Act June 7, 1832. }

on the 11 day of November 1833 personally appeared before me
Dana Adams one of the trustees of the peace of New Jersey
-ty Dana ~~for~~ ^{in and for} service agreed to and made this
day known according to law and on his oath makes the
the following declaration in order to obtain the benefits
of an act of Congress passed the 14th day of June 1833

This deponent states that he entered the service of the United
States as an Indian ~~officer~~ and served at Ticonderoga 1776
that he entered the service of the United States as a volunteer
1st due under Capt Hugh Mcellan of Cumberland County
Pennsylvania for a time of two months that he volunteered
sometime in the month of September 1780 but on what day of
the month he at this time does not recollect he marched
with Capt Mcellan's company from said county of Cu-
mberland to Bald Eagle creek in the back part of
Pennsylvania in pursuit of some Indians that were com-
mitting some depredations on the frontier settlements on
arriving at Bald Eagle creek he states that the Indians
had taken and carried off two of the settlers Mr John
Wilson and his son besides committing many outrages
upon the property of the inhabitants, Capt Mcellan
then ordered his men in pursuit of them and out Ma-
rket was directed to an Indian encampment called
Chunclacompoo upon the head waters of the Susque-
hanna River during the gathering March in
spite of the savagery he states that he suffered nothing
for provisions passing through a once thinly settled
country which was then almost entirely abandoned
by the white leaving nothing behind for a soldier to
subsist upon among at Chunclacompoo This town

had dispersed; he states that after making several attempts
to subdue them and being unsuccessful that Capt. McColl
then ordered his men back to Cumberland County
and ^{on} their way back they met Capt. Joseph Bonner's company
going on the ^{same} ~~expedition~~ and after some consultation
between the officers it was agreed that both companies
should return to the State that they returned to Cum-
berland County and that he having fully and fairly
fully served out his time was discharged by his said
Capt. sometime in the month of Nov. 1780. This deca-
reates that sometime about the first of March 1781 that
he again entered the service as an Indian fighter under
Capt. Thomas Alexander as a volunteer for a term
of two months he states that Capt. Alexander company
was marched from Cumberland ^{by} to the back
parts of Pa. with the view of protecting the frontier
settlers and driving the Indians more westward
he states that they arrived after a tedious march
in McLain Valley on the 20th of the present month
where they remained for a short time now long
he does not distinctly remember - and during their
stay in McLain Valley they were employed in re-
monstrating the country ^{for} clearing and opening
in various directions. He states that the company were
then marched about 20 miles to Becketts Fort to
prevent an attack upon that fort. ^{for} They marched
to Maccommack, one of the ^{surrounding} hills at that
time they were then ordered to Anderson's Fort
thence back to Cumberland County where ^{he} was

uncharged by Capt Thomas Dacres having fully faith fully and
economically served out his two month tour the further states
that sometime in the month of Sept 1781 that the Dragoon
again commenced their operations on the frontier
settling where Capt Alexander directed him to do when
they had a scouting party he states that
he volunteered a third time for a two months tour
and started upon a third expedition during this expedi-
tion he states that they marched in a westerly direction
across sand stone mountain and took mountain
to Rock City fort sieging and besieging the Indians
endeavoring to recruit their supplies on returning
from Macon neck fort during the abandonment of Capt
Alexander's company the Indians had become too
eare that the fort was evacuated and the person
who had been there told had returned to the river
in or of Pa for security, he states that the length
of time for which he volunteered having expired
and he being worn down with fatigue travel-
ing across Yaphet mountains and wading
through a savage wilderness returned with his
scouting party to Capt Alexander when they were
uncharged by Capt him having served out his two
months. In the month of Sept 1782 he states that he
was again called into the service as a dragoon, further
than he was drafted in the County of Cumberland and
commanded by Capt Richard Coulter his
time of draft was for two months they were then marched
from Cumberland by Pa in a westerly direction to the frontier

