Declaration

Resident of the County of Owen State of Kentucky
aged seventy six years who from Bodily infirmity
is unable to appear in Court who being first
July Sworn According to Law do then on her oath
Make the following Declaration In order to obtain
the benefit of the Provision made by an act of
Congress Passed July 4. 1836 That she is the Widow
of Hugh Mc Cormick who was a Pensioner in the
County of Scott State of Kentucky under the Law of 1828
and she refers to his Papers on file for evidence of his
Service she further declares that she was mar-
ried to the said Hugh Mc Cormick on the Fifth day
of January Seventeen Hundred and Eighty one
in Westmoreland County County State of Pennsylvania
and she is unable to obtain any Record evidence
of her marriage Her Family Record having been
lost or Destroyed she does well know that she
was married to the said Hugh Mc Cormick during
his Service and that he was in the Service after
their marriage took place during the War of
the Revolution and that her Husband the said
Hugh Mc Cormick died on the twenty second day
of May Eighteen hundred and Twenty two and that she
has remained a Widow ever since that Period
As will more fully appear from the Proof hereto
Annexed Given from under my Hand this
28th day of July 1837

Quinn County

At a Circuit Court begun and held on the 14th day of August 1820 in the Town of Nashville for the County of Quinn Pursuant to an Order of the Court this being made a Court of Record by act of Assembly and having unlimited power. Hugh M. Comstock produced in open Court the following Declaration and schedule and was sworn to it in open Court by the Judge of the same was ordered to be recorded of which the following is a copy —

Schedule

District of Kentucky, ss.

On this 14th day of August 1820 personally appeared in open Court, being a Court of open Record for the said district and Circuit of Quinn County Hugh M. Comstock aged 63 years, resident in Quinn County in said district who being first duly sworn, according to Law, both, on his oath, declare, that he served in the Revolutionary war as follows: That he entered in Northumberland County in the year 1776 in the State of Pennsylvania for three years or during the war on the continental line in the company commanded by Capt. John Brady in the 12th Pennsylvania Regiment commanded by Col. William Cook, that he served until the close of the Revolutionary war in different Regiments. He was honorably discharged at the Philadelphia Barracks in 1783 and has received the certificate of pension No. 6935. And I do solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March, 1818 and that I have not, since that time, by gift, sale or in any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to

bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the Land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary war"; passed on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property, or securities, contracts, or debts, due to me, nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed.

This day though the Comrade personally appeared before me one of the Circuit Judges for the Com with a press and made oath, that he entered the service of the United States as an enlisted soldier in the Revolutionary war in the year 1776 in Capt. John Bridge's company, the Regiment commanded by Col. M^r Clark in the State of Pennsylvania and served three years the term of his enlistment and then re-enlisted and served until the close of the war, when he was honorably discharged by order of Genl Lincoln at Philadelphia, where he discharged his boat in descending the Ohio river - He was in the Battle of Brandywine, Stony Point, Old Fort, and the Siege of York - That he is upwards of sixty years of age, infirm and poor, and needs the assistance of his government for support, That he has always been a citizen of the U. S. and has never recd a pension - That he

now lives in Scott County, State of Kentucky

Madam:-

Replying to your request for information concerning the military record of John White and Hugh McCormick, soldiers of the Revolutionary war, you are advised that a very careful search has been made and from the data given the name of John White has not been found upon the Revolutionary war pension records on file in this Bureau.

Hugh McCormick made an application for pension on April 23, 1818, at which time he was 61 years of age and residing in Scott County, Ky., and his pension was allowed for seven years' actual service as a private in the Penna. troops, Revolutionary war; a part of the time he served under Capt. Brady and Col. Cook. He enlisted in Northumberland County, Penna.

His widow, Rebecca, made application and received a pension for the service of her husband as above set forth.
