of Ammunition
and other public stores deposited and he was there kept
stationed by with his said company by the order of his said
Colo: to guard the said stores during the whole period of his
~~service~~ tour which he served out fully & faithfully as Captain
as aforesaid and at the termination thereof he was relieved
by another company and he discharged his company & returned
home - He states that just before the war broke out he had
been commissioned a Lieutenant by Governor DuRoiro the
British Governor of Virginia - that he did not receive any
commission from the American Authorities - that he had contin-
ued to act as a lieutenant of his company until he was
raised to the command thereof by Col. Thorne

He further states that in the early part of the month of April

in the year 1776. as well as he remembers he again entered the service of the United States as ~~Private~~ Captain of a Militia Company upon the call of Colonel Thorn upon another tour of ~~three~~ months - that his company was called out for that period and he rendezvoused with three and nine other companies of Militia under Colo: Thorn at Head Lynch's Tavern in the said County of Caroline Virginia - That he was marched together with the other troops from this said place of Rindley - void to Williamsburg Virginia and that he and his said Company together with others were there kept stationed as a garrison for that place during the whole period of his said tour and at the termination thereof he having fully and faithfully served out the same as Captain as abovenamed he was discharged by his Colo: & returned home

He further states and declares that in the month of July 1777 as well as he remembers he again entered the service of the United States as Captain of a Militia Company which was called out by Col. Thorn upon a tour of three months - that he rendezvoused with his company at ^a Todd's Tavern in Caroline County Virginia and by the order and direction of his said Colonel he marched his said Company to the Potomac near to Col. Stith's residence at a place called the Round house and was there kept stationed as a guard to the Coast during his said tour - that his company upon this occasion acted separately - that the British were troublesome in the vicinity of the large water courses and were making frequent incursions into the Country and doing much mischief - that at the termination of his said tour having fully and faithfully served out the same he discharged his company and returned home -

He further states and declares that in the month of February in the year 1779 as well as he remembers he again entered the service of the United States a Captain of a Militia Company called out by Col. Anthony Thorn upon a tour of three months and served as such during the whole of his tour - that he rendezvoused with his company at Stillman's Tavern in Caroline County Virginia - that nine other Companies also rendezvoused at

the same time & place and came under the command of Colo.
from the whole of which including this declarant and Company
was marched by their said Colo. to Newbridge Louisa County
Virginia at which place the said Regiment joined a large body
of troops - that at the said place he this declarant was taken
sick and was permitted to remain at said point with his com-
-pany as a guard & garrison thereof until his term expired at
the termination of which he was discharged his Company and
returned home

He further states and declares that in the month of
September in the year 1780 as well as he remembers he again
entered the Service of the United States a Captain of a Militia
Company which was called out by Col. Lowry to guard a par-
-cel of prisoners which who had been taken in the State of North
Carolina and had been brought to Virginia under the command of Captain
James Spenser - that he rendezvoused with his said Company
at the Court house in Caroline County Va and by the order
of his said Colo. took the said prisoners in charge they being
at the said place of Rendezvous and conducted them to their
-chester Virginia he and his said Company acting as a guard
for them - that the time for which his said Company was
called out was three months that he continued with said com-
-pany at Winchester as a guard for the said prisoners until
their term of service expired and the said prisoners being then
exchanged he marched his said Company back to Caroline
County and there discharged them

He states that he has no documentary evidence and that
he knows of no person whose testimony he can procure who
can testify to his Service except Joseph Jones of Owen County
Ky. who was a near neighbor of his during the war

He states hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pen-
-sion or annuity except the present and declares that his name
is not on the Pension roll of the agency of any State

Interrogatories put to the said applicant by the said Justice of the peace

1st Where and in what year were you born

Answer I was born in Essex County Va. in the year 1744

2^d Have you any records of your age and if so where is it?

Answer I have at home.

3^d Where were you living when called into service, where have you lived since the revolutionary war, and where do you now live

Answer I lived in Gardners County Va. when I was called into service where I continued to live till 1788 and then moved to Hayette County Gt. & from thence to Woodford County Gt. & from thence to South County Gt. & from thence in about 1808 I moved to Callatus County Gt. where I have continued to live ever since.

4th How were you called into service; were you drafted did you volunteer, or were you a substitute and if a substitute for whom.

Answer I took my regular tour as a captain and looked upon myself as being drafted.

5th State the names of some of the regular officers who were with the troops where you served such as colonels and militia Regiment as you can recollect and the general circumstances of your service

Answer I recollect Capt. Washington & Mayne - also Capt. Williams and Col. Horn & Lowrey & Matthews. upon my first tour I was stationed with my company at Bulls Church as a guard for some public stores and there remained during my tour - upon my second tour I was stationed at Williamsburg Va. during the whole period of it which was six months - upon my third tour I was stationed with my company at the round house on the Potomac River - upon my fourth tour I was taken sick whilst on the march at Brooksbridge in Louisa County Va. & was thus detailed with my company to remain at that point and guard some public property - upon my fifth tour I guarded some prisoners from Gardners County to Winchester Va. & there kept stationed with my company till the expiration of my term of service.

6th Did you ever receive a Commission, and if so by whom was it signed and what has become of it?

Answer I never received any Commission during the Revolution - a while before the war I purchased Gov. Dunmore's Commission

a Lieutenant but as soon as the war commenced I was raised to the
Command of my Company by my Colo.

I do state the names of persons to whom you are showing your
present neighbourhood and who can testify as to your character
for veracity and their belief of your service as a soldier of an officer
of the revolution

Answer I will name Benjamin Tiller & James Furnish

Kentucky and James Furnish - residing in the same county
and that both certify that we are well acquainted with
Thomas Haines who has subscribed and sworn to the above
declaration that we believe him to be 39 years of age and
upward that he is reputed and believed in the neighbourhood
where he resides to have been an officer & soldier of the revolu-
tion and that we concur in that opinion - we also certify
that he is so infirm in body that he cannot attend court

tify that the said Tho. Haines from infirmity of body can

Lewis, Judge of the County Court of the aforesaid County of Gallatin, State of Kentucky, a resident of said County of Gallatin, State of Kentucky, aged thirty years, who being duly sworn according to law doth make the following declaration



~~and doth certify that the benefit of the provisions made~~

said office was applied to certain widows and
Orphans that the said widows of Thos. Haines deceased
who was a resident in said County and died a free
and single man, the said widow does not recollect
the said Haines resided in the aforesaid County of
Gallatin State of Ky at the time he died his pension
the said pension was drawn at the agency at Lexington
was well as her money was her

She further states that she was married to the said
Thos. Haines on the 24th of February 1807. The precise day of the
month she does not recollect and there is no record
evidence to be found. She states her husband the aforesaid
said Thos. Haines died on the 24th day of November
in the year 1831 that she was married to him at the
time above stated she further saith that she
was that she was a widow at the passage of the
aforesaid act and is still a widow and has never been
married since the death of said Thos. Haines her late husband
and that she has not before since the passage said act
applied for a pension

Void otherwise in force.
