On the 30th day of December 1853

personally appeared before me David Adams a Justice  
of the peace in and for Henry County and one of the  
Judges of the County Court for the appearance County  
of Henry, well and of right aged 74 years who  
being first duly sworn according to law doth  
on his oath make the following declaration in  
order to obtain the benefit of an act of Congress  
passed the 20th of June 1832

This deponent states that he resides in the State of the  
United States and resides in the State of the United States under  
the following named Office he states that  
he was living in Orange County State of  
North Carolina and some time in fall of the  
year about the first of September as well as he  
now remembers a draft was ordered in said  
County of Orange when one George L. Weston  
was drafted for a term of three months he being  
unwilling to leave home proposed to this depon-  
ent to substitute in his place and he was  
paid a sum of money according for a certain compensation  
he states that he made himself a substitute for said  
Weston and was presented to Capt. William  
Farnsworth and was examined by him and rejected  
in the place of the late George Weston Capt. John

= Mason's Company encamped at Hillsborough in  
said County of Orange and was attacked by Col. John  
Allen and Major's regiment he states that the  
regiment under Col. Martin was marched  
to a place on Haw river called the High rock.  
for he states that when they were at High  
rock for a short time under the command  
of one Fanning had broken upon the Whigs and  
were doing many outrageous acts near Hillsborough  
when Col. Martin ordered his men back to  
Hillsborough a distance of about 95 Miles as far  
as he now remembers on reaching Hillsborough  
Fanning's party of Tories had taken Governor  
Bush and some other Whigs and destroyed much  
of the property of the Whigs in that place. The  
regiment was then ordered on a forage road  
after Fanning's party and overtook them at  
High rock where a spirited engagement took  
place which ended in the defeat of Fanning's  
party. he states that he was then made his  
to Hillsborough with the balance of Col. Martin's  
regiment where he remained until the New Year  
for which he substituted expense when he was  
discharged by his said Capt. Garrison about  
the first of December 1780. he further states that

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upon being discharged that there was a  
certain officer in Hillsborough by the name of  
Lytle he states that under Capt Lytle he marched for  
a time of eighteen months after having enlisted the  
18<sup>th</sup> State that he was transferred from Cape Loghter to  
Cape Goodwin and was attached to General  
Greys regiment this regiment was then ordered  
to unite with General Morgans regiment which  
junction was formed near the Coopers. The army  
then under the command of General Morgan were  
then marched and bivouac'd at the Coopers and  
early in the morning of the 17 of January 1781 - a  
sharp engagement took place the attack was brought  
on by an attack from Talcott's regiment which lasted  
two hours about one hour during this hard fought  
battle he states that the loss of the army was consider-  
able having about three thousand killed and  
many taken prisoners. after this battle he states that  
he was then marched under General Huger to  
Pensbury where the army remained but for a short  
time they were then marched near to New York town  
house and after remaining there a few days the  
British Army under Cornwallis made an attack  
upon the American army then under the command  
of General Green and after a fierce resistance  
on the part of the American army General Green

last to retreat with considerable loss of men. he  
states that after the battle they retreated to Speedwell  
Crossroads a distance of about 13 miles. here the  
army was stationed for a short period of time  
during this interval they proceeded to Campau-  
where as some engagement took place and in this battle  
the American army had to retreat. he states that  
they then proceeded to the Pewtaw Springs the  
army under the command of General Green was  
brought in battle array and after a severe struggle  
battle the British army was defeated, General Green  
then ordered his regiment to march to a town  
called Chalotte where he remained till his time  
of enrollment expired when he was discharged  
in waiting which discharge he states he has since  
lost. he states that he has no documentary evidence  
of his service and knows of no living witness (by whom  
he can prove said service) he hereby relinquishes  
every claim whatever to a pension or annuity  
except the present and declares that his name is  
not on the pension rolls of the agency of any state  
he states that by reason of bodily infirmity he is  
unable to appear in open court to make his declaration.

ans I was born in Orange County North Carolina 1759

Ques Have you any record of your age  
ans I have had, but since the death of wife the book  
which contained my age is misplaced

Ques When were you young when you were called into  
the service, where have you been since the revolu-  
tion, and where do you now live

ans I was living in orange County N.C. Carolina  
when I entered the service. I then moved into  
Mecklenburg County N.C. and in 1803 I moved to

Henry County Ky where I now live

Ques How were you called into the service, were you  
an officer, were you a volunteer or a substitute  
and if a substitute for whom

ans when I first entered the service I was enlisted  
for George Washington the second time I enlisted  
for a term of eighteen months —

Ques State the name of some of the regular officers  
who were with the troops when you served and  
such continental and militia regiments as you  
can now recollect and the general names  
of the army

In my first term John G. Marion Capt of artillie

Captl Sammerson and Major Garrison in my  
second tour, Captl of 2nd Regt Colv-Pickins & General  
Genl of General Morgan Colv William Hastings  
and the general circumstances are mostly in the  
accident in addition I can say we suffered  
exceedingly for provisions and clothing.

As regards our recent discharge and by whom was it  
signed and what has become of it  
and I did receive a discharge given by Captl Sammerson  
of on my substitute tour the second tour I was  
discharged by General Genl in Charlotte N.C.  
South Carolina. This discharge I have lost  
many of late

but shall the names of some of your neighbors who  
can testify as to your character for veracity and  
the belief of your service as a soldier of the revolution

are Will Marion Mr Stephen Shaw and Mr. Brandon

Mr Stephen Shaw and William Brandon res-  
iding in the neighborhood of Williamsburgh says  
that we are well acquainted him & we believe  
him 74 years old he is upright and beloved  
in his neighborhood to be a man of veracity  
and that he was a soldier of the revolution
