On this 3 day of June 1833 personally appeared in open Court before the Justice of the Owen County Court now sitting Hugh Conway a resident of the said County of Owen in the State of Kentucky aged twenty years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed 7<sup>th</sup> June 1832

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated. that is to say being a resident of the County of Washington in the State of Pennsylvania he did on the day of August in the year 1778 as well as he now remembers being then a little over fifteen years of age enter the service of the United States as a ~~drafted~~ ~~recruited~~ volunteer soldier upon a tour of four months in the Company of Capt. John Minter and served there in accordingly during the whole of his said tour of four months - that he rendezvoused with his said Company at the house of a Mr. Blackstone in the County in which he lived and was attached to a regiment under the command of Col. John Stinson - that he was marched from his said place of Rendezvous to Pittsburgh and thence down the Ohio to an old French Town and there built a fort was built - from thence he was marched across the river Ohio into the present State of West Virginia to a place called Luccaraw where another fort was constructed and at which last place he remained till the expiration of his said tour of duty which was for four months as aforesaid and after having faithfully served out the same he was discharged and returned home -

He recollects upon this tour to have seen Genl Washington

He further declares that being still a resident of the said County of Washington Pennsylvania he did on the day of July 1779 as well as he now remembers again enter the service of the United States as a substitute

for one William McIntyre who had been drafted  
as a private Militia soldier upon a tour of two months  
in the Company of Captain Rice that he did  
serve accordingly in the place and stead of said Mc-  
Intyre and as his substitute in the said company during  
the whole of said tour - that he rendezvoused with his  
Company at the house of Col. Edmund Cooke in the  
County in which he the declarant resided and was  
marched from thence to Hamak's Lick on the water  
of the Allegany river and was there kept stationed  
in order to assist in protecting the Country against  
the incursions of the Indians they being very hostile &  
troublesome and the Country a frontier one - that  
at the expiration of his said term of service it being  
two months he was discharged and returned home  
he states that upon this tour he was under the com-  
mand of a captain only there being no field officers  
where he was kept in service -

He further states and declares that about the  
day of February in the year 1780 as well as he now re-  
members he again entered the service of the United States  
as a volunteer Spy, against the Indians, upon a tour  
of six months under Captain John Shear - that he  
did serve accordingly as an Indian Spy under him  
for the said term of six months - that the said service  
required the visiting various posts in that section of  
Country and sometimes occupying them to wit, Duff's  
Blockhouse, Raybourn's fort, Widow Myers fort on  
Turtle Creek, Halltown's fort and Hamak's Lick, that  
his duties as an Indian Spy aforesaid during his  
said engagement also compelled him to traverse a  
large tract of Country bordering on the Allegany River  
- that he was actually and actively engaged in the per-  
formance of his duty under the said engagement during

the whole period thereof to not six months and upon  
the termination of the said periods of service he returned  
to his home

He further states and declares that on the day  
of September in the year 1780 as well as he now rereme-  
bers he again entered the service of the United States  
as a private volunteer soldier upon a tour of two  
months in the Company of Capt. Laughey - that he was  
still a resident of the same County and State and was  
Marched by his Captain to a small fort, called fort  
Wallace on the waters of the Alleghany river - that he  
was there kept stations during the whole of his said  
tour and whilst there the fort was attacked by the  
Indians but they were repelled the action was a  
slight one the Indians being as this declarant sup-  
poses unaware of the number of the fighting men  
in it until after they made their attack - he states  
that there were two other Captains in the fort besides  
the one that commanded his Company to wit Capt.  
Kingston and Capt. Wallace but that there were no field  
officers or regular officers of any grade

He further states that on the day of March 1780  
as well as he recollects he again entered the service  
of the United States as a drafted Militia man and  
private soldier upon a tour of two months in the  
Company of Captain John Shear and served accom-  
plisly during the whole of his said tour - that he  
Marched with his said Company to Pittsburg where  
he was kept during his said tour and at the expira-  
tion of his tour was discharged and returned home  
- that there were no field officers with the troops where  
he served on this tour -

