State of Kentucky
Gallatin County

On the 15th day of October, 1833 personally appeared in open Court before the Justice of the Gallatin County Court the following Thomas Rod a resident of the County of Gallatin and State of Kentucky aged 71 years and upwards who being first duly sworn according to law doth upon his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 4th 1832

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and service as herein stated that is to say being a resident of Essex County in the State of Virginia he did in the month of May in the year 1780 as well as he remembers enter the service of the United States as a private Soldier and drafted Militia man upon a tour of three months in the Company of Capt. Hale that he rendez voused at a place called Burnt old field in Essex County Va. and was immediately Marched by his ^{Capt.} to Gloucester Va. opposite York and there he was attached to the Regiment commanded by Col. Griffen that he was kept stationed at Gloucester as a part of the Garrison of that place during the whole period of his said tour and after having fully and faithfully served out the same he was discharged and return ed home -

He further states and declare doth in the month of July 1781 as well as he remembers he again entered the service of the United States as a private Soldier and drafted Militia man in the company of Capt. Hale the same Captain under whom he was in his first tour - that he again rendezvous with his Company at Burnt old fields and he was Marched up toward Charlottesville another was attached to the Regiment of Col. Griffen - that sometime afterward he was attached to the main Army under Gen Washington - that he was attached to the Command of Gen. Haden and he was Marched with the Army toward York and finally reached Gloucester under Gen. Braddock and the Kings of York and Gloucester commanded and he was thus during the whole period and triumphed the Surrender of the British - that immediately after the King was over his term of service resigns and he was Marched to Williamsburg and then discharged & he then returned home -

He states that he has no documentary evidence and that he
knows of no person whose testimony he can procure who can testify
to his service

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or
annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on
the pension roll of the Agency of any State

Answer I have none

3rd Where were you living when called into service where have you lived

since the Revolutionary War and where do you now live?

Answer I lived in Essex County Va when I entered the service which
continued 12 or 16 years after the war and I then moved to Jefferson
County Ky. where I lived about 6 or 7 years and I then moved
to Gallatin County Ky. where I now live.

4th How were you called into service were you drafted did you
volunteer, or were you a substitute and if a substitute for whom

Answer I was drafted -

5th State the names of some of the regular officers, who were with the

troops where you served such Continental & militia regiments as
you can recollect and the general circumstances of your service

Answer I saw but Washington & Lafayette & Madan and Leeks

Greene and Bell - who were I suspect regular officers - I recollect

Cols. Lee and Griffin Militia officers - My first tour was performed

at Gloucester as a part of the militia - Upon my second tour

I was at the siege of York & Gloucester & witnessed the surrender

of the British Army

6th Did you ever receive a discharge from the service & if so by

whom was it given and what has become of it

Dear Sir:

The data furnished herein were obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, S.31278, based upon the Revolutionary War service of Thomas Noel.

He was born in the year 1763 in Essex County, Virginia. The day and month of his birth are not given, nor are the names of his parents stated.

While residing in said Essex County, Thomas Noel enlisted in May, 1780 and served three months as a private in Captain Hale's company, Colonel Griffin's Virginia regiment. He enlisted in July, 1781 and served under the same officers was at the siege of Yorktown and was discharged after the surrender of Cornwallis.

He moved ten or twelve years after the Revolution from Essex County, to Jefferson County, Kentucky, where he lived six or seven years and then moved to Gallatin County, Kentucky.

He was allowed pension on his application executed, October 15, 1833, then a resident of Gallatin County, Kentucky.

John Noel was living in 1833 in said Gallatin County, no relationship to the soldier, Thomas Noel, shown, and it is not stated that soldier was ever married.
