I John Trimble Judge of
the Circuit Court for Boone County in the State aforesaid
do hereby Certify that Jeremiah Haden came personal
before me and made Oath that he is now aged about
fifty five years, and is a resident of the said County
of Boone, and a Citizen of the United States. That
he served in the Army of the United States, in the war
of the Revolution, against the King of Great Britain
for upwards of five years as a private Soldier.
That he entered in Capt. Lovel's Company, in Colonel
Haw's Regiment on the 4th day of July 1778, to serve
during the war: That he belonged to the Virginia Con-
tinental establishment. He further made Oath
that the first winter after his enlistment he was stationed
at Brudenburgh, in the spring he was moved to Christen-
field Barracks in Virginia, there he was attached to Colo-
nel Davis's Regiment, under General Stueben, Lovel still
being his Captain, and there remained until Faulstich's
light horse came to Petersburg, the Company to which
he belonged was then placed under General Mullenburg,
and that he was wounded in the battle fought at

Peterburg, after which ^{§ (2)} time he was again marched
to Chesterfield Barracks, from which place after
the British burnt a part of Richmond, Chesterfield
Court-house he was marched to the banks of James
River, where Stehman was defeated by a part of
Cromwell's Army, and from which place in the year
1780 he was marched to Roanoke: In 1781 he
was marched to Little York, and after the Siege he
volunteered in Colo. Harrison's first Virginia Regi-
ment of Artillery, Capt. Pothmann's Company,
and guarded the British prisoners to Winchester where
they remained until the close of the war, and
was discharged the 3rd day of July 1783. He fur-
ther swears that he had not his discharge at
this time and believes that he gave it up when
he received the last of his pay, and could not now
produce it, and that by reason of his reduced cir-
cumstances in life he stands in need of assistance
from his Country for support. He further stated
that he never had received any land, nor has
he had any pension allowed him by the Congress
of the United States and therefore relinquishes

all claim to any such prison which may
have been heretofore allowed him

I John Trimble Judge as aforesaid Do hereby
further Certify that Kelley Graves aged about
44 years who being by me duly sworn according
to Law made oath that she has been well
acquainted with the said Applicant ever since
the year 1783. That He came to her father's Home
Dressed in uniform & which she then
understood that he had just then been
Discharged ~~from~~ a Regular Soldier from the
Parracks near Winchester Virginia she further
stated that the said Jeremiah Haden was
then a cripple from the touch of a Horse as she
was then informed and continued from
the month of July untill October a cripple
That During his stay she has a perfect
Recollection of the many conversations passed
between said Applicant & her father of
his having been in the regular Service and
of his being in the different engagements &
that she well Recollects of hearing her father
say said Applicants Discharge as a Regular
Soldier & when the said Applicant was about
leaving her father to go home she well Recollects
at her father's said Applicant was about 18

trading for a horse (H) for which the said applicant
 was to give his land Certificates which he had
 obtained for his service as a Regular Soldier. She
 further states that said applicant ~~stated~~ after
 returned to his father & acted ~~as an~~ ~~agent~~
 overseer for her father that she always understood
 that he had ~~been a~~ Regular Soldier & from her
 long acquaintance which she has had of him &
 his general character as a man of truth she has no
 doubt as to the truth of his statement that she
 now lives a near neighbor to him ~~and~~ knows
 that he is in very indigent circumstances in life
 possessing but very little property & a
 family.

 and others that he was a Regular Soldier in
 the Revolution and that he lives a near
 neighbor to him & knows him to be in very indigent
 circumstances in life possessing but little property
 and a help less family - Very much affected with
 rheumatism

State of Kentucky, Boone Circuit Ct.

