Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress of the 3^d Feb^y 1853.

Marion County }

On this ninth day of May 1853 personally appeared before me Mathew J. Crell Sole Presiding Judge of the Marion County Court for the State of Ky Masteress Susanna Spalding a resident of said County and State afo^r aged eightyone years who being duly sworn according to law doth on her oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed 3^d of February 1853. That she is the widow of George Spalding who was a private soldier in the Revolution. Said George Spalding was a pensioner from the tenth day of January 1825 until his death about the 22^d day of May 1842. Said Spalding drew sixty six dollars semi Annually at the Pension Office in ——— He resided at the time of the commencement of his pension in Washington County Ky and lived at his death in that part of Washington made Marion County since. She further states that she was married to said George Spalding on the 12^d day of June eighteen hundred and eleven by one Nathan W. Hall a minister

in the County of Washington State of
Ky that her said husband died on
the 22^d day of May 1849 that she
was married to him at the time
above stated She further swears
that she was a widow at the passing
of the act afo^r and is still a widow
and has never before made application
to the Department for a Pension
She states that she is blind and
helpless and it would be with the
greatest inconvenience if it could
be done at all for her to attend in
person in open Court.

State of Kentucky }
Marion County } J. Mathew J.
Circuit Judge of the County Court of
Marion County do certify that
I attended in person before the
above named applicant Susanna
Spalding at her residence in said
County and that the foregoing Decla-
ration or statement of facts
were twice read over carefully to the
said Susanna and the same ex-
plained to her in my presence
and she said she fully understood
the same and made solemn oath
before me to the facts as set forth
in said declaration on the said
ninth day of May 1852. I certify
further that she is blind and in
account of said blindness I did
not require her to subscribe to
the said Declaration I know her

personally to be in very needy circumstan-
ces and that she is entitled to full
faith and credit and that I believe
her to be the widow of said Spalding
as stated by herself. I have no interest
whatever in this claim and am in
no wise engaged in its prosecution.

On this 27th day of April 1855 personally appeared before me a Justice of the Peace within and for the County and State aforesaid, Susanna Spalding aged eighty years, a resident of Marion County in the State of Kentucky who being duly sworn according to law declares that she is the widow of George Spalding deceased, who was a private in the Revolutionary War, and who drew a pension from the United States, which pension certificate was numbered 19358.

She further states, that she was married to the said George Spalding about year 1805 by one Rev^d Nathaniel Hall, a copy of the certificate of said marriage duly authenticated is on file in Pension Department at Washington City where she made application for a pension which was granted her a copy of which is herewith annexed; And that her name before her said marriage was W^d Shattlesworth, and previous to that W^d Francis, and that previous to that Miss Susanna Sally; that her said husband George Spalding died in Marion County Ky on the 22nd day of May 1843. And that she is now a widow; She makes this declaration for the purpose of obtaining the Bounty land to which she may be entitled under the act approved March 3^d 1855.

Then County Court began and held for Washington
County at the Court house in Springfield on Monday the
tenth day of January in the year of our Lord one thousand
eight hundred and twenty five and of the common
wealth the 53rd before the Honorable Justices of said Court
George Spaulding an applicant for a pension under the laws of Congress of
the United States this day exhibited in Court his affidavit and a certificate of
his property and having made oath to the same the Court gave the report
thereon and ordered to Twenty eight dollars which is ordered to be recorded

On this tenth day of
January 1825 personally appeared in open Court
being a Court of Record for the County of said
George Spaulding aged sixty seven years resident in the
State of Kentucky who being first duly sworn accord-
ing to Law doth and he doth make the following
declaration in aid to obtain the provisions made
by the acts of the Congress of the 18th of March 1818
and the 1st of May 1820 that he the said Spaulding
entered for the term of nine months on the day
of in the year of in the State of
Maryland in the Company Commanded by Captain
Nicholas Mearns in the Regiment Commanded
by Colonel in the line of the State of
Maryland in the Continental establishment that
he continued to serve in the said Corps until
he was discharged from the said service on Pan-
month in some one of the New England States and
that he continued in the service for the term of
nine months that he was in the Battle of
on month and Panmer Town and that he has
no other evidence now in his power of his said
services except that he had been informed that it

appear from the records of the War Department of the
United States and in pursuance of the act of
the 1st of May 1820 I do solemnly swear that I was
a resident citizen of the United States on the 18th of
March 1818 and that I have not since that time
by gift sale or in any manner disposed of my prop-
erty in any part thereof with intent thereby to de-
franchise it is to bring myself within the provisions
of an act of Congress entitled an act to provide
for certain persons engaged in the land and naval
service of the United States in the Revolutionary
War passed on the 18th day of March 1818 and
that I have not nor has any person in kind for
me any property or securities contracts or debts
due to me nor have I any other income than what
is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and
by me subscribed One Horse more or less
One Old Table One Old Cupboard Two Old stools
One Old Stool and one chisel even and seven
s. shovels Two Old Hoes one one and one
shovel he is by profession a shoe maker but from
his age and infirmities he is incapable of working at it
to advantage that he has a wife who is also aged
and infirm and can contribute but little to their
support and that he is having no children now living
with him.

on Open Court this 10th day of January 1825

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War records of George Spalding, who served in the Maryland line.

The data contained herein were obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, W. 1952, based upon the military service of George Spalding, during the War of the Revolution. This is the record of the only George Spalding (Spaulding) that is found on file in the Revolutionary War records of this office.

The date and place of birth of this soldier are not shown in the claim, nor are the names of his parents given.

George Spalding enlisted in the state of Maryland, May 1, 1778, served as a private in Captain Nicholas Mangers' company in the 3rd Maryland regiment; he was in the battles of Bordentown and Monmouth, and was discharged February 19, 1779.

He was allowed pension on his application executed January 10, 1826, at which time he was aged sixty-seven years and living in Washington County, Kentucky.

George Spalding married June 12, 1811 in Washington County, Kentucky, Susanna Shuttlesworth (Shuttlesworth). He died May 22, 1843 in Marion County, Kentucky; which was formerly a part of Washington

County.

The widow, Susanna Spalding, was allowed pension on her application executed May 9, 1853, at which time she was aged about eighty years and a resident of Marion County, Kentucky.

She stated in 1855 that before her marriage to George Spalding she was "wd Shutlesworth and previous to that wd Francis, and that previous to that Miss Susanna Sally".

It is shown in 1825 that they had no children living with them. The widow, Susanna Spalding, died November 30, 1857.

Benjamin Spalding made affidavit in 1853 in Marion County, Kentucky, and Sam. Spalding was residing in 1855 in Marion County; their relationship to the family not stated.
