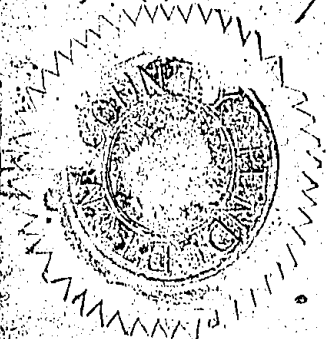

On this 20<sup>th</sup> day of August 1832 personally  
appeared in open Court before the County Court  
in the County of Pendleton, now sitting Wil-  
liam Cleaveland Senr. a resident of S. County  
of Pendleton & State aged about  
twenty five years ~~old~~, who being first duly  
sworn according to law, doth on his Oath  
make the following declaration, in order to  
obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress  
passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832, that he Volunteered  
in the service of the United States under  
the following named Officers and served as  
here named ~~name~~: That he entered the  
Militia Service as a Volunteer in the Coun-  
ty of Albemarle in the State of Virginia in  
the year 1778 in a Company Commanded  
by Capt. Landon Jones & Lieutenant Merrill  
& served about thirteen months during which  
time he was under various Officers, to wit  
Capt. J. ~~Mc~~ <sup>Mc</sup> ~~Johnson~~ & Lieutenant James Gar-  
land and afterwards Capt. James Wood  
& Lieutenant Thos Collins, the field Officers  
were Col. Holt Richardson and Maj. Dudley  
& Gen. Makenbugg. — He was with the reg-  
-ular

Regular troops commanded by Genl. Anthony Wayne  
at James-Town, Virginia, and also with the  
regular troops ~~commanding~~ of Cornerall's  
at Little York in the state of Virginia  
the company in which he belonged was attached  
to Genl. Laffayette's Army in the County of  
Hanover & State of Virginia - and was then  
pursued by Cornerall's on to Normans Ford  
at the Rappahannock river in the County of  
Culpeper state of Virginia; thro' the coun-  
ties of Louisa, Orange, Culpeper &c. Mr  
was reinforced by Genl. Wayne at Normans  
Ford, Cornerall's then retreated, Mr then pur-  
sued him nearly the same <sup>road</sup> to James-Town  
where we had a small engagement, from  
thence Cornerall's retreated to Little York  
at which place Genl. Washington met us  
& besieged the Town of Cornerall's was cap-  
tured with his whole Army - He was in  
the battles at James-Town & Little York  
that he has no documentary evidence & that  
he knows of no person whose testimony he  
can procure who can testify to his services.  
He hereby relinquishes every claim whatsoever  
to a pension or annuity except the present  
and declares that his name is not on the  
pensions roll of the Agency of any state, or  
if any only on <sup>of the</sup> that Agency of the State  
of Virginia

In order to obtain the benefits of the act of Congress  
of the 7th July 1838 entitled "An act granting half  
pay and pensions to certain widows

On this <sup>June</sup> nineteenth day of ~~July~~ <sup>June</sup> eighteen hundred and forty  
three personally appeared before ~~the~~ undersigned a Justice  
of the Peace in and for the County of Pendleton, Kentucky  
Margaret Cleveland a resident of the County of  
Pendleton and State of Kentucky aged seventy <sup>three</sup>  
the twelfth day of November eighteen hundred and  
forty three who being first duly sworn, according to law  
doth on her oath make the following declarations, in order  
to obtain the benefits of the provisions made by the act of  
Congress passed July 7th 1838 entitled "An act granting  
half pay and pensions to certain widows:" That, she is the  
widow of William Cleveland who was a soldier of the  
revolutions from the County of Albemarle and State  
of Virginia as a militiaman, she refers to the papers  
and evidence on file as proof to his services and the  
officer he served under that give her husband a pen-  
sion. She further declares that she was married to the  
said William Cleveland on the fourteenth of April  
ten hundred and eighty eight that ~~her~~ <sup>the</sup> husband the  
the aforesaid William Cleveland died on the eighteenth  
day of July eighteen hundred and forty two, that she was  
not married to him prior to his leaving the service but  
the marriage took place previous to the first of January  
seventeen hundred and ninety four viz: at the time  
above stated

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War record of William Cleveland, born in Albemarle County, Virginia, in December, 1757, served in the Revolutionary War, received a pension while residing in Pendleton County, Kentucky, where he died about 1848.

The record of William Cleveland (the surname also shown as Cleaveland) follows as obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, W. 8611, based upon his service in the Revolutionary War.

William Cleveland, son of Alexander Cleveland and his wife, Margaret, was born December 15, 1757, in Albemarle County, Virginia.

While residing in Albemarle County, Virginia, he volunteered in 1778, and in the winter of that year and 1779 he served three months as private in Captain Landon Jones' company. He volunteered in the fall of 1780 and served three months as private in Captain John Henderson's company. He volunteered in the spring of 1781 and served seven months as private in Captain James Woods' company, and was in the battle of Jamestown and at the siege of Yorktown; all of the above tours were under Colonel Holt Richardson in the Virginia troops.

The soldier resided in Albemarle County, Virginia, until the close of the Revolutionary War, then moved to Prince William County, Virginia, where he lived six or seven years, thence to the adjoining county of Fauquier, same state; from there, to Loudoun County, Virginia, then moved to Kentucky and resided first in Clark County, then Pendleton County.

William Cleveland was allowed pension on his application executed August 20, 1838, while a resident of Pendleton County, Kentucky.

He died July 18, 1842.

William Cleveland married April 14, 1788, Margaret (or Peggy), maiden name not stated, who was born November 12, 1770, place of birth and names of her parents not given.

Soldier's widow, Margaret Cleveland, was allowed pension on her application executed June 9, 1843, while a resident of Pendleton County, Kentucky.
