State of Kentucky, Henry County Sth.

On this 6<sup>th</sup> day of ~~December 1853~~<sup>May</sup>, personally appeared in open court, before the Justices of the Henry County Court now sitting (the being a court of record) John Downey, a resident of the said County of Henry & State of Kentucky aged seventy seven years the thence day of October last who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefits of the act of Congress passed June 9<sup>th</sup> 1862 - That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated - That he entered the service under Captain John Nelson of Regimental William Old Com  
- That he entered the service, ~~in~~ <sup>in</sup> February 1776 - He is certain that he entered the service in the month of February 1776 but does not certainly recollect the day of the month and that he left the service on the 20<sup>th</sup> day of February 1777 - That he entered the service as an intstinct private soldier; and remained a private during the whole time. He further states that he was born on the 3<sup>rd</sup> day of October 1755 in the county of Frederick in the state of Maryland - That his Father kept a Book in which his age was recorded - That he has often seen the Book - That after his Father's death, his Mother had the Book - After his death the Book was lost or given to some one that he does not know of & that he never saw it afterwards - He knows of no other record of his age. When he was called into the service, he was a resident of the County of ~~Pennsylvania~~ Bedford in the state of ~~Pennsylvania~~ Kentucky - When he entered the service - That he entered for 12 months - That after the war was over he came to Kentucky - in the year 1790 & that he has resided there ever since & for the last 30 years he has resided at the place in the County of Henry - This

Ipperian country (that is) 1780 years ago - where he now lives  
- That he went from Niagara, where he intended to  
New York, from thence to Albany - where the company in  
which he intended joined another company under Capt.  
Thomas Butter - From these both companies went  
by land to Fort George, near Lake George - From  
thence we went on boats to the falls of Lake George  
- (distance about 45 miles) From thence we went by land  
to fort St. Cencleray - we did not stop here - but  
as we went on boats on Lake Champlain 160  
miles to St. Johns Fort. There we staid a few days  
- do not recollect how long - From thence we went  
to the falls to a fort called Chambellie - Then we  
again went on boats on the river Sorel and  
went to the mouth, where it entered into the  
St. Lawrence - From thence we went to Montreal  
- And there we formed the first Pennsylvania Regiment  
- Commanded by Col. Pachard - a dutch man -  
and Genl. Arnold - the British & Indians had taken a  
fort called St. Anne, about two days march from Montreal  
& 300 prisoners - Arnold with about 900 Troops &  
I was one - went to retake the fort & prisoners. Before  
we arrived the fort was deserted - we followed them  
till night & returned to the fort, there was then a treaty of  
the prisoners given up - we then went a few miles  
in pursuit of the British & Indians, but fearing as I was  
informed, that our boats would be taken, we went back  
to the boats & returned to Montreal - after some time  
we went down the river St. Lawrence, to the mouth  
of the Sorel - There we met with the rear guard  
of some other american troops, retreating - We went  
on to St. Johns, part of our Troops had retreated to that  
fort - & others are on an Island in Lake Champlain - Col.  
Sullivan was there & commanded - From thence we  
went to an Island called Motts - in Lake Champlain &  
staid there until boats came from St. Cencleray & then

went to that place - Some of the troops now left  
at Crown Point - I think two Regiments - one was  
commanded by Col. Hartley - Gen<sup>l</sup>. Arnold & Sullivan  
came with us up to Alexandria. This was in the  
month of July or August - that we got back to  
Alexandria. We remained there until the  
20<sup>th</sup> of January 1777 - Arnold & Sullivan did  
not stay at the fort - Gen<sup>l</sup>. Gates commanded  
us after we returned to the fort - Gen<sup>l</sup>. Wayne  
& Sinclair were also there - We left Sinclair  
there - My Captain left the Company before  
he did, alledging that the time for which  
we had enlisted had expired - On the  
10<sup>th</sup> February his company contended that  
our time had expired & paraded with  
the intention of going home - Gen<sup>l</sup>. Wayne -  
persuaded us to stay until the 20<sup>th</sup> & on the  
20<sup>th</sup> Feb. he discharged us verbally - that he  
gave no written discharge -

~~that after he returned home, in the first part of~~  
~~the month of June 1777. That he resupplied himself~~  
~~in the room of John Apple who had been drafted~~  
~~for a term of four months in the Battalion - & was~~  
~~a private - That he enlisted under Capt. Smallwood~~  
~~I went to Philadelphia, from there to Chester and~~  
~~joined the Army near Brandywine, Washington's~~  
~~Taray & Lord Sterling - one among the American~~  
~~officers - that he does not recollect the Col. of~~  
~~the Battalion named - he was in the Battle of~~  
~~Bonduonini on the 11<sup>th</sup> Sept 1777. The Americans~~  
~~retreated - we went through Chester to Philadelphia~~  
~~& Apple moved to Chestnut Ridge, where he was~~  
~~discharged in the last of Sept. he had no written~~  
~~discharge -~~

On the year 1783 that he ~~had~~ <sup>had</sup> ~~resided~~ <sup>resided</sup> to the County  
~~of Bedford in the state of Pennsylvania and the~~<sup>State of New York</sup>

first of March of that year 1782 he enlisted for  
and during the war of the revolution - as a private  
under Capt. Johnathan Braggs in the company of Rangers  
Rangers, our Lieutenant was James Johnson & our  
bleeding Men. Our company usually staid in the County  
of Bedford - occasionally we scouting parties were off the  
Country we had an skirmish with the Indians & were beat &  
our Captain taken prisoner. This was in the month of  
1782 - in the summer season, unless on scouting parties we staid  
in a fort at Frenchtown in the winter in the town of  
Bedford - That he was discharged on the 1<sup>st</sup> day of June  
1783 & got a discharge in writing from the 1<sup>st</sup> Sargent  
W. Ward - that one of the conditions of his enlistment was  
that he was to have 200 acres of land either in Westmoreland  
or Northumberland County, which he never got - He states that he  
has long since lost his discharge - If his last services requires  
proof - or if any other of his services requires proof he is willing  
to make it & in that event he ask for a pension for his  
services which do not require proof - That he knows of nothing  
that he has no documentary evidence of his service  
more testimony he can give you will be given in his testimony to his service.

That he is well known in his neighborhood to David Adams  
Samuel Moore & Joseph DeCovett

who can vouch testify as to his character for veracity & that they believe  
that he served in the revolution as he has stated - That no  
clergyman resides in his neighborhood -

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity  
except the present, and declares that his name is not on the pension  
roll of any State the agency of any state - I now to & subscribed  
the day & year above - *[Signature]*
