

Nuncupative will of James Stewart deceased
 memorandum - That on the 12th day of Dec^r
 in the year 1842, James Stewart of the County of
 Muhlenburg being sick of the sickness whereof
 he died on the same day at his habitation where
 he had resided for the last four years, did make
 and declare his last will & Testament nuncupative
 in these words of the like substance that is to say
 I give and bequeath unto my son Duncan
 Stewart all my interest in the present of corn
 tobacco &c. and in like manner, I wish my 2
 cows and 2 young steers & one two year old filly
 all of which I wish to be sold equally divided
 amongst my other children, namely Temperance
 & Hannah, Elizabeth Whitmer, Melinda Bane,
 and Mary Shank, these words or the like effect
 the said James Stewart deceased in the presence of
 the subscribers, with the intention that the same
 should be his last will & Testament whereof
 is desired them to bear testimony which we
 reduce to writing this 16th day of Dec^r 1842
