State of Kentucky  
Henry County

On this 7<sup>th</sup> day of Octo. 1833 personally appeared in open  
Court before the Justices of the Henry County Court now sitting James J.  
Dogar, a resident of Henry County Ky age 69 years who being first duly  
sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in  
order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed 15th May 1828  
or of the act of Congress passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named  
officer and served as herein stated, that is to say being a recruit of  
Saguar County in the state of Virginia he did in the month of April  
1780 as well as he remembers (being then only 18 years old) enlisted in  
the Army of the United States to serve therein as a drummer for and  
during the war - that he was enlisted by Captain William Strother  
at a place called Normans ford on the Rappahannock River Va.  
where he remained but a short time and was marched by his said  
Captain to James River where they joined some other troops &  
sometime afterward they were marched into North Carolina and  
joined Genl Gates (a little while after the defeat at Camden) at Hills-  
borough - that he remained under the command of Capt Strother but  
the Lieutenant's name was as well as he remembers and  
he thinks that his Major's name was Blackwell - He states that he  
was attached to the command of Morgan who he believes at that  
time was a general though at the time he enlisted he expected to  
be attached to a regiment commanded by him as Col. - he further  
states that soon after his arrival at Hillsborough and junction with  
the Army Genl Gates left it and Genl Greene took the command -  
He also states that in the latter part of Octo. 1780 or early in Aug.  
1781 he was attached to the command of a Col. Howard as well as  
he recollects the name and was marched by Capt Morgan with  
other troops over the Catawba River and sometime in the month  
of Aug (he thinks) 1781 the battle of the Cowpens was fought  
and that he was in that battle - He states that a while after the  
battle of the Cowpens Genl Greene took the command of the troops  
in person and they were marched on toward Guilford - He states  
that he continued with the Army until the battle of Guilford was  
fought - that he was not with the main body when the action  
took place but was off with a portion of the Regt which  
had been sent out of the way by Genl Greene - He states that

Soon after the Battle of Guilford he was marched by Major Blackwell into Virginia and joined the Army of Gen<sup>l</sup> Lafayette on the Rappahannock that he continued with the Army in its Marches & Counter marches through that state in operating against the British Army under Cornwallis until he finally joined the Army of Gen<sup>l</sup> Washington at Charlottesville Virginia and was then marched down to York with the main Army and was present at the Battle of that place and capture of the British Army which event took place he thinks in Oct 1781 - <sup>3000</sup> He states that after the capture of Cornwallis he was marched down to some barracks which had been erected about ten miles below York and was there kept stationed until peace was made and ratified in the year 1783 that he was under the command of Maj<sup>t</sup> Blackwell while at the said barracks and when peace was made he was discharged and returned home to Fauquier County Virginia having served out his said enlistment fully and faithfully. He states that from the time of his said enlistment till his discharge he served as a drummer.

He states that from the great lapse of time and the consequent failure of his memory he is unable to state the names of many of the officers who were with the troops where he served but that he does recollect whilst he was in North Carolina in the service to have seen Gen<sup>l</sup> Gates, Smallwood, Gen<sup>l</sup> Morgan & Col<sup>o</sup> Morris & Clark & Major Blackwell and Major McDowell, & Col<sup>o</sup> Pickens. And in his other services he recollect Gen<sup>l</sup> Washington, Wayne, La Fayette & Steuben, and Col<sup>o</sup> Greene & Willis and Major Blackwell.

He states that he has no documentary evidence and that he know of no person except William Dorgan by whose testimony he can procure who can testify to his service or any part of it.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and states that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any state.

Interrogatories put to the above named applicant by the County  
1<sup>st</sup> Where and in what year were you born?  
Answer I was born <sup>in</sup> the state of Maryland in the year 1764  
2<sup>d</sup> Have you any record of your age and if so where is it?  
Answer I have it home in my Bible.

3<sup>rd</sup> Where you living when called into service; where have you lived since the revolutionary war and where do you now live?  
Answer. I lived <sup>in</sup> Fauquier County Virginia when I entered the service and when I was discharged in 1783 I returned to that County & there remained for till 1795 & then moved to Rappahannock County Va and lived there till 1800 & then moved to Fauquier County Va where I lived till 1819 & then moved to Rappahannock County Va where I have lived ever since.

4<sup>th</sup> How were you called into service; were you drafted did you volunteer or was you a substitute? and by whom? answer. I enlisted into the service.

