On this 16th day of August 1832
personally appeared in open Court before
The^{re} M. H. Kay Circuit Judge of Ouer County
now sitting

John Bonds a resident of the
County of Owen and State of over said aged
Sixty nine years of age who being first
duly sworn according to law doth on his
oath make the following ^{declaration} in order to ob-
tain the benefit of the act of Congres
passed June 4th 1832

That he enlisted in the army
of the United States in the year 1779 with
Captain Greer and served in the 4th or fifth
Regiment Continental line under the following
named officers:

That he enlisted as a Soldier
of the revolutionary army in the year 1779
as he thinks in the County of King William
near Todd's Bridge in said County State of
Virginia for he and during the war that
had then been going on ^{upwards} three years.

that when he enlisted his Captain was by the
name of William Greer Thomas Greer that
Captain Greer's Company marched to Williams-
burgh where he rendezvoused at that place,
and formed a portion of Col Porterfield's
Regiment which Regiment he thinks was the fourth
or fifth Regiment from Williamsburgh the
Regiment to which I belonged marched to Camden
in the State of South Carolina - that he was
then formed a portion General Gates Brigade
that at this time his Regiments name was McGill
that he was in the battle of Gates defeat

where Col Porterfield fell, that from
Camden in South Carolina Col Porterfield's
Regiment, marched the remainder of them
which was about 50 in number, marched
to the City of Richmond in the State of
Virginia, that from this place he marched
to various places, ultimately he landed at
Point York of James River, where he was
taken prisoner by the British, that
when he was taken prisoner he was comm-
anded by Capt. Ewell ^{the remainder of} Said Ewell's &
Drago Company having formed Ewell's
that from said Point York he marched
as a prisoner to Richmond Va from
Richmond to Williamsburgh which was
then the seat of Government of Va, from
there they were marched to James Town,
there they were exchanged and became
again to my nation his army, after the
Battle that Gen Wayne had given the
British, and taken some prisoners from
them, that whilst he was in the custody
of the British he had the small pox
and when he was exchanged he went into
the Hospital, that he remained there about
two months, that he then went home
on furlough for sixty days, given to
him by Col Ennis, that after the sixty days
was out he went into the service under
Capt. Ewell from there at Richmond
from there they marched to Williams-
burgh, where he remained until the siege
of York the conclusion of the war,

that Captain Powell's Company was deputed
to guard the Barracks at Williamsburgh, that
after the Siege of York Col Innis gave
him a discharge from the Service of
the United States at Williamsburgh.

That he has no documentary evidence of the
aforesaid Services, that he knows of no
one by which he can prove the per-
formance of the aforesaid Services except
Robert Bond whose deposition is hereto
annexed.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever
to a pension or annuity except the present,
and he declares that his name is not in
the Pension Roll of any agency of any
State in the Union.

State of Kentucky Grant County Sch

On this eleventh day of April AD One thousand eight hundred and fifty three, personally appeared before the Presiding Judge of the Grant County Court and in open Court, Mrs Joannah Bond, a resident of the said County of Grant and State of Kentucky aged Fifty nine years, who being first duly sworn according to Law, doth on her oath make the following Declarations, in order to obtain the benefits of the provisions made by the act of Congress passed July 4th 1836, and the act of Congress, approved July 7th 1838, entitled "An act granting half pay and Pensions to Certain widows" also of the act of Congress approved March 3^d 1843, and the act approved June 17th 1844, entitled "an Act to Continue the pensions of Certain widows" also the act approved February 2^d 1848, Entitled "an act making further provisions for Surviving widows of the Soldiers of the Revolution" also of the act approved July 29th 1848, Entitled "an act for the relief of Certain Surviving widows of Officers and Soldiers of the Revolutionary army" also of the act approved February 3^d 1853, Entitled "an act to Continue half pay to Certain widows and orphans."

That she is the widow of John Bond deceased who was a Revolutionary Pensioner of the United States, and who was a private in said Revolutionary War in the Virginia Troops, but whether her said deceased husband was a Militiaman or in the regular service she cannot state, but she believes he was attached to the Militia. Neither is she now able to state the precise time of her said deceased husband's service nor the names of the Officers under whom he served, he however, was as she believes in the service in said Revolutionary war for a period of two years or more, and

for his said services as aforesaid drew a pension from the 4th of March 1831 until his death of Eighty Dollars for annum. for the time and place of her said deceased husband's service she refers to the papers on file in the Pension office. in the application of the said John Bond for a Pension. and asks that the same may be taken and considered as part hereof. at least so far as to show the time place and length of service of her said deceased husband in the said Revolutionary War. She further declares that she was married to the said John Bond on the Eleventh day of July A.D. 1813. in the County of Gallatin and State of Kentucky by the Rev John Scott. a Minister of the Baptist denomination. That her said husband the said John Bond died in the County of Owen and state of Kentucky on the Twelfth day of March 1842.

That her name before her marriage with the said John Bond was Jounnah Holaday. And that since the death of her said husband she has and still remains unmarried and his widow.

Who being duly sworn, declares
that she is the widow of John
Bond deceased, who was a
private in Company -
in the - Regiment -
in the Revolutionary War, as will
appear by reference to the Muster
Rolls. That her said Husband
was a Pensioner -
She further states that she was
married to the said John Bond
in Gallatin County Kentucky on
or about the 11th day of July - 1813
by one John Scott a Minister
of the Gospel, and that her
name before her marriage was
Joana Halliday. That her
Husband died in Green County
Kentucky on the 12th day of March
1842. And that she is now
a widow.
She makes this declaration for the
purpose of obtaining the Bounty
land to which she may be entitled

under the act of March the 3^d 1855-
and she refers to her declaration
under the 2^d section of the act
of February the 3^d 1853 for a
Pension, and under which
she now draws a Pension
for the services of the services
rendered by her deceased husband
&c. The Pension drawn
by the applicant is \$80 per year.
She states that she never has
received any bounty land
or known that she was entitled
to any except as above stated.

Dear Madam:

I advise you from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, W. 5225, it appears that John Bond (pensioned Bonds), while residing in King William County, Virginia, enlisted about 1779, served as a private in Captain Thomas Drew's Company, Colonel Porterfield's Virginia Regiment and under Captain Ewell and Colonel Innis in the Virginia Troops, was in the battle of "Gates Defeat", was taken prisoner on the James River, later exchanged and returned to his company, was a guard at the barracks at Williamsburg during the siege of Yorktown and served to the close of the war.

He was allowed pension on his application executed June 1, 1829, at which time he was sixty-six years of age and resided in Owen County, Kentucky.

He died March 12, 1842, in Owen County, Kentucky.

The soldier married July 11, 1813, in Gallatin County, Kentucky, Joannah Holladay.

She was allowed pension on her application executed April 11, 1853, at which time she was fifty-nine years of age and a resident of Grant County, Kentucky. In 1873, she was living in Owenton, Owen County, Kentucky.

There is no reference to children.

In 1853, Warren Bond, aged twenty-three years, was a resident of Grant County, Kentucky, and in 1872, Bluford

Bond was a resident of Owen County, Kentucky, relationship of the above noted to John and Jeannah Bond not shown.
