annexed to a Declaration in order to be placed on the
Pension List —

A tract of third rate land containing fifty acres
half of it tillable, which the declarant supposes he could scarcely sell
for fifty dollars —

Three horses and a colt

Three cows and a steer

About fourteen yearling hogs and twenty pigs and four sows

Six sheep — a bureau and small table — three ten gallon
kettles a small oven and skillet — and ~~some~~ ^{some} ~~little~~ ^{about a dozen}
plates & knives — 6 cups & saucers — 3 old wheels — 2 old troughs
2 axes — 3 hoes —

The applicant is a farmer — he is very infirm, and his strength
greatly impaired by age — His wife Henrietta resides with him she
has for a long time been very unwell and unable to work — she
is 57 years of age — also two sons Stephen & Thomas — Stephen is 21
years old — has been of unsound mind from a child unable to do any thing for
himself — Thomas is 14 years old able to work — also Polly 15 years old able
to work — Pamela 13 years old unhealthy

Original Claim.

Declaration, in order to be placed on the Pension List, under the Act
of the 18th March, 1818.

County of *Scott* ^{ss.} *State of Kentucky*
On this *19th* day of *November* 182*7*, personally appeared
in open court, (a) [being a court of record (b) for the district, circuit, county, or corpo-
ration, as the case may be,] *Thomas Paslay*,

resident in said county, aged *sixty-five* years, who,
being first duly sworn, according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following decla-
ration, in order to obtain the provision made by the acts of Congress, of the 18th
March, 1818, and the 1st of May, 1820; that he the said *Thomas Paslay*
enlisted (c) for the term of *one year & a half* on the *eighteenth* day of
February in the year *1779* in the State of *Virginia*
in the company (d) commanded by captain *Wm. Talcott* in the regiment
commanded by colonel *Rich. Parker* in the line of the State of *Virginia*
on the continental establishment; that he continued to serve in
the said corps (or vessel) until *he was taken prisoner at the battle of the Clouds* when he was *kept prisoner*
for about four years discharged from the service, *in* the State of *Virginia*

that he hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension, except the present; that
his name is not on the roll of any State, except *that of Virginia*; and that
the following are the reasons for not making earlier application for a pension: (e) *The applicant*

has never been able to procure sufficient evidence of his enlistment and service
until lately, when the person who enlisted him removed from Virginia to this State
which person he had supposed to be dead - that he would have applied long ago if had evidence
to support his claim. And, in pursuance of the act of the 1st May, 1820, I do solemnly swear, (or

affirm, as the case may be,) that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the
18th day of March, 1818, and that I have not, since that time, by gift, sale, or in any
manner disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish
it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled "An act
to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United
States in the Revolutionary War," passed on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that
I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property, or securities, contracts,
or debts, due to me; nor have I any income, other than what is contained in the schedule
hereto annexed, and by me subscribed. (f) That, since the 18th of March, 1818,
the following changes have been made in my property. (g) *I have lost four valuable horses, dead*
I have given one to a child. I sold the place I lived on in Bourbon, after being 13 1/2 years by law,
and purchased the place I live on now.

Sworn to, and declared, on the *19th* day of *November* before (h) in open court

I *Ben B. Ford* Clerk of the Court for *Scott* county,

do hereby certify, that it appears to the satisfaction of the Court, that the said
Thomas Paslay did serve in the Revolutionary War, as stated in the
preceding declaration, against the common enemy, for the term of nine months, under
one engagement, on the continental establishment. I also certify, that the foregoing
oath, (or affirmation) and the schedule thereto annexed, are truly copied from the
records of the said Court; and I do further certify, that it is the opinion of the said
Court, that the total amount in value of the property exhibited in the aforesaid schedule
is *two hundred thirty four* dollars and *twenty four* cents.

