August 1830 personally appeared
before me Benjamin Sellers a Justice of
the peace in and for the county of Gall
atin State of Kentucky and one of the
Judges of the Gallatin County Court
Mary Slaughter a resident of Gallatin
county State of Kentucky aged 85 years
who being first duly sworn according to
law doth on her oath make the following
declaration in order to obtain the benefit
of the provision ~~of Congress~~ made by the
act of Congress passed July 4th 1830
that she is the widow of George Slaughter
who was a Colonel as she has always
understood and believed in the Virginia
State line during the army of the revolution
she will not undertake ^{to state} the particulars of
the service of her ~~decd~~ husband the said
Slaughter as the records she has no doubt
will furnish satisfactory evidence of that
fact She further declares that she was
married to the said George Slaughter
in the month of February in the year

seventeen hundred and seventy or 1771 and she further states that her husband the said George Slaughter departed this life on the 17 day of June 1818 in Charleston Clarke county state of Indiana she will further state that she married s^r George Slaughter in Culpepper county state of Virginia where she and her s^r husband lived at the time he entered the service and she further states and declares that she has remained a widow ever since the death of her said husband she further states that from her extreme old age and great infirmity of body that she is entirely disabled from attending in open court ~~and~~ to the making of her declaration the proof hereunto annexed will more fully substantiate what she has stated she therefore prays the allowance of her claim

Sir:

I advise you that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, W. 8729, it appears that George Slaughter, a resident of Culpepper County, Virginia, engaged in the battle of Kanawha, in 1774, no details of this service given and no officers stated.

He served as Major during the Revolution, and was Lieutenant-Colonel of Colonel Crockett's Virginia State Regiment in 1780 and 1781.

He died June 17, 1818, in Charlestown, Clark County, Indiana.

Soldier married in Culpepper County, Virginia, Mary Field, daughter of John Field. Culpepper County Court records show that their marriage license was granted February 10, 1767, and soldier's widow, Mary, stated that they were married in February, 1771. They were both then residents of Culpepper County, Virginia.

Said Mary was allowed pension on her application executed August 17, 1836, while a resident of Warsaw, Gallatin County, Kentucky, aged eighty-five years.

No reference is made to children.
