Pendleton County Court, August Term 1818, 50.

I Robert Taylor presiding Magistrate of the County Court aforesaid do hereby certify, by way of Supplement & in addition to the Certificates heretofore made & forwarded to the Department of War, relative to the services of William Wharton & James Burns

of the Revolutionary war, who claim pensions under an Act of Congress of the U.S., that from my own personal knowledge of their reduced circumstances they stand in need of the assistance of their Country for support. Given under my hand as presiding Magistrate of said Court at the town aforesaid this day of August A.D. 1818. Wm Taylor

Pendleton Circuit Court October Term 1820.

On this 10th day of October 1820 person ally appeared in open Court, being a Court of record by an Act of the General Assembly of the State aforesaid, James Burns who is now on the Pension Roll, agreeably to the provisions of an Act of Congress, entitled "An Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the Land and Naval service of the United States, in the Revolutionary War" passed on the 18th day of March 1818, aged 63 years, resident in Grant formerly Pendleton County, in the State and Circuit aforesaid (who being first duly sworn, according to Law, doth on his oath declare that he served in the Revolutionary War as follows:— In the year 1776, August 19th he enlisted under Captain Samuel Miller in the 8th Pennsylvania Regiment commanded by Colonel McCoy, and served as a private for three years and about twenty six days (having been enlisted for the term of three years) at which time he received his discharge at Fort-Pitt, he at that time was under the command of Col. Broadhead who commanded the said 8th Regt. and received his discharge from the hands of Lieut. Col. Stephen Buford of said Regt.; and he further states that his original declaration under the Act of Congress aforesaid was made in June 1818 and that the No. of his Pension certificate is 10,544. And in pursuance of the Act of the 4th of May 1820 he further states, on oath, that he was a resident citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818, and

with not, since that time by gift, sale or in any manner disposed of his property, or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it, as to bring himself within the provisions of an Act of Congress entitled "An Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and Naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War" passed on the 18th day of March 1818; and that he has not, nor has any person in trust for him, any property or securities, contracts or debts, due to him, nor has he any in come other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by him subscribed - which schedule is in the words and figures following, to wit: One Cow & calf, five head of sheep, three pieces of flannel, half dozen earthen plates and a set of queens' ware, cups & saucers - necessary clothing & bedding not included in the above schedule. Said James Burns further declared on oath, in open court, that he is by occupation and profession a farmer, and that from his age and infirmity and more over a total blindness, for the last 12 years past he is entirely unable to labor, and that his family consists of himself and his wife, Eleanor, aged 65 years.

The court is of opinion that the property contained in the above schedule is of the value of Thirty seven Dollars & 50 cents & no more.

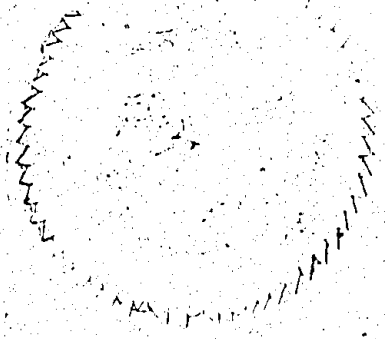

the Revolutionary war.

That he the said James Burns, enlisted in the
service of the United States at Cumberland
County Pennsylvania on the 19th day of Aug. in the
year 1776 by Capt. Saml. Muller of the 8th
Pennsylvania Regt. Commanded by Col. Mth Gray
(at that time) of the Continental line that
he enlisted for the term of 10 years that he
served out the whole of said term and
received an honorable discharge from Col. Poyers
at Pittsburg which discharge he put in to
the hands of a Captain Matthew Wood
to obtain his bounty lands. about 2 years
ago and he has not been to since. that
he served in the north and afterwards under
Genl Morgan and was at the capturing of
Genl Mergoyne that he is now 60 years of
age and has been blind about 10 years

and in reduced circumstances and needs the
Assistance of his Country for Support

and do declare in Open Court this 15th day
of June 1846
