and that he shall pay to my beloved daughter Elizabeth the Miller  
Lesna<sup>s</sup> - 500 dollars each and that he shall  
will have one bed bedstead and furniture - 3<sup>rd</sup> I will and bequeath to my  
beloved daughter Nancy Lesna one bureau colt and cow 4<sup>th</sup> -  
I will and bequeath to my beloved grand daughter Elizabeth Be-  
- anyman one bed bedstead and bedclothes 5<sup>th</sup> I will and bequeath  
to my beloved daughter Joanna Boyd one cether press there being  
many other articles not named above I will that that they should  
be divided amongst my children - as they think best except  
the farming utensils and cupboard and half the furniture I give  
to my Son Dr. J. Lesna the other half to my daughter Nancy  
I make and appoint my beloved Son Robert J. my sole  
Execution to this my last will and testament Signed
