

On this 1st day of May 1818, before me the subscriber, one of the
Judges of the Court of Common Pleas — — — — —
personally appeared James Ball aged 69
years, resident in Fayette City, in the said district, who being by me first duly
sworn, according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain
the provision made by the late act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons
engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war." That he,
the said James Ball enlisted in 1776 in the state of
Virginia Hampshire in the company commanded by Captain William
of the 10th Virginia Cavalry
Company raised by Colo. James Wood ; that he continued to
serve in the said corps or in the service of the United States until the 1779 for
three years, when he was discharged from service in Frederick Town
state of Maryland, that he was in the battles of Brandywine
and Germantown and at Stony Point — — — — —
and rec'd two wounds at the battle of Brandywine
and that he is in reduced circumstances, and stands in need of the assistance of his country for
support; and that he has no other evidence now in his power of his said services. but Christopher
Dudley whom appears to be his taken
Swear to and declared before me, the day and year aforesaid.

I, Benjamin Johnson, Judge, &c. as aforesaid, do certify, that it appears
to my satisfaction, that the said James Ball did serve in the
revolutionary war, as stated in the preceding declaration, against the common enemy, for the
term of nine months, on the continental establishment; and I now transmit the proceedings and
testimony taken and had before me, to the Secretary for the Department of War, pursuant to
the directions of the aforementioned act of Congress.

Be it remembered that on the 14th day of May
1821 James Ball made his appearance in open Court
and produced a schedule of his property amount-
ing to Fifty six dollars agreeable to an act of
legis. of the first of May 1820 concerning
pensions which is ordered to be entered of-
ficed in these words Yoncall. District of Kentucky
Owen County on the 14th day of May 1821.

Personally appeared in open Court being a Court
of Record for the said District and County of
Owen County James Ball aged 70 years residing
in Owen County in said District who being
first duly sworn according to law doth on his
oath declare that he served in the Revolutionary
War as follows, that he enlisted in Captain
William Woff's Company in the 7th Virginia
Regiment commanded by Colonel James
Wood, that he enlisted in Hampshire County
State of Virginia in 1776 for three years that he
served in said Regiment until he was trans-
ferred to the 8th Virginia Regiment commanded
by Colonel Abraham Bowman and his cap-
tain was Robert Gamble, that he served near
four years on the continental line and was
discharged by Colonel Webb at Frederick Town
and Frederick County State of Maryland, thence
he drew a pension and the number of his
pension certificate 2525. And I do solemnly
swear that I am a resident of the

United States Court the 18th day of March 1818 and
that I have not since that time by gifts, sales or in
any manner disposed of my property or any part
thereof with intent thereby to deprive me of it
or to bring myself within the provisions of an
act of Congress entitled an act to provide for
certain persons engaged in the land and naval
service of the United States in the Revolution
War" passed on the 18th day of March 1818.
And that I have not made any provision in
trust for me any property or securities contracts
or debts due to me nor have I any income
other than what is contained in the schedule
hereunto annexed and by me subscriber and

This affiant who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following statements that he is the son of James Ball & Margaret Ball that he has always understood and believes he was born in the year 1787 and that his father and mother had three other children that are older than himself that his eldest brother now lives in Jefferson County Kentucky and James Ball in Mellon County Kentucky and that his father was a revolutionary pensioner of the United States and that he died on the 29 day of March 1800 this affiant will further state that he has always from his earliest recollection heard his Father and mother say they were married before he enlisted in the service of the United States.

Dear Madam:

The data which follow in regard to James Ball were obtained from the claims for pension on file under W. 8336, based upon his service in the Revolutionary War.

The date and place of birth of James Ball and names of his parents were not given.

James Ball enlisted in Hampshire County, Virginia, in 1776, served as a private in Captain William Vose's company, Colonel James Wood's 12th Virginia Regiment, and in Captain Robert Gamble's company, 8th Virginia Regiment, was in the battle of Brandywine in which he received two wounds, details of which were not given, in the battles of Germantown and Stony Point, and served until the close of the war, nearly four years in all.

The soldier was allowed pension on his application executed May 1, 1818, at which time he was aged sixty-nine years and a resident of Fayette County, Kentucky. In 1821, he had moved to Owen County, that state, and died in Owen County, Kentucky, March 27, 1830.

James Ball married in May, 1771 or 1772, in Hampshire County, Virginia, Margaret Bray; the date and place of her birth and names of parents are not shown. At the time of their marriage they were both living in Hampshire County, Virginia.

Margaret Ball was allowed pension on account of the service of her husband, James Ball, on her application executed September 2, 1836, at which time she was aged eighty-three years and living in Owen County, Kentucky. She died August 29, 1842, leaving a large family of children, some of whom were living in Owen County, some in Nelson County, and others scattered in other states not designated.

In 1836, Margaret Ball's sister, Jane Dewitt, widow of Peter Dewitt to whom she was married in July, 1774, in Hampshire County, Virginia, was then living in Clark County, Kentucky, aged eighty-one years.
