State of Kentucky
Pendleton City Oct 3

On this 17th day of Oct. 1832 personally ap-
peared in Open Court before the county court
for the County of Pendleton, (now sitting Michael
Cookhenter a resident of s^d County of Pendle-
ton & State of Ky^o aged near Eighty two
years who being first duly sworn according to Law
doth on his Oath make the following decla-
-ration, in Order to obtain the benefit of
the Act of Congress passed 7th June 1832,
That he Volunteered in the Service of the
United States, as a Soldier, Under the following
named Officers, and served as herein named
That he entered the Militia Service, as a Vol-
-unteer in George Town, in the now District
of Columbia, (then the State of Maryland)
in the Year 1776, as well as he now recol-
-lects in the month of May, in a Company com-
-manded by Capt. George Pile & Lieutenant
Pile and served until April 1787 during
which time he served Under various Officers hav-
-ing been appointed 2^d Major in the Spring of
1779 Col^l Mendenhall and Maj^r William
Patterson, were the field Officers, Gen^l
Smallwood commanded, he was attached to the
29th Regiment - He was with the regular troops
at Annapolis then commanded by Gen^l
Smallwood - but he was nearly the whole
of his time during his service stationed at
George Town with recruiting Officers as

a Mutineer, that he was in no battles, that he
has no documentary evidence, and that he
knows of no person whose testimony he can
procure who can testify to his service that
he was born in the County of Lancaster ~~State~~
of Pennsylvania in the Month of March
1757 - He has no record of his age, nor
knows of none, he gives his birth as in-
formed by his Parents - He resided near
York in the now detached of Columbia, when
he volunteered in the Militia Service, He
resided within four miles of Hagerstown in
the State of Maryland, on the road to ^{in the New County of Frederick} Frederick
- York in the State of Maryland until
the year 1791 when he removed to the
State of Kentucky and settled in Spring
- town Fayette County where he resided until
1798 and then removed to Harrison City
in the State of Kentucky, from thence
he removed to Pinebluff City in the State of
the year 1810 to where he now resides,
He now receives a discharge owing to neglect
as well as he now collects, He was ap-
pointed 1st Major by Col. Muddock
to Maj. William Perkins.

He is well acquainted with Maj. Tho. H.
Bart, John Norris, The Quaker, Philip Ben-
dick, who are Cousins of his former neighbor
born hood, who can testify as to his integrity
and true belief of his service as a soldier
in the Revolutionary War.

that by reason of Old age, and the consequent
loss of Memory he cannot swear positively
as to the precise lengths of his service, but
according to the best of his recollection
he served not less than the period mentioned
-ed above & two years of the time as Captain
Major & returned two & three years as Major
for the 29th Regiment Maryland Militia

He hereby relinquishes every Claim what-
-ever to a pension or Annuity except this
present and declares that his name is
not on the pension roll of this Agency
of any State. Sworn to and subscribed
the day and year aforesaid.

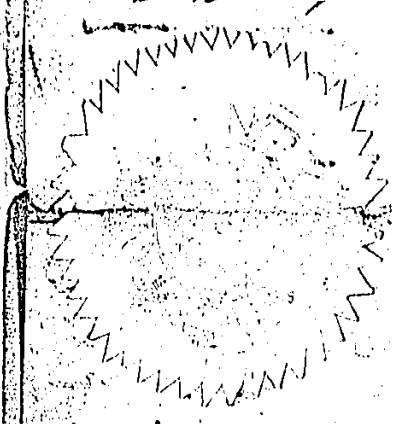

Personally appeared before me the undersigned a Justice of the Peace for the County of Pendleton, Michael Cookindorfer, who being duly sworn deposes & says, that by reason of old age, and the consequent loss of memory he cannot swear positively as to the precise length of his ^{service}, but according to the best of his recollection he served not less than the period

length of his ^{service} but according to the best of his
recollection he served out ~~of~~ the periods
mentioned below, and in the following grade:
That he volunteered under Capt. Gen. Pitt as
above stated, as well as he now recollects, for
one or nine months, he is not positive which
of period out the time for which he volunteered.
He served a second tour of three months under
Capt. P. Roy, during both of which tours
he served as file to the regiment, and after
the expiration of the second tour, he continued
with the 29th Regiment Maryland Militia
and served as file Major until April 1781.
That he volunteered ~~for~~ as above stated under Capt.
Gen. Pitt as well as he recollects in May
1776, ~~and~~ after the expiration of that tour of
duty still continued with the Army until he
volunteered for a second tour under Capt. P.
Roy which he thinks was in the spring of
~~the~~ spring of 1777 or 78 & after the expiration
of that tour still continued with the
regiment until the ~~expirations~~ ~~of~~ ~~the~~ ~~tour~~
during which time ~~he~~ ~~served~~ ~~much~~ ~~with~~ ~~meritoriously~~
officer as a musketier, aid in military
souldiers, and for such service as above
mentioned he claims a pension.
