On this 6th day of October 1856, before the Marion County Court held within and for the County and State aforesaid personally appeared Richard Sutton aged fifty three years a resident of Marion County and State aforesaid who being duly sworn according to Law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefits of the provisions of the act of Congress of the 29th July 1848 entitled, "An act for the relief of certain surviving widows of officers and soldiers of the revolutionary army and for the benefits of any and all acts prior and subsequent thereto granting like pensions or enlarging the same." That he is the Administrator of Margaret Sutton deceased who was on the 4th day of March 1841 and for some years previous thereto a pensioner of the United States that said Margaret Sutton was at that time and so continued to be the widow of Richard Sutton deceased up to her death which took place on or about the 28th day of August 1854. He states that said Richard and Margaret Sutton were lawful man and wife at the death of said Richard Sutton and were married at — in this state

on or about the — day of — 18—

He states that she was pensioned as a revolutionary widow under the act of July 7th 1838, as the widow of her said husband Richard J. Sutton deceased who was also a Revolutionary Pensioner and was placed on the pension list on or about the 4th day of January 1834 and so

remained up to his death which took place on or
about the 23rd day of ~~August~~ 1838. Said Richard
F. Sutton and said Margaret Sutton both were pen-
sioned as the declarant believes and is informed
at the rates of eighty dollars per annum. He
states that they both lived in Marion County Ken-
tucky at the time of being placed on the list and
so continued until their deaths. He states that
said Margaret Sutton never applied for any
additional pension under any subsequent
act of Congress continuing the same to her
and others of her class of pensioners. He states
that she continued to reside in this County
until her death which took place on or
about the 28th August day of 1854 as before stated.
She never intermarried since the death of her
said husband Richard Sutton deceased. At
her death she left Polly Scott wife of Elyah
Scott of this County a daughter who was living
at her death and is still living and she left
another daughter Ginny Kendley who
lives in the State of Indiana unless now dead.
This affiant their son There comprise
all of her surviving children. He here refers
to and makes a part her of the former declar-
ation and accompanying affidavits proof and
other evidence of her right to pension under
the act of 7. July 1838. He supposes it
unnecessary to produce original evidence of
her marriage to Richard F. Sutton, as the same
is doubtless in the files of the department and
hopes they will suffice unless the rules of the
same forbid it. If required he will file the
same hereafter as an amendment hereto.

He thinks that Mr. Christopher Chen the Agent who procured her pension has filed in the original papers of her claim the original entry of their marriage taken out of the old family Bible as to the service of the said deceased pensioner

Richard J. Sutton he can make no suggestions and trusts that is not requisite. He makes this declaration in order to secure the benefit of the act of July 29th 1848 and the other acts above referred to for and on behalf of the said surviving children of said Margaret Sutton deceased

He hereby appoints Thomas C. Woods his true and lawful Attorney with power of Substitution to prosecute this his claim to receive the certificate when issued and to do all other acts necessary and proper in the premises Signed by me this the 6th day of October 1856. Richard Sutton

the 28th day of August 1854 in this County. And that Polly Scott wife of Elijah Scott Guiney kindly and Richard Sutton the foregoing affiant are the only surviving children of the aforesaid

On this 19th day of August 1840 Personally appeared before me the Ray a Justice of the peace in and for said County Margaret Sutton a resident of Marion County and State of Kentucky aged seventy eight years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on her oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed July 7th 1838 entitled, An act granting half pay and pensions to certain widows, That she is the widow of Richard Sutton who was a soldier in the Revolutionary war and a pensioner on the Roll of the Kentucky agency and drew Eighty dollars per Annum for his services. She further declares that she was married to the said Richard Sutton on the 16th day of April Seventeen hundred and Eighty Three (1783) Near Redstone old fort in the State of Pennsylvania County not recollecting by a legal trial, She does not know of any record of her marriage except the family record kept in her Bible which she will have filed with this declaration. She further declares that her husband the aforesaid Richard Sutton died on the twenty third day of December Eighteen hundred and Thirty seven (1837) that she was not married to him prior to his leaving the service but the marriage took place previous to the first of January seventeen hundred and eighty four viz at the time above stated

