On the 11th day of February 1834 personally
appeared before me Thomas McBallard a citizen of the Pe-
ace in and for Albany County and one of the Clerks of the
County Court for the County of Albany Michael Howesworth
the aged 70 years who being duly sworn according
to law doth on his oath make the following declaration
in order to obtain the benefits of an act of Congress
of April 2d 1832.

This deponent states that

were living New Albany in the State of New York when
he joined the forces of the British Troops and became
as he is stated that in the month of May in the year
of 1779 that he participated in the peace and friend
of Michael Howesworth for a sum of seven Months
and under the command of Capt. John Chapman was made
Trooper in the Troop Cavalry to Fort Edward in the
Mohawk river where he states that he was stationed
for the purpose of protecting the settlements around Fort
Edward in the year during the time that he was there
it is affirmed that he was by his said Captain
detained as a prisoner to go and bring some baggage from
Fort Edward to Fort George that were loaded
with provision for the use of the army that
was stationed at Fort George which baggage he
states that he did faithfully guard and delivered
them safe up in the fort he states that after
he had discharged his duty in guarding said baggage
out the return to Fort Edward and resumed his
duties under Capt. Chapman and he states that sometime
in the month of August the express was accounted by Capt.
Chapman from Fort Stanwix to Fort George the name

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that was stationed at Fort Edward to guard and
protect Fort St. John he states that by order of Capt
Chapman that Lieutenant Phelps took a part of
the men that were stationed at Fort Edward being
in that number was marched to the head of the
Mohawks river and was stationed at Fort St. John he
states that while they were on their way from Fort Edward
to Fort Stanwix that they fell in with a party of Indians
and that after a small engagement they killed two
of the Indians the balance of the Indians fled - he
states that while they were stationed at Fort Stanwix
that Lieutenant Phelps took 70 men to go on a
scouting expedition when they were attacked by
some British and a party of Indians and every
man except two were killed or taken by them two
only returned to the fort he states that he stood
at Fort Stanwix until his own mouth was cut when
he was verbally discharged in the month of
December 1779. He states that he has no document
outay evidence of his service and knows of no living
witness by whom he can prove said service he has
by memory his every claim whatever to compensation
or money except the present and declares that the
same is not on the present rate of the agency of any
state and that same did not and does not
exist. That he is unable to appear in open court to make
his deposition.

Ans I was born in the City of Newyork in the year of 1763

Ques Have you any record of your age

Ans I have not

Ques Where you living when called into the service
where have you been since the revolutionary war
and where do you now live

Ans When I entered the service I was living in New Albany
in the State of Newyork after the revolutionary I went to
live in City of Newyork where I remained a few years
I then removed to Fayette County Pennsylvania in the year of
1792 where I remained until the year of 1811 I then
moved to Allegany County by where I have lived ever since

Ques How were you called into the service

Ans I was called for Michael Horneworth for 7 months

Ques State the Name of some of the regular officers who
were with the troops where you served and such
conventional and military agreements as you can recollect

Ans There was no regular officer when I served and at
Fort Edward there was but one company when I
got to Fort Stanwix there was only ^{one} militia regiment
and that was from the state of New York but I do
not recollect the name of the commandant

Ques Did you receive a discharge and if so when, where
it began and what has become of it

Ans - I never received a written discharge I was given
a full discharge at Fort Stanwix by the commandant
of the fort but I do not recollect his name

Ques State the names of persons to whom you are known
in your present neighborhood who can testify to your
character for veracity and true belief of your times
as a soldier of the revolution

Ans - I will name Andrew Croker and John Ballant

We, Wm. Brown Fisher and John Hattan say we are well acquainted with Henry Houseworth who has power to and subscriber this oaths-declaration we believe him to 10 years of age he is upright and reliable in the neighborhood where he resides to be a man of probity and a follower of the revolution and we are in the opinion we further say that we reside in the neighborhood of said applicant Green Fisher
Brown Fisher and John Hattan
do swear to and subscribe this 11 day of Oct 1834

I, Thomas M. Ballard, a member of the peace force for Henry County do hereby declare my opinion that after fully investigating the matter and putting the following above question by the way department and hearing the answer that the above applicant was a soldier of the revolution and lives as he has stated in his declaration. I further certify that it appears to my satisfaction that Wm. Brown Fisher and John Hattan who have signed the preceding certificate are persons residing in the neighborhood of said applicants and are credible persons and that their statement is entitled to credit. If under oath that there is no living man residing in the neighborhood of said applicant and that from old age and bodily infirmity that he is unable to appear in open court to make his declaration I will under my hand as a peace of the peace this 11 day of Oct 1834

My dear Mr. Ludlow:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request information in regard to Henry Houseworth who served in the Revolutionary War from the State of New York, and received a pension while living in Henry County, Kentucky.

The data which follow were obtained from papers on file in claim for pension, S. 15462, based upon the military service of Henry Houseworth in the Revolutionary War.

Henry Houseworth was born in the year 1763, in the City of New York. The names of his parents were not designated.

While residing in New Albany, New York, Henry Houseworth enlisted sometime in May, 1779, and served as a substitute for Michael Houseworth, as private in Captain Chipman's company of New York troops, was stationed at Fort Edward on the Mohawk River, guarded some baggage from Fort Edward to Fort George, was in an engagement with the Indians, near Fort Stanwix, and was discharged sometime in December, 1779, at Fort Stanwix.

After the Revolution, he moved to New York City, where he remained until in 1792, then moved to Fayette County, Kentucky, and in 1816, went to

Connec-ticut

Henry County, Kentucky.

The soldier, Henry Houseworth, was allowed pension on his application executed February 14, 1834, at which time he was living in Fayette County, Kentucky.

The papers on file in this claim contain no reference to wife or children of the soldier, nor was it stated that the Michael Houseworth for whom he served as substitute was a relative.

In order to obtain the date of last payment of pension, name and address of person paid, and possibly the date of death of this pensioner, you should address The Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, Records Division, Washington, D. C., and furnish the following data:
