Letter to Hon J. W. Tibbatts D
July 1845

Isaac Conner
of Pendleton in the State of Kentucky
who was a private in the company commanded
by Captain Burrey of the regt commanded
by Clark in the War of 1812

The Commonwealth of Kentucky
Purdett's City

On this 25th day of December 1832 personally
appeared before me John Forsythe a Justice
of the peace for the County of Spencer Isaac
Cooney resident in S. County of Purdett's City
about twenty five years, who being first duly
sworn according to Law, took on his Oath
to make the following Declaration in Obedience
to the benefit of the Act of Congress passed
on the 7th June 1832

That he entered the Service as a Substitute
for George Purcell in the year 1778
in the Month of July as well as he now re-
collects for a term of six Months in the Mili-
tary of North Carolina in the County of North
Carolina under Capt. ——— Purcell the name
of the Lieutenant not recollects, the surname
was William Purcell, Capt. Elyah Clarke com-
mands the Regiment, during this Term he
~~was engaged in a battle~~ he was in a skirmish at
Kings Mills, in the State of North Carolina
Carolina, he served in this Term some days up-
wards of six Months. Was discharged, he
does not now recollect at what place

He next volunteered for the year of 1779
in six Months under Capt. Substant. Miller
in S. County of North Carolina & the names of
the Subaltern officers not recollects, Major
Lieut. H. Dowl commanded, battles in
North Carolina at the battle of Kings Mountain

1787 Col. John Campbell then commanded his regiment
recalled the month that he entered the service
in the month he was discharged, but he now he
voluntarily for six months & served his time
out he was during that term of service in
the Battle of King Mountain, as well as he
recalls — but from the great lapse of time
to the number of different Officers & Men under
his command has been forgotten by the Regiments
has been Capt. Bury at King Mountain
was instead of Capt. Miller as he served a
term of six months under Capt. Bury.

In the year 1787 he volunteered a further
term of duty under Capt. Capt. Miller for six
months, Maj. Joseph McLeod commanded in
the mountains the cow-pens in South Carolina
Col. Pickens then took the command of the regi-
ment, he was promoted in the ^{rank} at the bat-
tle of the Cow-pens, during this term he served
upwards of six months.

In the spring of 1788 he volunteered
to volunteer for eight months under Capt. John
Colark, the Lieutenant was Henry Clarke, major
not recalled, Egean Clarke was the Colonel
he was in no action during this term, they
were engaged scouring the state of South of
South Carolina, He served out the eight
months — during all of which term, term
of duty he performed as stated above, as well
as he recalls — He was with regular
troops at the King Mountain, he thinks con-
-randed

by Col. John Campbell, also with Regular Troops
at the Camp, commanded by Gen. Daniel
Morgan, who commanded the Army at the
battle of the Cowpens - He resided in the
County of Rutherford, North Carolina at the
time he Volunteered in each Year of duty &
continued to live there after the close of the
war, till he removed to the State of Ken-
tucky about forty years ago & settled in Big
Barren River, he thinks in Logan County, &
lived there about two years, he then removed
to Lincoln County in the State & lived there some
thing like twenty years, he then removed to
Garard County in the State & lived about
one year & then removed to Pulaski Co. in
the State and lived there about four years
& then removed back to Lincoln Co. in the
State & lived there about two years more,
he then removed to Portland Co. in the State
to where he now resides. - That he has
no record of his age, & knows of none, that
he has kept his age from what his parents
& his Master George Paris (to whose home he was
bound as an apprentice) told him, - He was
born in the year 1757 in the Town of Min-
chester, Frederick Co. State of Virginia, &
removed from there to Rutherford Co. North
Carolina when about five years old, as
he was informed by his parents & friends;
He can not recollect whether he received a

discharge for either Year of duty he served, if
for either, he thinks for the Year he subste-
tuted, & if so, George Paris got it - On either
day he recollect the different Counties he
marched thro' for he was run from post to
pillar, where ever they could find of British
or Tories committing depredations. he would
also state that he is well acquainted with
Joseph Watson, William Dale, Tho: M. Stone
Nemrod Colton &c, who resided in his present
neighbourhood & who will testify as to his
character for Veracity and true belief of
his Services in the Revolution. - That he has
no documentary evidence & knows of no
person that can prove his Services.

He would further state that he is unable
to attend Court owing to bodily infirmity; hav-
ing to go on Crutches which has been his
situation for three years.

He hereby relinquishes every Claim whatever
to a pension or annuity except the present
and declares that his Name is not on the
pension roll of the Agency of any State
of the Union

I John Forsythe a Justice of the Peace
in the County Court holden in & for the County
of Pendleton & Commonwealth of Kentucky
where the declarant resides, do hereby certify
that the above named Isaac Connor is in-
capable of attending the County Court in which
I am a member, owing to his crippled con-
dition, having to go upon crutches - I have
therefore in pursuance of an Act of Con-
gress in such cases made aforesaid, at-
tended at his place if abroad, and after
examining the declarant upon oath in the
manner prescribed by the Secretary of
War, do hereby declare my opinion that
the above named Applicant was a revolu-
tionary Soldier & provide as he states, & that
the declarant who has signed the preceding
certificate is a Clergyman, resident in Pen-
dleton County, and that George Hedgepost who
has also signed the same is a resident in said
County, and is a credible person & that these
statements is entitled to credit, and further
certify that the Rev. Andrew McKee a Clergyman of
said County & George Hedgepost did solemnly in my
presence subscribe & swear to the above certi-
ficate given under my hand this 26th day of Dec^r 1832

I, Wm. Bennett, Clerk of the Court of
the County of Pendleton, in the State aforesaid, do
hereby certify that John Forsythe Esq., before
whom the above declaration of Isaac Cowser ap-
pears to have been made, is, and was at the time
of making said declaration, an acting Justice of the
peace in & for said County, duly commissioned & sworn
and as such full faith and credit ought to be given
to all his official acts, as well in courts of justice
as otherwise; he is also one of the members, or Justices
of the Pendleton County Court, which court is a court
of record - and that his signature, annexed to
said declaration on the opposite side of this paper is his
genuine signature.

In testimony whereof I have
hereunto set my hand and
seal of office, this 26th day of
December A.D. 1852.
