In this State of Kentucky dated the  
fourth day of April one thousand eight  
hundred and forty five before me  
one of the circuit judges for  
the District of Franklin and  
State of Kentucky Job Garvey  
a居民 of Gallatin County  
and State of Kentucky  
fifty eight years and nine  
years of marriage Declarative  
on oath he doth say and declare to be  
true a Punishment under the  
Act of laying up passed the  
11th of March 1816 for the  
offense of privateers not affording  
in the last and was so done  
during the Revolution  
Job Garvey states he was  
enlisted in Westmoreland City  
Virginia about the year 1777  
and under Col Richard Barnett  
in the fifth Virginia Regiment.

for two Years and then reentered  
under Capt. Harry Tonning  
for three Years in the Fifth  
Assassins Regt and was discharged  
in 1782 at Fredericks  
burgh Virginia by Capt.  
Tonning and then afterward  
recruited for eighteen months  
under Capt. Warman making  
his whole service five Years  
as a Major in Fredericks  
burgh the Revolution & eighteen  
months as a Lieutenant making  
his whole service six years  
and a half. He further  
states that he was in the  
battle of Monmouth at  
the taking of a fort called  
"Doubles Hook" near New York,  
<sup>near</sup> in the Siege of Lancaster

and at the side of York  
and there is a Merrick who  
gets with any way  
at the "Indians" near  
Jacksonville  
that he is old and infirm  
and now in reduced cir-  
-cumstances in life and  
stands in need of the  
affectionate care of his country  
and that he has received no pension  
for support and therefore has  
a pension and further that  
he has friends now in his home  
of this service besides  
the off-duty of Woodstock  
Daily been anxious  
to sit under my hand the  
day & year past above  
written

wants and doth take the benefit of an Act of  
Congress of the 7th July 1838 entitled an Act Grant-  
ing half Pay and Pensions to Certain Middle-  
aged Men & their Dependents.

On this day personally app-  
eared before me the undersigned a native of  
the former and for the County aforesaid  
Elizabeth Garry a Resident of the County of  
Pike State of Kentucky aged 72 years who  
being first duly sworn according to Law doth  
make out and make the following Declaration  
in order to attain the benefit of the Provisions  
made by the act of Congress passed July 7<sup>th</sup>  
1838 Entitling an Act Granting half Pay and  
Pensions to certain Middle-aged Men who is the widow  
of Lot Garry who was a Private Soldier on  
the Virginia Line during the War of the  
Revolution and was placed on the Pension  
roll in Gallatin County Kentucky under  
the Law of Congress March the 18<sup>th</sup> 1818 and was  
in a short time discharged from the Pension  
roll in consequence of his Property being too much  
Proerty and she refers to the papers on file  
for evidence of his services She was married  
as she further declares to the said Lot  
Garry in Richmond County Virginia by  
on the seventh day of ~~January~~ <sup>February</sup> eighteen hundred  
and Eighty One and her husband aforesaid  
Lot Garry died on the twentieth day of  
January 1827 and she was NOT married to  
him prior to his leaving the services but  
the marriage took place previous to the first  
of January eighteen hundred and Ninety four  
1894 at the time above stated and she has rem-  
ained a widow ever since the death of her  
husband the said Lot Garry as will more  
fully appear by Reference to the proof herto  
 annexed and she presents her family record

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your request for the Revolutionary War record of Job Garvey.

The data furnished herein were obtained from papers on file in the pension claim, N. 8839, based upon the military service of Job Garvey, the only soldier by that name that is found in the Revolutionary War records of this office.

Job Garvey enlisted in Westmoreland County, Virginia, about 1777, served as private in Captain Richard Barnett's and Henry Fountleroy's Virginia companies; was in the battles of Monmouth, Paulus Hook, in the siege of Charleston and the siege of Yorktown and was in a skirmish with the Indians near Savannah, Georgia, under General Anthony Wayne and was discharged in 1782. He later enlisted and served eighteen months in Captain Warman's Virginia company.

He was allowed pension on his application executed October 26, 1818, while a resident of Gallatin County, Kentucky, then aged fifty-eight years.

He died January 20, 1827.

This soldier married February 7, 1781, in Richmond County, Virginia, Elizabeth, her maiden name not given.

She was allowed pension on her application executed September 13, 1838, while a resident of Owen County, Kentucky, at which time she was seventy-two years of age.

One Jeremiah Garvey was justice of peace in Owen County, Kentucky, in 1838, no relationship stated.