Original Claim

Scott County - State of Kentucky

On the 5th day of Sept. 1826 personally appeared in open Court, being a Court of Records established by law for said County, Thomas Paslay resident of the County of Owen aged sixty four years, who being first duly sworn according to law doth in his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the provision made by the Act of Congress of the 18th of March 1814 & 1st of May 1820 ^{for a pension.} That he is Paslay, ^{was} enlisted for the term of eighteen months in February 1779 in Buckingham County & State of Virginia by George Adcock ^{attached to} the temporary command by Capt. Men. Taliaferro as a regular soldier & attached to the Regt. of Col. Richd. Parker, Genl. Scotts brigade that he was marched from Virginia to Georgia, after first being near Philadelphia - & was at the siege at Savannah in the year 1779 - & was then marched to Augusta ~~after~~ that & from thence to Charleston - there we stood the siege & was taken prisoner

son & taken to the West Indies
& detained a prisoner for five years
from the time I enlisted, being
released & returned home in the
year 1784. That he was on the
continental establishment fighting
in the revolutionary war against
Great Britain. That he obtained
a warrant for land thro' St Lawrence
Ego. That he hereby relinquishes
all claims to pension except the
present; and that he is not on the
receipt of a pension from this or any
other gov^t. - He states that he once
applied for a pension previous to the
enactment of the law thro' the
Hon T. Metcalf, but there was a
failure owing to causes which he
does not distinctly recollect.
That he has lately discovered the
person who enlisted him which
will appear by the enclosed cer-
tificate & which will remove
the defects of proof, if proof was
wanting.

and in pursuance of the act of 1st May
1820 I do solemnly swear that I was
a resident citizen of the United States
on the 18th day of March 1818 & that I have
not since that period by gift, sale or
in any other manner disposed of my
property or any part thereof with
intent thereby so to diminish it as
to bring myself within the provisions
of an act of Congress entitled "An act
to provide for certain persons engaged
in the land & naval service of the
United States in the revolutionary war
passed 18th March 1818 - and that I have
not now nor has any person in trust
for me any property or securities
contracts or debts due me, nor have
I any income other than is contained
in the Schedule hereto annexed &
by me subscribed & the following changes
have taken place in my property
since 1818 the 18th of March.

said County and one of the judges of the Owen
County Court Minfret Paslay a resident of the
said County aged 74 years who being duly
sworn according to law upon his oath made
the following declaration in order to obtain the
benefit of the Act of Congress passed July 1st
1838

She states and declares that she is now 74
years of age and is a resident of Owen County
Ky. and is the widow of Thomas Paslay dec'd. who
was a revolutionary pensioner of the United
States. She further states that her maiden name
was Minfret Adams and that she married
the said Thomas Paslay in Buckingham County
State of Virginia on the 5th day of Nov. 1785
according to the laws of that State and that they
continued to live together as man & wife
from that period up to the time of his death
which event took place on the 13th day of April
1844 at his home in Owen County. She states
that her said husband was on the pension list
of the United States at the rate of \$96 per an-
num and she has no doubt served faithfully
in the war of the revolution. She further states
that her said husband Thomas Paslay kept a
family record in the Bible in which he insert-
ed the marriage of himself & this declaration as
also the ages of the children. She has caused

Be it remembered that on this 30th day of
March 1880 she personally appeared before John
Brown a justice of the peace in and for
said County and one of the judges of the Crown
County Court Winifred Paslay a resident of the
said County aged 74 years who being duly
sworn according to law upon her oath
the following declaration in order to obtain the
benefit of the Act of Congress passed July 7th
1838

She states and declares that she is now 74
years of age and is a resident of Crown County
Ky and is the widow of Thomas Paslay dec^d who
was a revolutionary pensioner of the United
States. She further states that her maiden name
was Winifred Adams and that she married
the said Thomas Paslay in Buckingham County
State of Virginia on the 5th day of Nov^r 1785
according to the laws of that State and that they
continued to live together as man & wife
from that period up to the time of his death
which event took place on the 13th day of April
1844 at his house in Crown County. She states
that her said husband was on the pension list
of the United States at the rate of \$90 per an-
num and she has no doubt served faithfully
in the war of the revolution. She further states
that her said husband Thomas Paslay kept a
family record in the Bible in which he insert-
ed the marriage of himself & this declarant as
also the ages &c. of the children. She has caused

the said Family records to be cut from the Bible and the same to be here annexed and she states that the entries made on said record are all in the proper hand writing of the said Thomas Pasley and were made by him as the events occurred. She further states that this is all the evidence which she has of her marriage and that she does not know of any person now living ~~anywhere~~ who was present at the marriage and by whom she could prove it.

She also states that from her bodily infirmity she is unable to attend Court to make her declaration.