5<sup>th</sup> State the names of some of the regular officers who were with the troops where you served such continental and militia Regiments as you can recollect and the general circumstances of your service Answer. I recollect Genl Washington, Gatl, Greene, Major Smallwood, La Fayette, Steuben and Morgan and Colv. Edward, Greene, Willis, and Clarke & Major's Blackwell and McDowell all of whom were regular officers I believe - I do not know that I recollect the names of any of the militia officers at this time only Col. Pickens was one. I enlisted at Roanoke ford on the Rappahannock River in April 1780 to serve as a drummer for and during the war and was marched into North Carolina - I was at the Battle of the Cowpens and continued with the Continentals after the Battle of Guilford and was then marched to Virginia & joined Genl La Fayette on the Rapidan and continued with him until I joined Genl Washington at Charlottesville and was then marched down to York and was there during the siege of that place & witnessed the surrender of the British and was shortly afterwards stationed at the Barracks about two miles below York where I remained in the service till placed in 1783 and was then discharged.

6<sup>th</sup> Did you ever receive a discharge from the service and if so by whom was it given and what has become of it?  
Answer. I did receive a discharge signed by my officers which I have lost -

7<sup>th</sup> State the names of persons to whom you are known in your present neighbourhood and who can testify as to your character for veracity and their belief of your services as a soldier of the revolution

Answer. I will name Sam'l. Danner and Fielding Mahoney

me the undersigned, Justice of the Peace duly authorized  
by law to administer oaths written and for the County  
and State aforesaid, personally appeared Jeremiah J. Dugan  
~~age 91 years~~ a Resident of Clarkburgh County  
of Indiana and State of Indiana who made oath  
in due form of law that he is the identical  
Jeremiah J. Dugan to whom under the provisions  
of the Act of <sup>4<sup>th</sup> of July 1852</sup> a premium of Eighty-Eight  
Dollars per annum has been allowed for his services  
as a drummer in the Revolutionary War. He further  
states that his Premium Certificate bears date under the  
aforesaid Act of July 1<sup>st</sup> 1852 is numbered 25240  
and bears date the 14<sup>th</sup> day of December One Thousand  
Eight Hundred and Thirty Three and is made payable  
at the Kentucky agency. He makes this declaration  
for the purpose of obtaining the bounty land to which  
he may be entitled under the Act of <sup>3<sup>rd</sup> March 1851</sup>  
never having received or known himself entitled or made  
application under <sup>any</sup> act of Congress previous. In evidence of his Identity  
he respectfully refers to the proofs heretofore adduced  
now on file in the Pension office and upon which his  
annuity or aforesaid was granted and to the accompanying  
affidavits.

APPLICATION FOR A TRANSFER.

County of Decatur

On this 4<sup>th</sup> day of July, 1839, before me, the subscriber, a Justice of the Peace for the said County of Decatur personally appeared Jeremiah J. Doggett who, on his oath, declares that he is the same person who formerly belonged to the Company commanded by Captain William Strawber in the Regiment commanded by Colonel Morgan in the service of the United States; that his name was placed on the pension roll of the State of Kentucky from whence he has lately removed; that he now resides in the State (District, or Territory,) of Indiana where he intends to remain, and wishes his pension to be there payable, in future. The following are his reasons for removing from Kentucky to Indiana.

Toward that my children has moved to the state of Indiana and I was unable to take care of myself and was therefore compelled to go with them there I could obtain their assistance

The oath to be taken before a duly qualified Magistrate, whose official character and signature must be certified by the proper officer, under his seal of office. The County Clerk, Secretary of State, or some other officer, must certify, under his seal of office, that the officer who administered the oath is a Justice of the Peace, Judge, Mayor, Alderman, or Notary Public, as the case may be, and that the signature purporting to be his is genuine.

The oath must be supported by the testimony of some respectable person, as to the pensioner's identity. He must swear that the person who has taken the above oath, is the person described in the affidavit. The Magistrate must certify that the witness is a person of veracity; and the affidavit must also be authenticated in the manner above directed.

In every case where the Clerk of the Court, or other certifying officer, has no public seal of office, the certificate of a member of Congress, proving the official character and signature of the certifying officer, should be sent with the papers.

*Mode of authenticating papers.*—In every instance where the certificate of the certifying officers who authenticates the papers is not written on the same sheet which contains the affidavit, or other paper authenticated, the certificate must be attached thereto by a piece of tape or small ribbon, the ends of which must pass under the seal of office of the certifying officer so as to prevent any paper from being improperly attached to the certificate.
