State of Kentucky
Ballatin County 3rd set

On this 15 day of October 1833 personally appeared in open Court before the Justices of the Ballatin County Court Will
iam McDowell a resident of the said county of Ballatin and
State of Kentucky aged 73 years who being first duly sworn according
to law doth on his oath make the following declaration
in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June
7th 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the
following named officers and served as herein stated that is to say
being a resident of Loudon County Virginia he did on the day
of April in the year 1780 as well as he remembers enter the service
of the United States as a private volunteer soldier upon a
tour of three months in the company of Captain Beavers - that
he rendezvoused at Leesburg in the said County of Loudon Va.
And his said Company there came under the command of
Major Quarters - that he was marched from his said place of
Rendezvous to Williamsburg Va. and from thence to York and
from thence to Petersburg and from thence to Richmond Va and
was kept actively engaged in the service until the full expiration
of his said term of service and he was discharged and
returned home - He states that he does not recollect to have
been under any officer of higher grade than Major Quarters during
this tour and that no incident worthy of special notice
took place as far as he at present remembers -

He further states and declares that on the day of July
1781 as well as he remembers he again entered the service of
the United States as a private volunteer soldier upon a tour of
three months in the company of Captain Davis - that he again
rendezvoused with his said Company at Leesburg in the
said County of Loudon where he still continued to reside
- that he was attached to a regiment under the command
of Col. -

He states that he was kept at Leesburg
for sometime and was then marched to Frederickburg and
came under the command of Genl. Braden - that he was
marched from thence and the troops with which he was joined
Genl. Washington at or near Charlotteville Va. And he was then

Marched down towards York and finally to Gloucester and the
Siege of York was then commenced and this declarant was there
and assisted in its progress under his said officers and witnessed
the surrender of the British troops - He states that soon after the
surrender of the British he was marched as a part of the guard
to a large number of the prisoners to Leesburg and from thence
to Tolands Ferry on the Potomac River and the prisoners were
then carried over into Maryland and he this declarant was dis-
charged and returned home having fully and faithfully perfor-
med his said term of service -

He states that he has no documentary evidence and that
he knows of no person whose testimony he can procure who can
testify to his service

He hereby relinquishing way claim whatever to a pension
or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not
on the pension roll of the agency of any state -

Interrogatories put to the above named applicant by the
Court -

1st Where and in what year were you born?

Answer I was born in the State of Maryland in the year 1761

2d Have you any record of your age and if so where is it?

Answer - The record of my age has been lost & I now have none

3. Where were you living when called into service; where had you
lived since the Revolutionary War and where do you now live
Answer. I lived in Loudon County Virginia when I entered the
Service and soon after the termination of the War I moved to
Harrison County Va. Where I lived some years and then moved
back to Loudon County where I continued to live till 1809 and
I then moved to Fayette County Ky. Where I lived till 1826 &
then moved to where I now live in Gallatin County Ky. and have
continued to live on the same place ever since.

4th How were you called into service; were you drafted did
you volunteer or were you a substitute and if a substitute
for whom

Answer I volunteered & was drafted

5th State the names of some of the regular officers who were with the troops where you served such Continental and Militia regiments as you can recollect and the general circumstances of your service.

Answer - I recollect Genl. Washington, La Fayette, Wayne and Madsen and Cols.

- In my first tour I was engaged in endeavouring to protect the County from the incursions of the British - I was principally between James & York rivers and was at Richmond Va. Williamsburg York and other places - upon my second tour I joined Genl. Washington at or near Charlestown Va. and went down to the Siege of York and was during the Siege on the Gloucester side under the command of Genl. Madsen - after the Capture of the British Army I was marched as a part of the guard to a parole of the prisoners to Leesburg and from thence to Maryland ferry on the Potowmack river and the prisoners being conveyed into Maryland I was discharged and returned home

6th Did you ever receive a discharge from the service, and if so, by whom was it given and what has become of it?

Answer - I received a discharge from each of my tours signed by my officers which I have lost.

7th State the names of persons to whom you are known in your present neighbourhood and who can testify as to your character for veracity and their belief of your service as a soldier of the revolution -

Answer I will name John S. Violett & Elijah Dement

Violett a clergyman residing in Calloway county Kentucky and Elijah Dement residing in the same county and state hereby certify that we are well acquainted with William McFowell who has subscribed and sworn to the above declaration, that we believe him to be 72 years of age, that he is reputed and believed in the neighbourhood

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your request for information relative to William McDowell who served in the Revolutionary War and received a pension while living in Gallatin County, Kentucky.

The data which follow were obtained from papers on file in the pension claim, S.30580, based upon the Revolutionary War service of William McDowell.

He was born in 1761 in Maryland. The exact place of his birth and the names of his parents were not given.

While a resident of Loudoun County, Virginia, he enlisted in April, 1780, and served three months as private in Captain Beavers' company of Virginia troops under Major Quarles. He enlisted in July, 1781, and served three months as private in Captain Lewis' Virginia company and was at the siege of Yorktown and the surrender of Cornwallis.

Soon after the termination of the Revolution he moved to Fairfax County, Virginia. He then moved back to Loudoun County where he lived until 1809 when he moved to Fayette County, Kentucky. He lived there until 1826 when he moved to Gallatin County, Kentucky.

He was allowed pension on his application executed October 15, 1833, at which time he was living in Gallatin County, Kentucky.

There are no data relative to the family of William McDowell.
