On this 27 day of May ¹⁸³³ personally appeared in open court before the Honorable
Justices of the County Court of Washington County
now sitting Leonard Beam a resident of
the County of Washington & State of Kentucky
aged thirty — years who being first
duly sworn according to Law avowed on his oath
make the following declaration in order to obtain
the benefit of the act of Congress passed June
7th 1832 That he entered the service of the
United States under the following name a
private and served as such in that that
he entered in the County of Baltimore in
State of Maryland about seven miles from
the City of Baltimore under ^{Lieutenant Parker} ~~Lieutenant Parker~~
on the first of July 1777 and was attached
to Capt. Keyser a recruiting officer who
remained in Baltimore some short time
from thence we were marched to the
City of Philadelphia where some time
when we were attached to what was called
the 4th Battalion under the command
of Col. Whorick from Philadelphia we
were marched into the State of New Jersey where
we remained until the night of the 25th of

December 1776. When we march to Germantown there hail rain & sleet out of a storm began to our back. he was in the battle of Red Bank. we took a large number of prisoners & arms & the field being in this action Col. Wooster assisted we were then placed under the command of Col. Greiner. in Capt. Roberts company he was in the battle of Red Bank & Brandywine and numerous other skirmishes also in the battle at Germantown. he was afterwards attached to Gen. Sullivan's brigade and was discharged in the first of July 1780. making a period of three years that he served his country in the name of the revolution but has lost his discharge but he states that he was honorably discharged. He was born in the state of Pennsylvania in the county of Berks he has no record of his age he lived in the county of Baltimore & State of Maryland where he resided in the service of his country when he resided until he returned to the date of Kentucky during his year term he enlisted as a soldier for three years and served as a private he then served. In Washington during the war when he was in service he served as a private during the whole of his time. He was

to be of the age he has stated & is a man
of good character & of true veracity.

oaths in and for said County person-
ally appeared Jane Bean and made
oath in due form of law that she is
the identical person named in an
original Certificate in her possession
of which I certify the following is
a true Copy. Department of the

Interior - Widows Pension - I certify
that in conformity with the 2^d section
of the act of February 3. 1853.

Jane Bean widow of Conrad Bean
who was a private in the Revolution-
ary war is inscribed on the pension
list at the rate of eighty dollars
per annum commencing on the
3^d day of February 1853 and continuing
for life unless she should again marry
in which case the Pension is not pay-
able after the time of such marriage
given at the Department of the Interior

That she has not intermarried but con-

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tunes the widow of the above mentioned Conrad
Bean that she now resides in Marion
County State of Kentucky and has resided
there for the space of thirty odd years
past. She states that her husband the
said Conrad Bean was a private in the
Revolutionary war and that as his
widow she has heretofore filed her
Declaration in the proper Department
at Washington City accompanied with
satisfactory proofs to said Department
of her right as said widow to have
and receive from the United States
a pension for life as the above cer-
tificate and the Pension list will show
She here refers to her said original
Declaration and all the evidence
thereunto filed to sustain her claim
to the benefits of the provision of the
act of 9th March 1855 granting one
hundred and sixty acres of land to all
surviving widows of Revolutionary
Soldiers She therefore trusts that with
this Declaration accompanied with
satisfactory proofs of her identity and
present widowhood that no further
evidence will be demanded as it
will not be in her power to produce
any more. She states that she
has never heretofore made any ap-
plication for Bounty land and now
makes this Declaration for the pur-
pose of obtaining the bounty land to

which she may be entitled under the act
approved March 3rd 1855. Witness my

to be.

ding to law doth on her oath make the
following declaration in order to obtain
the benefit of the provision made by the
law of the United States passed on the 3^d
day of February 1853: That she is the
widow of Conrad Beam who was a

private soldier in the War of the Rev-
olution who was a Pensioner for a num-
ber of years before he died. He drew the sum
of eighty dollar ^{or sum} annually from the
Pension Agent located at Lexington in
Kentucky at the time Her husband
was a resident of the then County of
Washington State of Kentucky

She further declares that she was married
to the said Conrad Beam on the ~~15~~
day of ~~Nov~~ or December eighteen hundred and
twelve That her husband the ap^{pe}
Conrad Beam died on the 25th day of
October eighteen hundred and forty
that she was married to him at the time
above stated She further swears that she
was a widow at the passage of the said
act and is still a widow and that

she never before made application for a pension. Her memory is bad and the dates before given are to the best of her recollection. The marriage certificate from the Washington Co. Court will show the exact time of marriage which she cannot now remember. ~~And~~ the husband may have been pensioned as Conrad Beams as he was often so called. She prays for the pension still due her dead husband's balance she thinks due up to his death. Jane ^{the} Beams