Settlement on the head water of the Susquehanna after crossing Stone Mountain he states that they were stationed at Little Mill on Sand Stone Creek where they were employed in surveying the country and defending the settlers from attack by the Indians an other ^{of} Indians for protecting the company at Little Mill to guard and protect the mills as it was the only mill on the frontier to supply both inhabitants and Indians with bread in the month of Nov 1783 Capt Coulter and his company returned to Cumberland City Pa - and having paid out the time for which he was engaged he was discharged by Capt Coulter in writing - this written discharge he states that he has lost many years since. He states that early in the spring of 1783 about the middle of March as well as he now remembers that he again volunteered under the old Capt Thomas Alexander for the purpose of pursuing some Indians who had broken into the settlements and after committing many depredations upon the property of the settlers they went to the house of David Eaton and took his whole family consisting of his wife and five children among the first after the Indians - as he states that they came across David Eaton's wife and two of his children one dead. John Murray Coulter - and the three largest they forced off with such rapidity they were unable to overtake them after a tree - some of the three Indians he states he pursued home to Cumberland County being unable to overtak them. He states that he has no documentary evidence of this service of and knows of no living witness to

- whom he can give his service he shall by relinquishing
every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except
the present and declares that his name is not on the
pension roll of the agency of any state

from my father's register Ques Where were you living when
called into the service. Ans In Cumberland City Pa

4- Ques Where have you lived since the revolution and where
do you now live Ans I have lived in Huntington and
Reedford ~~points~~ in Pa. and in the year of 1790 I came
to Ky. I have lived in Scott County Ky and I now live in
Henry Ky. Ques How were you called into the service
Ans I volunteered three times of two months each - I was
drafted once for a time of two months - a fourth time
I volunteered to yourself from Indiana. The eighth of
time I was gone was about one month upon my last call
Ans And you are now a discharged man by whom

was it given (ans) for the who if not now succeeded me
when discharged. when I was drafted I was discharged
by Richard Boulli in writing which discharge I
lost some years since - on my fourth expedition
I turned home after pursuing the Indians and
received no discharge. Ques Please tell the names of
some of the regular officers who were with the troops
when you lived and last Continental and Miltia
Regiment as you can recollect. Ans There were

Regular Officer or trooper except Col. Broadhead's
Regiment which remained but a short time. The Indians having
surprised their Col. Broadhead with his regiment removed
to the settlement in Pleasanton the names of some of your
neighbors who can testify as to your character for up-
right and true belief of your service as a soldier of the
revolution. I will name in full Col. Jones a Black man
and Mr. Henson Williams

Col. Samuel Jones Black man and
Henson Williams residing in the neighborhood of
David Broadwell say that we have been acquainted
with Mr. Broadwell ^{who has come to the above declaration} for many years and that we believe
him to be 70 years old that he is upright and beloved
in the neighborhood where he used to have been a
soldier of the revolution and a man of integrity
and that he under the same that he has stated in the
above declaration and that we concur in the opinion

I do declare on oath that by reason of bodily infirmity
and advanced age that he is unable to appear in
open court to make his declaration without materially
injuring his health. Having been unable to ride
horseback without great pain for some years

Know all men by these presents that I
Robert Criswell of Henry County Kentucky
one of the Sons of David Criswell who
died in said County in the Spring of the
Year 1841 and who at the time of his
death was a Revolutionary Pensioner
of the United States on the Kentucky
Agency at the rate of \$26 ⁶⁶ or near
that amount do hereby appoint George
A. Munsarrat of Louisville Kentucky my
true and lawful Attorney with full power
of substitution for me and in my
name to prosecute against the United
States any claim I have to arises
or allowance or increase of pension
to which my father became entitled
in his lifetime

Said Attorney is authorized to do
all necessary Acts and Deeds to carry
out the foregoing purposes, and to
receive from any Department of the
Government or the archives thereof
any information or evidence of what
ever character bearing on this claim
Said Attorney is authorized to receive
any character of Drafts or evidences of

amounts due me. And I hereby ratify
all his lawful deeds in this behalf.
Witness my hand and seal in
Henry County Kentucky on this 16th day
of March 1833