The deposition of Richard Sutton a resident of Marion County Ky taken this 19th day of August 1840 to be read as evidence in favour of the application of Mrs Margaret Sutton for a pension, Dependent being thirty seven years old Dependent that he is the son of Richard Sutton deceased and Margaret the applicant for a pension, Dependent further stating

that he knew his Father the aforesaid Richard F. Sutton was a pensioner on the Roll of the Kentucky agency and drew Eighty dollars per annum as a pensioner; he further saith that the said Richard F. Sutton died in the County of Madison Ky on the Twenty third day of December Eighteen hundred and thirty seven, And that his Mother the aforesaid Margaret Sutton drew the annuity due her husband from the 4 Sept 1837 until the 23rd day December 1837 Depoent further saith that his Mother the aforesaid Margaret Sutton has remained unmarried and a widow ever since the death of the aforesaid Richard F. Sutton to the present period, Depoent further saith that, is shown his Father's family Bible on one leaf of which is the family record of the said Richd and F. Sutton which record commences in these words Viz Richd F. Sutton and Margaret Elap was married the 16th of April 1783 And then the said Record commences with the age of the said Richard F. Sutton & Margaret's children which record the Depoent has caused to be marked A and makes part of his deposition The said family record is in the hand writing of his Father the aforesaid Richard F. Sutton and was in the possession of the said Richard F. Sutton until his death after his death it was sold at the sale of the said Suttons property and was purchased by James Scott and has been in his possession ever since And further saith Not

On this 27th of August 1832 personally appeared in open Court, before the County Court of Washington, now sitting, Richard F. Sutton, a resident of the County & State aforesaid, aged twenty six years, who being first ^{duely} sworn according to Law, doth in his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832 - That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers & served as herein stated: In the year 1773, in the month of May he enlisted under Capt. Andrew Wallis & continued under James Thompson in General Scotts Brigade of the 12th Regiment of Virginia, under Col. James Wood that at the time he entered the service, he resided in Augusta County Virginia - he states that he marched from the mouth of the ~~Roanoke~~ ^{Shenandoah} through Stanton & Mencks - Va & marched on till he joined the main army at a place called The Trap, not far from the School-hills - that the 3^d day after he joined the main army the battle at Germantown was fought & that he was engaged in that battle & the following winter he encamped with the army at Valley Forge & that some time the following summer he joined the infantry under Capt. Robert Gambill, under General Wayne, & that he was engaged in the battle at

Stony Point — He states that he left the service
of the United States in the year 1780, having been in
the service about ~~three~~ years; he states that he has
no documentary evidence, & that he knows of no
person whose testimony he can procure, who can
testify to his services — he states that in the month
of February 1789, his house was consumed by fire
& that his discharge from General Scott & all
his other papers were burnt — at that time
he lived in Nelson county Kentucky

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension
or annuity except the present, & declares that his name
is not on the pension roll of the agency of
any state

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter relative to soldiers of the Revolutionary War.

As a means of identifying the particular record of James Wood, in whom you are interested, should it be on file, as much as possible of the following data are essential: approximate dates of birth and death, places of residence at enlistment and after service and given name of widow.

The data contained herein were obtained from the papers on file in the Revolutionary War claim for pension, W. 9322, based upon the military service in that war of Richard F. Sutton.

The date and place of birth and the names of the parents of Richard F. Sutton are not shown.

While a resident of Augusta County, Virginia, Richard F. Sutton enlisted in May 1777, served about three years as private in Captains Andrew Wallace's and Robert Gamble's Companies, Colonel James Wood's Virginia Regiment and was in the battles of Brandywine, Germantown, wintered at Valley Forge and was at the Storming of Stony Point.

In 1789, he was living in Nelson County, Kentucky.

He was allowed pension on his application executed August 27, 1832, at which time he was aged seventy-six years and a resident of Washington County, Kentucky.

He died December 23, 1837, in Marion County, Kentucky.

Soldier married April 16, 1783, in Pennsylvania, about ten miles from Redstone Old Fort on the Monongahela River, Margaret or Margret Glass.

Soldier's widow, Margaret or Margret Sutton was allowed pension on her application executed June 3, 1839, at which time she was about seventy-eight years old and a resident of Marion County, Kentucky.

She died August 28, 1854, in Marion County, Kentucky.

The names of the following children of soldier and Margaret or Margret are shown:

The only children living in 1856 were: Richard Sutton residing in Marion County, Kentucky, Maray or Polly Scott, wife of Elijah Scott, of Marion County, Kentucky, and Jain or Jinney Kindley residing in Indiana, place not given.

One James Scott was living in 1840, his residence, age or relationship to the family not stated. There are no further family data.
