The Court do hereby certify that on this 20th day of Aug^r 1818. the said Court before me did see the original of a certain deed for land situated in and for said town now called William White's, appeared in person and made oath upon the Holy Evangelists of the Almighty God that some time in the month of October 1775. he enlisted as a private soldier under Capt William Buchanan in Carolina County Virginia for the term of twelve months and that he belonged to the 2nd Regiment of Virginia then commanded by Colonel William Woodford. And that on the 27th day of August 1776. he was discharged by William Woodford Colonel of said Regiment as William White Virginia - which discharge marks (A) - a company this & is made good here. The further states that in the month of October 1776. in the County of Carolina State of Virginia he enlisted as a private soldier of the 2nd Regiment of Virginia then commanded by Colonel Alexander Woodford. And was discharged and that he was afterwards appointed Sergeant

Washington was before your command
by Captain Leath Gibbs - and that
he was afterwards taken from him late
in the 1779 - was charged by - the
said Leath Gibbs by name of Genl
Washington - at West point - that
he was in the battle of Mandywine
at the storming of the fort - between
the Great Mandy & Crispoll - at New
- mouth. He states that he has lost
his discharge that was given him by
order of Washington - at West point. But
a certificate of having been discharged
signed by Leath Gibbs - M. C. Genl
- do - Denying all comparisons to
furnish him with provisions - together
with a release of the Com. Mifflin
having furnished provisions. which said
- certifying a certificate is marked (B)
& made part of this declaration
and that he knows of no person in
this State by whom he can prove his
service in the Revolution or afterward
He states that he is 65 years of age
and has not seen any person from your
request for his services and that
he is in reduced circumstances and
requires the aid of his country to
support him - His private place of
residence is - Gal also County

On this 11th day of October 1820 and in the 30th year of the Commonwealth personally appeared in open Court being a Court of record for the said Circuit with legitimate jurisdiction by the laws of the State William McEntee aged forty five years resident in the said County of Gallatin and Circuit aforesaid who being sworn according to law doth on his oath declare that he served in the Revolutionary war as follows - That he served as a private in the second Virginia Regiment in the company commanded by Capt William Palmer and served twelve months he then enlisted under Capt John Willis and served about six months and was then put into General Washingtons 1st Guards and continued there until the expiration of the three years then returned went out as a volunteer for thirty days and then joined the second Virginia legion commanded by Col John Taylor. (A quarterly to his original declaration doth on this day of which has been heretofore forwarded to the war office) and that he has received a pension certificate No 5.063 on which he has drawn a pension up to the 4 April 1820. And I do solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift or sale or in any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby to diminish it to bring myself within the provisions of the act of Congress entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary war passed on the 18th day of March 1818" and that I have not now nor had any person in

Trust for and any property or securities, contracts or
debts due to me (now have) or any in come other
than what is contained in the schedule hereto,
annexed and by me subscribed.