On this 15th day of August 1828 personally appeared
W. Osborn before the Court of records for the said
Circuit, and was constituted by act of the Legislature
of the State and being unlimited in point of jurisdiction
and keeping records of its proceedings, Jeremiah
Osborn resident in said County of Boone who being
first duly sworn according to law, do the said W. Osborn
declare that he served in the revolutionary war as fol-
low, to wit: That he was enlisted for the term of the
continuance of the war in the year 1778 in the Company
of Capt. Mrs. B. Lovely in the State of Virginia in the
Regiment commanded by Lord Stairs in the line of the
State of Virginia in the regular continental establish-
ment that he continued to serve during the term of
his enlistment till the close of the war when he was
discharged by Capt. Robinson & Col. Harrison of
the 1st Virginia Regt. of artillery, all which circum-
stances are detailed in his original declaration
which was taken on the 5th day of May 1818 upon
which a certificate of pension issued Number 13430
on which certificate he has drawn a pension, And
do solemnly swear that he was a resident citizen
of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818
that he has not since that time by gift sale or
in any manner disposed of his property or any part
thereof with intent thereby to diminish it, as to
being myself within the provisions of an act of
Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain
pensions engaged in the land & naval services of
the United States in the revolutionary war"
passed on the 18th day of March 1818 And that
I have not nor has any person in trust for me

any property or securities contracts or debts due
to me nor have I any income other than what is
contained in the Schedule hereto annexed & by me
subscribed is A Schedule of the property of
Jermiah Hayden two horses one 8 & the other 9
years old worth fifty Dollars each one cart worth
ten Dollars two sets of ploughs ~~to~~ the year for
each worth four Dollars each one plough worth
two Dollars and two worth seventy five cents
each one new and two old axes worth three
Dollars one Cow & calf worth ten Dollars one Cow
& calf worth ten Dollars one Ox & calf worth
ten Dollars two yearlings worth five Dollars
each four hogs worth four Dollars each one Sow
& pig worth four Dollars five chairs
worth two Dollars each seven common chairs
fifty cents each one set of knives & forks worth
one dollar & fifty cents one set of cups & saucers
worth seventy five cents two earthen dishes one dol
lar each one full set of plates worth seventy five
cents one kettle worth two Dollars two pots worth
one dollar each one Oven worth two Dollars
one skillet worth one dollar in all \$350
One debt due to me of thirty five Dollars & I
owe one hundred and thirty ^{two} Dollars I am a
farmer by occupation and rent land I have
four in family besides myself my wife aged
about 48 years & addicted to the consumption - a
boy named Jermiah aged 11 years Elizabeth Ann
a daughter aged 7 years Catharine aged 4 years
that he is aged & infirm & his family all others
in a helpless condition and that he is not ac-
tually able to support his family by hard labor
at his occupation

Declaration

In order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress of the 29th July 1848
On this eighth day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand
eight hundred and forty nine personally appeared in open Court
now sitting there Haden a resident of the State of Kentucky and in the
County of Gallatin and is aged twenty seven years who being first duly
sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declara-
tion in order to obtain the benefit of the provisions made by the act of
Congress passed 29th July 1848 She states that her late Husband
Jeremiah Haden who was a Soldier in the revolutionary war of in-
to the about his services and if my recollection serves me I have heard
him often say he enlisted for during the war went into the service
and served as a common Soldier to the close of the war which term
of service was about five years She cannot state the County in Vir-
ginia he lived in when he enlisted nor does she recollect the names of
the officers who commanded him nor can she positively say any
of the particular circumstances of his service, but has heard him say
he was at the battle at Little York but owing to loss of memory she is
not entirely certain about his services, but she above statement she
believes to be true according to the best of her recollection.
She further declares her late Husband Jeremiah Haden was a
prisoner of the United States for many years and continued a pen-
sioner to the day of his death at the rate of Ninety five dollars per
annum and that she drew the balance that was due him after
he died She further declares she was married to her late Hus-
band Jeremiah Haden on the twenty fifth day of July in the
year 1796 in Loudon County and State of Virginia. She further
states her late Husband Jeremiah Haden died on the eleventh
day of February in the year 1817 And that she was not
married to him prior to him leaving the service but the mar-
riage took place previous to the second day of January eight
hundred that is at the time above stated She further
swears she is now a widow and that she has never before made
an application for a Pension.
