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Sir:

The evidence in support of your claim, under the act of June 7, 1832, has been examined, and the papers are herewith returned. The following is a statement of your case in a tabular form. On comparing these papers with the following rules and the subjoined notes, you will readily perceive that objections exist, which must be removed, before a pension can be allowed. The notes and the regulations will shew what is necessary to be done. Those points to which your attention is more particularly directed, you will find marked in the margin with a brace, (thus: { }). You will, when you return your papers to this Department, send this printed letter with them; and you will, by complying with this request, greatly facilitate the investigation of your claim.

Henry County set.

On this 2nd day of April 1833 personally
in open court before the Honorable Samuel Todd
Judge of the Henry circuit court, whose court
is now sitting - Achillis Hockkins a resident of
the county of Henry and state of Kentucky aged
seventy one years in February last past - who
being first duly sworn according to Law, doth on his
oath make the following declaration, in order to
obtain the benefit of the act of congress passed
June the 7th 1832 - That he entered the service of
the United States under the following named
officers and served as herein stated -

That he entered the service in the month
of July 1780 under Capt Scott & Col John Green
and Samuel Davis & that he continued in the
service until November 1781 when he was
discharged - That he entered the army for
the term of eighteen months a private in
the Virginia state troops & served in a
Company of musketeers ~~in that~~ he entered
the service in the following manner - The Division
of militia to which he belonged, before he
entered the service were to stand a Draft or
Send a man & thus the division gave
him \$5000- in old continental paper to go
into the army & serve the eighteen months - which
term of 18 months he did serve - except a few days
he having been discharged about two weeks before
the eighteen months expired - That he resided
in the county of King & Queen in the state of
Virginia when he entered the service and joined
the army at Chesterfield court house from which
place we marched to McKey's Mills, where he first saw
Perryville - From thence to Petersburg ~~where he~~

there until December - Genl. Sturman was there &
was Inspector General - At this place a regiment
of men was chosen by Sturman to go to South
Carolina - that he was one of them - that his Capt
was named Benton, & the Col. was John Green & Samuel
Haw. that he does not recollect the No. of the
Regiment - that the troops selected by Sturman
left Petersberg in December 1780 - he remembers
that they crossed Dan river on Christmas Eve.
- the Regiment marched to the Cheraw hills in South
Carolina near Pee Dee river - where the Regiment
joined the army commanded by Genl. Green
at this place a company was selected to go to
Georgetown & that he was of the Company -
- the company was commanded by Captain
Anderson & Lieutenant Seldam - but before
they reached Georgetown an express came that
Genl. Green was retreating the company then
returned & joined Green at Guilford court
house - from which place they marched to
Hickory court house in Virginia & was then
joined by some Virginian Militia & then
returned to Guilford in North Carolina this
was in March 1781 - that about this time there
was a battle at Guilford but that he was
not in the Battle he having been left at
Speedwell Mills with others, to guard the
Baggage, to which place Green retreated after
the Battle - After the Battle, he was transferred
into an artillery company, commanded by
Capt. Whitehead Coleman & from thence went
to Virginia & at Petersberg his Company was
attached to Stephens Brigade of militia
& marched to various places in Virginia for some
time to the Roanoke River where we remained sometime

from whence he was marched to York &
thence he was at the siege attacking of Corn
wallis - this was in October 1781. after the
surrender of corn wallis - he went to Fredericks
burg with the prisoners - from thence to Richmond
- thence to Cumberland Court House where he
was discharged by Lieutenant Broocks in writing
in Nov. 1781. that when he was discharged
~~for~~ entered the army he got a certificate
for 1700 lbs of tobacco - after he was discharged
he went to Richmond & obtained a certificate
for his pay - which papers have long since
been lost - that he never received any pay
except the \$5000 in paper - which was not worth
any thing - he states he was born in February
1762 in King & Queen County Virginia & that
he never had any record of his age - and
only ~~states~~ states that he was born in Feb. 1762 from
information which he received from his
Family - that he left Virginia in 1793 & came
to Kentucky where he has resided ever since.
He has resided in ~~the same~~ place ever
since 1798 in Green County - that he is
well known in his present neighbor hood to
Rev. John Jones & C. P. Morris
who can testify as to his character for veracity &
the belief of his services as a soldier of the
revolution - He states that he has no documentary
evidence of his service - & that he knows of no
other ~~person~~ persons except Joseph Minor &
James Hopkins who can testify to his service.
He further states that by reason of old age and
consequent loss of memory - he can not swear
positively as to the precise length of his service
- but that according to the best of his recollection he
served not less than seventeen months & a half as
a private & for such service he claims a pension.

I do hereby relinquish every claim whatever to a pension or annuity whatever except the present & declare that his name is not on the pension rolls
of either agency of any state - Sworn to & subscribed
the day & year aforesaid Charles A. Hopkins

We John Jones a clergy man residing in the
county of Henry & state of Kentucky & E.P. Thomas
residing in the same place, hereby certify that we
are well acquainted with Achilles Hopkins who
has subscribed & sworn to the above declaration
that we believe him to be about seventy one
years of age & that he is reported & believed
by the neighborhood where he resides to have
been a soldier of the revolution & that we concur
in that opinion - Sworn & subscribed this
day & year aforesaid John Jones

Henry Circuit Court April Term 1833

On the 20th day of April 1833 came into court (being
at Court) Achilles Hopkins and proceeded on the
application for a pension and wrote act of Congress of 1832 to
which he was aponed and that Court freely declared their opinion after
the investigation of the matter and after having the interrogatories prop-
osed by the law department that the above named applicant
was a Revolutionary Soldier and served as in State. And the Court
further certifies that it appears to them that John Jones who has signed
the preceding certificate is a Clergyman resident of the County of Henry
and that Edmund P. Thomas who has also signed the same is
resident of the County of Henry and is a credible person and
that their statement is entitled to credit: and the Court further
certify that it appears to them that Joseph C. Linn and James
Haskins who have signed below to the attached affidavit
are credible persons and that their statements are entitled to credit.

I Edm^d P. Thomas Clerk of the
Circuit Court for Henry County do
certify that the foregoing, and the
attached certificate also contains the
original proceedings of said Court
in the matter of the application of
Achilles Hopkins for pension. Testifying what
