I Wallace Hopkins of Multlenburg County & State of Kentucky
being sick & weak in body but of sound mind & calling to mind the
uncertainty of human life, do hereby make my last Will & Testament
as follows (viz) 1st I desire that all my perishable property be imme-
diately sold after my decease and out of the moneys arising there-
from all my just debts & funeral expenses be paid - 2^{ndly} after
the payment of my debts & funeral expenses I give to my wife
Sally Hopkins all my real & personal estate during her widow-
hood except what is hereafter disposed of & desire her to give my
children a liberal education - After the death or marriage
of my wife I desire all my estate both real & personal to be
equally divided among my children which I give to them
their heirs Executors Administrators & assigns forever -
3^{rdly} I give to my sister-in-law Mrs. Mary McDaniel a certain field
supposed to be seven or eight acres lying on the west side
of my plantation binding on a small branch also five acres
of wood land adjoining the field all of which I give her
during her widowhood or untill my children all become
to mature age - and lastly I do hereby appoint my friend
& neighbour John M. Goodman executor of this my last
will & testament, hereby revoking all other or former
wills or testaments by me heretofore made - In
witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & affixed
my seal this 30th day of September 1835
