State of Kentucky
County of Owen

On this 4th day of March 1880 personally appeared in open Court before the Judges of the Owen County Court now sitting John Knight a Resident of the said County of Owen in the State of Kentucky aged 35 years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated that is to say, being a resident of the County of Washington in the State of Maryland he did on the day of July 1778 enter the service of the United States as a drafted Militia Man ^{upon a tour of three months} and private soldier in the company of Captain ~~Proctor~~ ^{the} the lieutenant's name was ~~Proctor~~ ^{being} either a brother or cousin to the Captain - that he rendezvoused with his company in Hagerstown in the said County of Washington & was marched with his said company from their said place of rendezvous to fort Frederick and there took charge of some Delawares who had been made prisoners by Genl. Washington and they marched with the said prisoners from Frederick to Lancaster in Pennsylvania where he remained with his said company taking care of and guarding the said prisoners till the expiration of his said tour when he was verbally discharged and returned to his home in Washington County in the State of Maryland He states that he served out his tour faithfully and fully ^{it being for three months as above} and that he was under the command of no higher officer than Captain that there was but the single company engaged in the service with him upon this tour - He pro this states and declares that on the day of

April 1780 he again entered the service of the United upon a tour of six months as a volunteer and private soldier in the company of Captain John Ellis - the lieutenant's name was Robert Wallace - that he again rendezvoused with his company at Hagerstown in the said County of Washington in which County he still resided and marched with his company to Annapolis in the said State of Maryland where he remained stationed during the whole of his tour - He states that there was no field officer that he recollects of at Annapolis where he was stationed either regular or militia - that there was one or two militia companies stationed there at the same time but that he has forgotten the names of the Captains of them - He states that he served out his said tour of six months fully and faithfully and at the termination thereof was discharged and permitted to return home to Washington County Maryland

He further states and declares that on the day of July 1781 he again entered the service of the United States as a ^{private} volunteer soldier in the company of Captain John Clicket upon a tour of three months - that he rendezvoused with his said company at Fredericktown in Frederick County Md. and was marched with his said company to Annapolis in the said State of Maryland where he was again stationed ~~the~~ during the whole of his tour - that whilst he was stationed there he understood from ^{his} Captain that the company was directed to hold ~~still~~ in readiness to march to York in Virginia to assist in the siege of that place but that contrary to his expectations they were not ordered out upon said service but were permitted to remain stationed at Annapolis during the whole

of the said tour - And at the termination thereof which happened a few days after the capture of Cornwallis he was discharged in writing by his Captain and returned home - He states that the highest officer in command at Annapolis upon this tour was a Captain - that there were no field officers stationed there and that he does not now remember the names of the Captains of the other ~~companies~~ ^{companies} that were at the same place of which he ^{thinks} there was two or three in addition to the company to which he belonged -

He states that he has no documentary evidence and that he knows of no person whose testimony he can procure, who can testify to his service -

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present, and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State sworn to, and subscribed the day and year aforesaid

Interrogatories propounded to the above named applicant by the Court.

1st Where and in what year were you born?

Answer - I was born in the State of Pennsylvania near Lancaster in the 20th Nov^r 1757 according to the best information which I have -

2^d Have you any record of your age, and if so where is it?

Answer - I have a record of my age at home in my family register -

3^d Where were you living when called into service; where have you lived since the revolutionary war, and where do you now live?

Answer. I was living in the County of Washington and State of Maryland when I was called into the service upon each of my tours. My father moved from the State of Pennsylvania to the said County of Washington in the State of Maryland when I was quite small. I continued in the same County after the Revolutionary war until about the year 1801 and then moved to Fayette County Kentucky where I lived for 16 or 17 years and then moved to where I now live in Owen County Kentucky and have continued to live on the same place ever since.

Q. How were you called into the service, were you drafted, did you volunteer, or were you a substitute? and if a substitute and for whom?

Answer. Upon my first tour I was drafted; in my other service I was a volunteer.

Q. State the names of some of the regular officers who were with the troops where you served, such as Continentals and Militia ^{regiment} as you can recollect and the general circumstances of your service.

Answer. If there was any regular officers or soldiers with the troops where I served I have forgotten it. nor was there any Continental or Militia Regiments. In my first tour the company to which I belonged was the only one engaged upon the service which was conducting some African prisoners from Frederick to Lancaster Penn. and there remaining with them and guarding them till the expiration of our tour. Upon my other service I was stationed at Annapolis during the whole of it and there was only a few companies there in addition to the one to which I belonged which I believe were militia company, and the names of their Captains I have forgotten. I am certain

that there was no field officer stationed with the troops where I
served.

6th Did you ever receive a discharge from the service, and if
so by whom was it given, and what has become of it?

Answer. I never received but one discharge in writing and that
was from my last tour and was signed by my capt. John Clarke
which I have since lost.

7th State the names of persons to whom you are known in your
present neighbourhood and who can testify as to your character
for veracity; and their belief of your services as a soldier of the
revolution.

Answer. I will name Hugh Montgomery & Abner Wood
as persons to whom I am known.
