On the 31st day of July 1832, personally appeared before me Benj. Mullatt one of the Common Notaries of the Peace inward for said County, John Thompson Esq., a Resident of the County of Henry and State of Kentucky aged twenty three years, who being first duly sworn according to law, both on his oath, made the following declarations, in order to obtain the benefit of the provisions made by the act of Congress passed June 1st 1832.

4. How was you called into service, were you drafted, did you volunteer or were you a substitute and if a substitute for whom

I first went in for my brother at a very early period of my life, because his brother, and was then drafted and performed another tour.

5. State the names of some of the regular Officers who were with the troops when you joined, such as Continental and Militia officers as you can recollect.

From Williamsburg I was attached from under the command
of Col. J. C. Calhoun and was marched to Petersburg under the
command of General Murchison and when we arrived at
Petersburg we had a very severe engagement from Petersburg
we marched further under the command of General Murchison
to a place called Osburn, from Osburn we marched to
Richmond and getting there at the time the British were
setting fire to the war houses in Manchester. From
Richmond we marched to the摩根 hills there I.

Volunteered under Col. Lewis. Crossed the river with one
hundred and sixty men went on the British lines, we
attacked by Col. Harton Troop of Horse, a severe battle
was fought in which we lost sixty men taken prisoners
and killed together, I myself escaped by charging
baonets together with my fellow soldiers breaking through
the British Horse and running for our lives, we then returned
to the army again I then was commanded by

Lay Fayette Commander in Chief went down the river
to old James Town and stood and beheld

wain fighting the enemy at James Town I then got my

Dear Madam:

The data furnished herein were obtained from papers on file in pension claim, S. 31168 based on the military service of John Johnston in the Revolutionary War.

John Johnston was born in the year 1757 in Culpeper County, Virginia. The names of his parents were not given.

John Johnston (as his signature is shown in the claim), while residing in said Culpeper County, enlisted in the year 1777, served as private at various times in Captains Browning's and William Green's companies, Colonel Lewis' Virginia regiment; he was in the battle of Petersburg, and in an engagement near Richmond, with Tarleton's Troop of Horse, length of service about eighteen months. Part of his service was as substitute for his father.

He was allowed pension on his application executed July 31, 1832, at which time he was a resident of Henry County, Kentucky.

The papers on file in this claim contain no reference to wife or children of the soldier, John Johnston.

In order to obtain the date of last payment

of pension, name and address of person paid, and
possibly the date of death of this pensioner, you
should apply to The Comptroller General, General
Accounting Office, Records Division, D. C., and
