

State of Missouri
County of Jackson

Recd this 13th day of March

1844, before me, the subscriber, a Justice of the
Peace for said County of Jackson, personally
appeared George Mitchell, who on his oath
declares, that he is the same person who, for
many belonged to the Company commanded by
Captain Williams in the Regiment Commanded
by Colonel Polk in the service of the United
States; that his name was placed on the pension
roll of the State of Kentucky, because he has
hately removed; that he now resides in the
State of Missouri, where he intenly to remain
and wishes his pension to be made payable in
future.

The following are his reasons for
removal from Kentucky to Missouri. Being
very old and disabled from his crew for
the want of the means of life, he removed
to Missouri to be near his crew. The want
of which are rendering of said place.

State of Kentucky - Henry county set.

On this 2^d day of December 1832 personally appeared in open court before the Justices of the County court of Henry county state of Kentucky or Court having now sitting - George Mitchell (who sometimes signs his name George E. Mitchell) - a resident of this county of Henry state of Kentucky aforesaid - aged sixty nine years on the 16th day of March 1832 who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed 7th June 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers & served as hereinafter stated - to wit - under Capt. Kirkpatrick - Col. Gaskins - Major Willis, ensign Scott - Lieutenant Martin - that he belonged to the 8th Virginia Regiment, which was made up of parts of several Regiments - while he served as herein after stated - in South Carolina & Georgia - Col. Posley and Major Stanley commanded - That he entered the service in the spring of 1781 in the month of March (which he thinks) but he does not recollect the day of the month, that he lived when he entered the service in the county of Richmond state of Virginia - That he was born in the 16th day of March 1763 in the county of Essex County and state of Virginia - That he has a record of his age in a book, now at his house, which his father gave him - in which it is stated that he was born on the 16th March 1763 that same year he was enlisted in the state of Kentucky mostly in Regis County where he now lives that he joined the army on James River or near it in the state of Virginia - The army marched through Virginia towards the north & an Ohio river & crossed at Grand Bridge - He then marched back into the interior of Virginia in the neighborhood of Savannah pursuant of the British sometimes & at other times retreating - That the army passed through Richmond in pursuit of the British - He thinks

that Genl. Wayne had the command. From Richmond
we marched to a place called Etans Bridges, where the
American troops were collecting for the purpose of besieging
Cornwallis at York - at which place he was taken
sick & sent to a hospital in Hanovertown, up the
river five or six miles from Newcastle in Virginia

- That he lies there sick for sometime & after he recovered
a little, he obtained a furlow from Major Miller &
met him where he remained there two or three weeks
& having recovered his health he again joined
the army in November his term of service not
having then expired - the army was at that time, at
Porketown court house in Virginia - Truly was
Major & Feeder was Col. at which place the
army remained until the 14th of February 1782

- From which place the army marched to the state
of Georgia, through parts of both Carolina's
The army remained some time at Chenege Creek
25 or thirty miles from Savannah - From there
we marched near Savannah & near there we had
a slight battle with the British other British
retreated to the town - at this time the British had
possession of Savannah - We took a British
Col. prisoner - after which the army continued in
the neighborhood of Savannah, until the Battle
with the Royal troops other Creek Indians
were commanded, the British & Indians
men driven by our army - the Battle was in the night
- we took some prisoners - That he was in the Battle
& that the Americans had the advantage - a short
time afterwards the British left Savannah & we took
possession of it until October as he thinks -
Afterwards to Newbern to Powhatan court
house, in the last of November, where he was
urchased by Genl. Scott - went in the last of April
1782 - ~~he received a portion discharge, but has~~
~~long never lost it - He further states that~~

he was drafted for eighteen months & entered the army by virtue of the draft as a private soldier & remained a private during the term of service -
that after the 18 months was elapsed - he was still in Georgia with the army & that he was not discharged until the army marched to Virginia -
he states that he continued in the service for the whole time for which he was drafted except for two
several weeks, that he was sick as aforesaid and that
he was not discharged for two months after his
~~term expired~~ making in all at least 20 months -
That he supposes, that he belonged to the
Virginia state troops - That he has now no
documentary evidence, at present of no person
whose testimony he can procure who can testify
to the same - That Jonathan Reddwell & Brown
are citizens of Henry county & reside in my neighbor
hood & to whom he is known & who can testify
to the fact that his character for veracity is good
& that they believe he served as a soldier of
the revolution as above stated -
He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension
or annuity, except the present & declares that his name
is not on the pension roll of the agency for any
state - Given to & subscribed this day of Decem
ber 1832 -

