On this 21st day of December 1833 personally
appeared before me William P. Brown one of the Justices
of peace in and for Henry County and one of the judges
of the ^{Court} of the County for said County of Henry. Henry Chapman
aged 72 years who being first duly sworn according to
law doth on his oath make the following declaration
in order to obtain the benefits of an act of Congress passed
the 1st of June 1832.

He doth state that he was residing
in the County of Shenandoah State of Virginia and in the
Spring of the year 1782 about the Month of March as well as
he now remembers a ~~act~~ was passed in said County

fully and to the satisfaction of his Officer discharge
him duty in guarding said prisoners after having used
out his time for which he had enlisted in that
that he was discharged by his said Captain Brown some
time in the month of Sept in writing which discharge
he still has in his possession. He states that he has no docu-
mentary evidence of his service. But is able to prove the
accuracy the former statement in his declaration by a
respectable living witness. In this by a copy makes every

claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the
present and declares that his name is written on
the General roll of the agency of any State

Questions by the Magistrate

Ques Where and in what year were you born (Ans) I was born
in Pennsylvania 1781 - (Ans) Have you any record of
your age Ans My Father family register in which
my name is recorded is in the possession of my
brother (Ans) Where were you living when called into the
service, where have you been since the revolution and
where do you now live (Ans) I was living in Franklin
County State of Pennsylvania when I enlisted in the service
after the war was over I moved to Washington City
Maryland where I lived until the year of 1814 when
I moved to Henry County Kentucky where I have
lived ever since (Ans) How well you remember into
the service, were you drafted or did you volunteer
or were you a substitute or a substitute for
another (Ans) I substituted for a man known
and from the great expense of him I do not
recollect his given name, as I never was
very well acquainted with him (Ans) State the
names of some of the regular officers who were with
the troops when you joined and particularly
and militia regiments as you can recollect.

(Ans) While I was a soldier at the Barracks there were
no regular officers and as well as I can remember
for there were but three or four companies of
Militia one commanded by Capt Brown, one by
Capt Brook Shanks and another by Capt Seaborn,

Ans! Did you ever receive a discharge and by whom was
it was it signed (Ans) I did receive a discharge signed
by Captain Brown which discharge I have (misplaced
or lost) (Ans) State the name of some of your
neighbours who can certify to your character for
honesty and then (list) of your known as a soldier
of the revolution (Ans) I will name Capt John
Free and Mr Stephen Shaw

(We John Free and Stephen Shaw now living in the
B. neighbourhood of Henry Sibley who has cause to and
published the above declaration say that we are well acquainted
with him we believe him to be fit for a man of his age
we believe him to be a man of strict morality he
is respected and beloved in his neighbourhood to have
been a soldier of the revolution and served
as he has stated in his declaration and we con-
cur in this opinion)

Dear Madam:

You are furnished herein the history of Henry Kiphart (who was pensioned Elphart) as found in the papers on file in pension claim, S. 31190, based upon his service in the Revolution.

Henry Kiphart was born in 1761, in the State of Pennsylvania; the names of his parents are not given.

While residing in Shenandoah County, Virginia, he enlisted in March, 1783, served in Captain Brown's Virginia company and was stationed at Winchester, Virginia, as a guard to the prisoners held there, length of service six months.

After the Revolution the soldier moved to Washington County, Maryland, where he resided until 1818 then moved to Henry County, Kentucky.

Henry Kiphart was allowed pension on his application executed December 21, 1833, while a resident of Henry County, Kentucky.

It is not stated that soldier ever married.

In 1833, a sister of the soldier was referred to, her name not given. In the same year, one Abraham Kiphart was residing in Henry County, Kentucky, no relationship to soldier shown and there are no further family data given.

In order to obtain date of last payment of pension, the name of person paid and possibly date of death of this soldier, you should write to the Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, Records Division, this city, and cite the following: Henry Kiphart, Certificate No. 24513, issued January 20, 1834, rate \$20 per annum, commended March 6, 1831, Act June 7, 1832, Kentucky Agency.
