Pendleton and State of Kentucky aged Eightyfour

sworn according to law doth on her oath make the
following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit
of the provision made by the act of Congress passed
July the 4th 1836 that she is the widow of the late

Solomon Biles who was a Soldier on the Virginia

line and a pensioner under under the Law of 1818 all
of which will more fully appear from his papers on
file She further Declares that they had a family Record
of her marriage and the ages of her Children which was

tost on their way from Virginia to Kentucky and the
way She is incabed to give the date of her Marriage

Positively is that it was on her birth day when she

Twenty two years of age and her son Elijah was

born on her birth day which she was twenty three

years of age and was ~~35~~ ³⁶ years of age on the

Ninth day of June last She Refers to the Record of Orange

County Virginia for evidence of her marriage and the
foregoing Affidavit Her Husband was in the service

after her marriage at the barbers under Col —
and Capt — From her great age and loss of
Memory she is unable to state the names of the officers
under whom he served and that she was married to
the said Collyman Belieu in Orange County State of
Virginia on the ninth of June Seventeen hundred
and Seventy eight and that her husband Solomon
Belieu died of the Scalp on the Seventeenth day of September Eighty
hundred and eighteen and that she has remained
a widow ever since that period as will more
fully appear by Reference to the proof hereunto
annexed.

On this 26th of May 1818 before me
the subscriber, one of the circuit judges for the circuit
aforesaid, personally appeared Solomon Belue aged 69
years resident in Pendleton County and state aforesaid who
being by me first duly sworn according to law doth
swear on his oath make the following declaration
in order to obtain the provision made by the late act
of Congress intituled an act to provide for certain persons
engaged in the Land and Naval Service of the United
States in the Revolutionary war, that he the said
Solomon Belue that he entered the service of the
United States for the term of one year in the regular
service in the company commanded by Capt Frank
Taft of the State of Virginia in Genl Woodfords
Brigade in the year 1778 - he joined the army
at Valley Forge in the spring of 1778 and stood out
his said term of one year and was honorably discharged
at Nolans Ferry in Virginia that he acted as
a waggoner by order of his officer at the battle of
Monmouth - that he is in reduced circumstances and
stands in need of the assistance of his country for support
and that he has no other evidence now in his power
Save what he now produces of his said services

Dear Miss Bailey

Information is made to your letter in which you request
the record of one Colleman Bailey (Bailey), a Revolutionary War
pioneer of Kentucky.

The military record and all family data on file in regard
to that soldier follow.

The data contained herein are obtained from the papers on
file in pension claim, V. 6220, based upon the military service of
Colleman Bailey. The name does not appear as Bailey.

Colleman Bailey, while a resident of Orange County, Virginia,
enlisted in 1776, served in Captain Frank Taylor's Virginia Company,
was a waggoner at the battle of Brandywine, and was discharged at the
expiration of service of one year.

Pension was allowed on his application granted May 23,
1810, at which time he was a resident of Pendleton County, Kentucky,
aged sixty-five or sixty-three years.

Soldier died September 14, 1810 in Pendleton County, Kentucky.

Colleman Bailey married June 9, 1770, in Orange County, Virginia.
His maiden name is not stated. She was born June 9, 1750. They
were married at the home of General Robert Johnson, where they then resided.

Maria Bailey was allowed pension on her application granted
November 27, 1810, at which time she was a resident of Pendleton County,
Kentucky.

Gilmore and Nichols had children, no ages given except
that of Gilmore, their first son, who was born Sept 9, 1872, is
now living in 1940, residence not stated.
