On this 27 day of May ¹⁸³³ personally before
the Common Court before the Clerk of the
Treasurer of the County Court of Washington County
now sitting Lorenzo Beam a resident of
the county of Washington & State of Kentucky
aged fifty years who being first
 duly sworn according to law avath on his oath
makes the following declaration in order to obtain
the benefit of the act of Congress passed June
7th 1832 That he entered the service of the
Revolutionary War under the following mamma
officer and served as him in that that
he entered in the County of Baltimore in
State of Maryland about seven miles from
the city of Baltimore under ~~Loyalist Regt~~ ^{Loyalist Regt}
on the 4th of July 1777 and was attached
to Capt Heylert a recruiting officer he
remained in Baltimore some short time
from there he made march to the
City of Philadelphia from thence form time
when we were attached to what was called
the 4th Battalion under the command
of Col. Whicker from Philadelphia we
made march into the State of New Jersey where
we remained until the Regt of the 75 of

December 1776 when we march to New
town there had rain & sleet out cloathing
was frozen to our back. he was in the
battle of Trenton. we took a large number
of prisoners. & arms & took full pay in this
action Col. Whisler despatched him more
than plena under the command of Col.
Hudson. in Capt. Hollands company he was
in the battle of Princeton & Princeton
area. Numerous other skirmishes also in
the latter at Germantown. he was after
wards attached to Gen. Sullivan brigade
and was discharged on the first of July 1780.
what a burst of three years that he
spent his country in the name of the
revolution his loss lost his discharge but
he states that he was honorably discharged
he was born in the state of Pennsylvania
in the county of Bucks he has no record of
his age he lives in the county of Baltimore
& State of Maryland where he resides in
the town of Hagerstown where he resides
until he re-moved to the state of Kentucky
about two years ago he enlisted as a soldier
for three years and served as long stated
in same form. by himself during terms
when he was in service he served as a
privat army the whole of his time. he know

If no one by whom he can prove
his services, but his brother Jacob Beam
he bears to vouch for my claim. That he
be given a pension or annuity except the present
and declare that his name is not on the
pension roll of the agency of Gary State. from
to and subscribe the day and year above
said.

that I am with a plantation under the above
name boone's Beam who have subscribe
and sworn to the above and being accu-
sation & known of my own knowledge that
he performed the services as stated in his

the revolution & is a man of good character
to be of the age he has stated & is a man
of good character & strict veracity.

That she has not intermarried but con-

tinues the widow of the above mentioned Conrad
Beau that she now resides in Marion
County State of Kentucky and has resided
there for the space of thirty odd years
past. She states that her husband the
said Conrad Beau was a private in the
Revolutionary war and that as his
widow she has heretofore filed her
declaration in the proper department
at Washington City accompanied with
satisfactory proofs to said department
of her right as said widow to have
and receive from the United States
a pension for life as the above cer=
tificate and the pension list will show.
She here refers to her said original
declaration and all the evidence
therewith filed to sustain her claim
to the benefits of the provision of the
act of 3rd March 1855 granting one
hundred and sixty acres of land to all
surviving widows of Revolutionary
soldiers. She therefore trusts that with
this declaration accompanied with
satisfactory proofs of her identity and
present widowhood that no further
evidence will be demanded as it
will not be in her power to produc
any more. She states that she
has never heretofore made any ap=br/>
plication for Bounty land and now
makes this declaration for the pur=br/>
pose of obtaining the bounty land to

which she may be entitled under the act
approved March 3rd 1855. Witness my

Jane Beam a resident of said County
and State of Kentucky aged seventy
years who being first duly sworn ac-
cording to law doth on her oath make the
following declaration in order to obtain
the benefit of the provision made by the
law of the United States passed on the 3^d
day of February 1853: That she is the
widow of Conrad Beam who was a
private soldier in the War of the Rev-
olution who was a Pensioner for a num-
ber of years before he died. He drew the sum
of eighty dollars ^{and 75 cents} annually from the
Pension Agent located at Lexington in
Kentucky at the time Her husband
was a resident of the then County of
Washington state of Kentucky
She further declares that she was married
to the said Conrad Beam on the 1st
day of November eighteen hundred and
twelve That her husband the aforesaid
Conrad Beam died on the 25th day of
October eighteen hundred and forty
that she was married to him at the time
above stated She further swears that she
was a widow at the passage of the said
act and is still a widow and that

she never before made application for a pension. Her memory is bad and the dates before given are to the best of her recollection. The marriage certificate from the Washington Co. Court will show the exact time of marriage which she cannot now remember. Her husband may have been known as Conrad Beams as he was often so called. She pray for the pension still due her late husband a balance she thinks due up to his death. Jane ^{Beams} ~~Beams~~