He further states and declares that in the month of  
January - 1783 he moved to Kentucky and settled  
in the present County of Nelson he believes this afternoon

County and soon afterward he thinks in the month of March in the same year he entered the service of the United States as a volunteer Indian Spy under Major Quill Whitaker for the term of six months and did serve as such accordingly - that his range as a spy during said period was through the present counties of Shelby, Henry, Calhoun, Clinch & Boone and on the waters of the big & little N. Y. to the Ohio river - he states that he served out the whole period of his said engagement fully and faithfully & was in actual service during the whole period thereof & then returned to his home -

He states that from his advanced age and consequent loss of memory he is unable to state with precision and certainty the periods when he entered the service - but from his present best recollection he served in the manner and at the times above mentioned and that he did not serve less than six months as a volunteer soldier - two months as a drafted Militia man - two months as a substitute for McIntyre and 10 months as an Indian Spy during the revolutionary war amounting in all to twenty two months period - He states that he has no documentary evidence and that he does not know of any person whose testimony he can procure who can testify to his said service or any part of it - He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any state -

Interrogatories put to the above named applicant by the Court

1st Where and in what year were you born

Answer. I was born in the County of \_\_\_\_\_ in the state of Pennsylvania in the year 1765 according to my information on the subject.

2<sup>d</sup>. Have you any record of your age and if so where is it.

Answer. I have no particular record of my age any further than that handed to me by tradition.

3<sup>d</sup>. Where were you living when called into service; where have you lived since the revolutionary war and where do you now live?

Answer. ~~Recently~~ I was living in the then County of Huntingdon as well as I remember in the forks of the Connoquenessing river in the state of Pennsylvania during the revolution up to the year 1783 when I came to sky. and became a resident of what was then called Jefferson County I think now Nelson County - ~~as all day~~ when I entered the service in all my tours prior to 1783 I was a resident of the said County of Washington Penn. When I was called into service in 1783 I was then a resident of sky. in the then County of Jefferson now Nelson - since the revolution I continued to reside for some years in Nelson County Pa. and then moved to Allegheny County sky. where I continued to live for about 19 years and then moved ~~gathered now~~ to Owen County Ky. in the year 1808 - and have continued to live in the same county ever since.

4<sup>th</sup>. How were you called into the service; were you drafted, did you volunteer, or were you a substitute; and if a substitute for whom?

Answer. In all the service which I performed I was a volunteer except upon two of my tours for two months each, in one of which I was drafted and in the other I was a substitute for one William Medley who had been drafted.

5<sup>th</sup>. State the names of some of the regular officers who were with the troops where your service such continental and militia regiments as you can recollect and the general circumstances of your services.

Answer. There were no regular officers ~~with~~ with the troops where I served neither more there any continental or militia regiments ~~with the troops~~ - I did not serve ~~with~~

with under a colored except upon my first tour. My services were confined to the small posts on the frontier and to the spying out the Indians and preventing their incursions upon the frontier settlement - I was one month a volunteer soldier, two months a drafted militia man and two months a substitute for William Medbury and six months an Indian Spy whilst I resided in Pennsylvania during the revolution and I was an Indian Spy for six months in Ky. during the revolution all which services I performed fully and faithfully - I was in a small battle with the Indians at fort Wallace in Penn. which was the only action I was engaged in during the revolution

6th Did you ever receive a discharge from the service and if so by whom was it given and what has become of it?

Answer - I never received any discharge in writing -  
7th State the names of persons to whom you are known in your present neighbourhood and who can testify as to your character for veracity and their belief of your services as a soldier and an Indian Spy of the revolution

Answer I will name Hugh Montgomery, Doctor Brown & H. Vallandigham as persons to whom I am known and who reside in my neighbourhood

Vallandigham residing in the same county State hereby certify that we are well acquainted with Hugh Conway who has subscribed and sworn to the above declaration, that we believe him to be seventy years of age; that he is reputed and

and believed in the neighbourhood where he resides to have been a soldier and an Indian Spy of the revolution and that we concur in that opinion
