Deputy of Indiana } On this 2<sup>d</sup> of March  
Summers County } one thousand eight hundred  
and twenty five personally appeared in open court  
to being being a court of Record (to wit) the  
present court of Summers County Darby W. Gar-  
-ner aged sixty nine years who being first duly  
sworn according to law both on his oath makes  
the following Declaration in order to obtain the  
provisions made by the acts of Congress of the 18<sup>th</sup>  
March 1818 and the first of May 1820 that he the  
said Darby W. Garrison entered for the first  
of these years in April 1777 in the state of  
Virginia in the Company commanded by Capt.  
Moore Fotheroy in the Regiment commanded  
by Colonel Stephen Mayland in the line of  
the state of Virginia on the Continental Establi-  
-ment and that he continued to serve in said  
Corps until March 1780 when he was Discharged  
from said service in the Town of Middletown  
in the state of Connecticut and that he was  
in the Battle of Monmouth and at Philadel-  
-phia and Brandywine and that he has  
no other evidence of his service And in full  
-compliance of the Act of May 1820

I Do solemnly swear that I  
was a Resident Citizen of the United States on  
the eighteenth day of March 1818 and that

I have not since that time by Gifts Sale or in any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof with an intent thereby to diminish it so as to bring myself within the Provisions of an Act of Congress entitled an Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the Land and Naval Service of the United States in the Revolutionary War passed on the 18<sup>th</sup> March 1818.

Nor that I have not nor has any person for me any property or Securities Contracts or Debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the Schedule herunto annexed and by me subscribed.

I have one half Quarter section of very poor Land, Two Indifferent horses Three head of Cattle 1 Sheep & 3 hogs I have a wife and five children two Boys Alexander nineteen years old Hugh Lewis years old My Daughter Sam is eighteen years old Sally and Afsery Lewis are fifteen years old.

I am a Farmer by Trade and not able to work at all by Reason of old age and

On this twenty seventh day of August  
1878 before me the Subscriber one of the Judges  
of the Circuit Court for the State aforesaid  
appeared for the circuit aforesaid person  
and appeared Darby Mac Gowan one of  
the years resident in the county  
of Galatin in the said Circuit who being  
by me first sworn according to Law doth  
on his oath state in order to obtain  
the pension made by the late act of Con-  
gress entitled an "act to provide for certain  
persons engaged in the land service  
of the United States in the revolu-  
tionary war" that he the said Darby  
Mac Gowan, <sup>was</sup> entered in county of ~~cutt~~  
~~pepper~~ in the State of Virginia on the  
third day of April 1777 by Captain  
Moore Donnelly who then commanded  
the third troop of the fourth regiment  
light dragoons of the Virginia Line, com-  
manded by Col. Stephen Elliott and  
that he served the term of three years  
when he was discharged in the month  
of March 1780 at Middletown in the  
State of Connecticut by the Col. com-  
manding said regiment, which said  
discharge has been lost by time and  
accident that he is now laboring under  
the infirmity of old age & in needy  
circumstances with a large family

to support & stand in need of the assistance of his country for support that he has not any further evidence of his services within his power

I do as Mr. No. 6<sup>th</sup> Judge as apud, do certify that it appears to my satisfaction that the said Darby M'gannon, did serve in the Revolutionary war as stated in the preceding declaration, against the common enemy for the term of three years, in the continental establishment, and that his reduced circumstances are such as to entitle him to the Pension allowed by the before recited act of Congress, and I now remit the proceedings and testimony taken and had before me to the Secretary of the Department of War Pursuant to the directions of the above mentioned act of Congress

Madam:-

I advise you that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim S.36104, it appears that Darby McGannon enlisted in Culpeper County, Virginia, April 3, 1777 and served as corporal in Captain Moore Fauntleroy's Company, Colonel Stephen Moylan's Fourth Regiment of Light Dragoons, he was in engagements at Brandywine, Philadelphia, and Monmouth, and was discharged in March 1780.

He was allowed pension on his application executed August 27, 1818, while a resident of Gallatin County, Kentucky, aged sixty-two years.

In 1825, he was in Jennings County, Indiana, and referred to his wife (her name and age not given) and to children- Alexander, aged nineteen years; Jane, aged eighteen years; Salley and Aylescy (twins), aged



fifteen years, and Hugh, aged twelve years.

A large family is referred to, but the above are  
the only names mentioned.
