District of Kentucky

On this 19th of October 1818 before me,
the subscriber, one of the Judges for the District
aforesd. personally appeared John Guille aged 60
years resident in Scott County and District aforesd
who being by me first duly sworn according to
Law, Dothethen ~~and~~ his Oaths make the following Decla-
-rations in order to obtain the Pardon made by
the late act of Congress intituled an act to
provide for certain persons engaged in the land
and naval service of the United States in the
Revolutionary war. That the said John
Guille enlisted in the month of March 1777 in
the State of Virginia in the company company
commanded by Captain John Thacker in the
1st Virginia Regiment commanded by Col.
Robert Lawson in Genl. Charles Scotts Brigade
for the term of three years and was discharged
in the month of July 1780 at Alexandria
State of Virginia: that he served the above men-
-tioned time as a Regular Soldier in the United
States service, that he was in the battles of
Brandy wine, Germantown & Monmouth, that
he is in reduced circumstances and stands in
need of the assistance of his country for support

and that he has no other evidence now in his
power save what he here offers of his said
service Sworn to and declared before
me this day and year aforesaid

This Day Lee Bird aged 33 years personally
appeared before me his undersigned and
made oath that he has known the
said John Guell since his youth and that
said Guell left his residence aforesaid to go into
the army as a regular soldier for 3 years
and he knows he ~~has~~ served the said
time witness my hand this 19th of Octr
1818

I Benj. Johnson Judge &c as aforesaid
do certify that it appears to my satisfaction that
the said John Guell did serve in the Revolutionary
war as stated in the preceding declaration against
the common enemy for the term of nine months
on the Continental establishment and that he is
in reduced circumstances and I now transmit
the proceedings and evidence before me to the
Secretary for the Department of War pursuant
to the act of Congress witness my hand this 19th
of Octr 1818

John Quite a citizen of this County and a
Soldier of the Revolution appeared in Court and
produced a schedule of his property amounting
to \$1420 50 cents and having sworn that
it was true to be recorded, which follows
in these words To wit:

This Court has the power to fine and im-
prison and by act of Assembly made a Court
of record and of unlimited Jurisdiction.

On this 11th day of November 1812 personally
appeared in open Court being a Court of record
for the said District and Circuit of Common Pleas
John Quite aged 64 years Resident in said
County in said District who being first duly
Sworn according to Law doth on his oath declare
that he served in the Revolutionary War as
follows, that he enlisted in Prince Edward
County Virginia for three years in Captain Noel
Combs Company in the fourth Regiment of
Virginia on Continental line, that he served
out the three years and was honorably dis-
charged at Alexandria that his original
Certificate now in his possession is no 5062
that his original declaration was on the
19th of October 1818. Which more fully States
his Service,

And I do solemnly Swear that I was a
Resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th

day of March 1878. and that I have not since
that time by gift sold or in any manner
disposed of my property or any part thereof
with intent thereby to diminish it as to
bring myself within the provisions of an act
of Congress "entitled 'An act to provide for
certain persons engaged in the land and
naval service of the United States in the
Revolutionary war'" passed on the 18th day
of March 1878. and that I have not nor
has any person in trust for me any prop-
erty or securities contracts or debts due to me
nor have I any income other than what is
contained in the schedule hereto annexed
and by me subscribed.

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request information in regard to John H. Guill, of Farmville, Virginia, a soldier of the Revolutionary War, who received a pension for his services about June 18, 1833.

A careful search of the Revolutionary War records has been made and no record found of a soldier named John Guill who received pension in 1833, while residing in Farmville, Virginia, and no John H. Guill. However, the record has been found of a John Guill who served in the Virginia Troops and was pensioned while residing in Kentucky. His history is furnished herein, the data for which were obtained from the papers on file in his pension claim, S 25998, based upon the military service of that soldier in the Revolutionary War. This record is that of the only soldier named John Guill that is found on the Revolutionary War records of this office.

The date and place of birth and the names of the parents of John Guill are not shown.

John Guill enlisted in Prince Edward County, Virginia, in March, 1777, served as a private in Captain John Holcomb's Company, Colonel Robert Lawson's 4th Virginia Regiment, was in the battles of Brandywine, Germantown and Monmouth and was discharged in February, 1780.

He was allowed pension on his application executed October 19, 1818, at which time he was aged sixty years and resided in Scott County, Kentucky.

In 1822, he had moved to Owen County, that state and stated that his family then residing with him consisted of his wife and six children. He gave no names and there are no further data as to family.
