{ Revolutionary Claim,
Act June 7, 1832. }

Recorded by Dan'l Boyd Clerk,
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State of Kentucky: Fayette County Scts

On this 18th day of October 1832 personally appeared in open Court, before the Mayor of the City of Lexington, now sitting, Thomas Bryant a resident of the County of Ken-
tucky and State of Kentucky, aged seventy one years, who
being first duly sworn according to Law, doth on his
oath make the following declaration in order to obtain
the benefit of the act of Congress, passed June 7th 1832.

That about the 1st of June 1780 he was drafted and entered the service of the United States under the following named officers: viz Capt. Jno Holliday,
Lieut John Chev, Lieut Edward Stephenson, Colo George
Stubblefield, Colo Joseph Spencer & Major Morris:
that at the time he entered the service he resided in Spotsylvania County Virginia: that he marched first, to Hillsborough, North Carolina and thence to Camden South Carolina and was in the battle of Camden: that after the battle of Camden he returned to Spotsylvania County, Virginia.

That some time in the fall of 1780 he was again drafted and entered the service of the United States under Capt. White in Colo Davis's regiment
Southall was the Major. That he went to and was stationed at Richmond Court House and was engaged most of the time in guarding the prisoners, but occasionally in guarding & transporting provisions &c: that he was drafted for eighteen months, but owing to his having been taken sick, he was discharged about two or three months before the expiration of his time: which discharge was left with his father's papers and has been lost or mislaid: He was born in Spotsylvania County Virginia in 1761 but has no record of his birth.

That he served under Genl Gates and was acquainted with Genls Spottiswood & Weeden of the regular Army. He refers to Thomas Smith, Thomas Brown, Thomas Oldridge, James Carey and Dr. Hunter, living in his

immediate neighborhood as to his character for veracity, being in his Rev.
uttering agrees
This affiant removed from Spotsylvania to Culpepper
County, Virginia where he lived about fourteen years;
that he removed thence to Tennessee, where remained
about one year and from thence removed to Fayette
County Kentucky where he resided about four years
and then removed to Henry County Kentucky where
he has resided ever since, to wit about twenty years.

He further states that he has no documentary
evidence whatever of his having served in the Revolu-
tionary War, but expects to be able to prove the
fact by Abraham Ferguson, John Damaby, (fict)
Bryant and James True

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever
to a pension or annuity except the present and
declares that his name is not on the pension roll
of the agency of any state or territory.

Abraham Ferguson aged seventy one years, states,
upon oath, that he and Thomas Bryant who has
made oath to the foregoing statement entered the
army about the same time: that they marched
together to Hillsborough North Carolina and started
from thence towards Camden: that shortly after
they left Hillsborough this affiant was detached
to procure some provisions and left the said tho.
Bryant with the army. He recollects that Col^o
Stubblefield commanded the Regiment and
that said Thomas Bryant served under Capt^o Jno
Holliday.

Abraham Ferguson

Amended declaration of Thomas Bryant,
made this 8th day of October 1833, before C. Hunt
Esq. Mayor of the city aforesaid, in order to obtain
a pension under the act of Congress of the 7th June
1832.

Said Bryant states that the first term which
he served as detailed in his original declaration
under Capt. Holliday, was not less than five
months; and his term under Capt. White was
not less than fifteen months. That when he was
discharged as therein mentioned, he remained at
his father's in Spotsylvania County Virginia, un-
til the spring of 1782, when he again entered
the service as a waggoner under Thomas Collins
& Michael Robinson, waggonmasters, in which sta-
tion he served not less than four months and
not more than five. He was employed during
that time in Spotsylvania County. He states
that his answers to the several interrogatories con-
tained in the instructions of the War Department
are embodied in the original and amended dec-
larations. He file, herewith an affidavit of
Joseph W. Shannon, a minister of the gospel in
his immediate vicinity, sworn to before Samuel
Demaree Esq. a justice of the peace for Henry County,
in which county said Bryant resides. The reason
why he has made his declaration in the city of
Lexington, is that the witnesses, whom he relied
on to prove his services, lived in Fayette
County, were old men and unable to go to Henry
County, and consequently said Bryant was obliged
to come to Fayette County to obtain their depositions.

Bryant was this day made before me the Mayor
of the city aforesaid in open court, and sworn
to by said Bryant in due form of law. Given
under my hand this 8th day of October 1833.