We Johnathan Reddwell, a clergyman residing in
the county of Henry state of Kentucky and Thomas
Brown residing in the same said Henry county
that we are well acquainted with George Mitchell
who has subscribed abovew to the above declaration
that we believe him to be 69 or 70 years
of age and that he is reputed & believed in the
neighborhood where he resides, to have been a
soldier of the revolution & that we concur in
that opinion - signed abovew to this day of Decem
ber 1832 -

of August, in the year of our Lord one Thousand
Eight hundred and fifty three, before me the
undersigned Clerk of the Weston Court of
Common Pleas, within the County and State
aforesaid, personally came Mrs. Elizabeth Mitchell
aged eighty (80) years a resident of the County
and State above mentioned, to me well known,
who after being, by me, duly sworn according
to law, doth on her oath make the following
declaration, in order to obtain the benefits of
the provisions made by the Act of Congress,
passed on the second day of February one thousand
Eight hundred and forty eight, granting
pensions to widows of persons who served during
the Revolutionary War. That she is the widow
of the identical George Mitchell deceased who was
a Private in the Army of the Revolution and
who drew a pension during his life time as
will more fully appear by a copy of her said
Deceased husbands Pension Certificate now
in her possession, and now here produced, of
which I certify the following to be a true
copy, very:

I certify that, in conformity with the law of
the United States of the 7th June 1832, George
Mitchell of the State of Kentucky who was a
Private in the Army of the Revolution, is
entitled to receive Sixty dollars and _____
cents, per annum, during his natural life;
commencing on the 1st of March, 1831, and
payable semi-annually on the 1st of March, and

that she was lawfully married to the said George
Mitchell, on the seventeenth day of June in the
year of our Lord one Thousand Seven Hundred
and Ninety-(1790), in the County of Woodford,
in the State of Kentucky, by the Rev. John Taylor
a Minister of the Gospel of the Baptist Denomina-
tion, that they lived together as such husband
and wife, from the time of marriage aforesaid
until his death, and that her name before
said marriage, was Elizabeth Watts, as will more
fully appear by an extract taken from the family
Bible now in her possession, and now here to me
produced, of which extract, (I certify the follow-
ing to be a true copy, except so much thereof as
is enclosed in Brackets, it being the date written,
Rev'd,

"George Mitchell and Elizabeth Watts married the
17th (Seventeenth) "day of June 1790" (Seventeen hun-
dred and Ninety) (I further certify that the)

(figures and writing prepared upon said Record)
(in a fair legible hand handwriting.)

Applicant further states, That she was not married to him prior to his leaving the service, but the marriage took place previous to the first of January seventeen hundred and ninety four, viz: at the time herein set forth. That she does not now know of any other proof going to establish the marriage except such as is herein given. That she and her said Husband resided in the State of Kentucky until in the Month of June or July, Eighteen hundred and forty three when they moved to Jackson County in the State of Missouri where they resided for the space of about two years, after which they moved to the County of Platte in the same state, viz: on or about the first of March eighteen hundred and forty five, where she affiant has resided ever since; That after residing in the last mentioned county for about three years her said Husband, George Mitchell, died, viz: on the fifth day of March Eighteen hundred and forty eight, as will more fully appear by an extract from the Family Bible as therein recorded (now here produced, of which I certify the following to be a true copy of the record, with the exception of so much of it, as is enclosed in brackets,) viz:

"George Mitchell died on the 5th (fifth) day of March A.D 1848. (Eighteen hundred and forty eight.)

Which will also further appear by the testimony of credible witnesses who know the fact.

Applicant further declares that she has

Never intermarried since the death of her said husband George Mitchell, and that she is still a widow. That the entry in the family Bible, Record, concerning the marriage she believes to be in the handwriting of her deceased husband, although she believes in his declining ^{yes}, he did not often make his signature by his own hand except by mark. That the family Bible has always been in the possession of the family, and is now in her possession. Affiant further states, that the matters and things as set forth in this Application are made according to the best of ^{her} knowledge and belief, and according to well founded information from time to time received, further she saith not.
